Lorsban 4E Approved For Aphids

On December 12, The Texas Department of Agriculture declared a Section 18 crisis exemption to allow the use of Lorsban 4E on wheat for control of the Russian wheat aphid. It is in effect for the Northern and Southern High Plains, Northern Low Plains, Edwards Plateau and Trans-Pecos area.

Use restrictions are as follows: 1) May be applied only by certified applicators or persons under their direct supervision.

2) May be applied by aerial, ground or sprinkler irrigation equipment. The latter must be fitted with properly functioning check and vacuum relief valves (anti-siphon devices).

3) Applications can be made at a maximum rate of 0.5 lbs. ai/ac. Do not make more than two applications per season.

4) Do not apply product where runoff is likely to occur to aquatic

5) Do not apply when weather conditions favor drift.

6) Do not allow livestock to graze or otherwise feed wheat forage to livestock for at least 14 days following an application of Lorsban 4E.

7) Do not harvest wheat for grain within 28 days following application.

8) Do not feed wheat straw to livestock for at least 28 days following an application of Lors-

For Conservation Program

A fifth of a one million loan has been approved by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) to continue the pilot Agricultural Water Conservation Equipment Loan program offered through the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

Irrigators who farm within the Water District's 15-county service area and who wish to upgrade their irrigation equipment for better water application and/or distribution efficiency can finance a part of this cost through this special loan program. Any individual, partnership or corporation farming or owning land within the Water Distirct's 15-county service area may apply for a loan.

O'Grady Medical Grad At Texas Tech

Stephen O'Grady, son of Jim and Fran O'Grady, Muleshoe, graduated from Texas Tech Medical School this month in the top 25 percent of his class.

Since the program's inception, the Water District has loaned almost \$2 million to qualified applicants. Additional loans totaling \$600,000 have been approved by the Water District's Board of Directors for purchase of agricultural water conservation equipment. As of December 13, 1988, loans for 111 low-pressure center pivot sprinkler systems, 40 surge valves, two furrow dikes, one laser land levelling machine and several LEPA conversion kits have been made or approved by the Water

Landowners or operators who qualify may borrow up to 75 percent of the purchase price of permanently installed equipment and 50 percent of the cost of contract services, installation and non-recoverable items.

The Ag Loan funds are being loaned at a 7.22 percent interest rate, and there is a one-time service fee of 2.5 percent of the amount borrowed to cover administrative costs. Applicants

Ag Chemical Use May Endanger Water Supplies

Pesticides and herbicides play major roles in today's agriculture. However, there is growing concern that some of these agricultural chemicals could find their way into the nation's groundwater supplies.

To help producers appreciate the importance of safe handling and application of agricultural chemicals, the American Soybean Association and the National Corn Growers Association have produced an educational program, "Groundwater and Agricultural Chemicals: Understanding the Issues."

The 18-minute video presentation is narrated by Hugh Downs and informs viewers about groundwater movement, how chemicals can enter groundwater supplies, and how producers can avoid chemical spills.



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












Creative Living

COOKING

There are many foods that may be prepared efficiently by doing part of the cooking by microwave and part by conventional methods. For example, for toasted sandwiches, the bread should be toasted conventionally, then microwaved to heat fillings and melt cheeses.

Syrup for pancakes and waffles may be warmed in the serving pitcher or uncapped bottle. Leftover pancakes and waffles reheat beautifully in the microwave also.

For dishes calling for blanched almonds, simply microwave one cup of water until boiling, add the nuts, microwave on high for one-half minute, drain and skin.

Hard to shell nuts can be helped by microwaving 8 ounces of nuts in the shell in one cup of water on High for 4 to 5 minutes.

Water-Stressed Plants,

Trees Need Extra Care

Drier-than-normal soil conditions prevail in the southeastern portion of the Southern High Plains.

Homeowners in this area are advised to give their lawns, trees, and shrubs a thorough watering to protect them from water-stress damage.

Normal rainfall during September, October and November is about six inches per year, and this usually satisfies the water needs of most plants during the fall and winter. This year, during the same three-month period, the rainfall total has been less than two inches. This available soil moisture has been used up and the soil is very dry over most of the South Plains area.

Most trees, shrubs and grass grown in the area go dormant during the winter months. However, the plant remains alive and must maintain a certain amount of moisture, especially in the root system, to keep alive. If the soil around the roots is allowed to become dryer than the root system, water losses will occur from the roots back into the dry soil and the plant will die.

Most bermudagrass lawns are fairly deep-rooted and should be watered until the soil is wet to about a foot in depth. Homeowners may determine the wetted depth by pushing a metal rod or wooden dowel into the soil until it cannot be pushed further and then measuring the depth that the rod or dowel penetrated

This will provide homeowners with an indication of the depth that the soil has been wet to. The soil moisture condition should be checked at least once a month and when the top six inches of soil becomes dry, it is time to water again.

Persons with cool-season grasses, such as Fescue, will need to water their lawns regularly during the winter. These grasses continue to grow and require more water in the winter months than the dormant warm-season grasses.

Mulberry and other trees that drop their leaves during winter do not require as much water during their dormant period.

These deciduous trees do require some water during winter, especially in the soil around the root zone. A good soaking now followed by light once-a-month watering of the total lawn area, including the area under the trees, should be adequate during the winter months.

Warm weather during the fall and winter can cause evergreen trees to deplete soil moisture rapidly, says Dr. Harold Kauf-man, plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Lubbock.

'These trees are basically big evaporative coolers. On warm days, they pump water to their needles to keep themselves cool and in doing so, they can use a lot of soil moisture. Homeowners

Calves Require **Good Handling During Winter**

The way a cow is handled during the winter will have an influence on her calf's future and next year's calf crop.

The cow's reproductive performance and the health and weaning weight of her calf are greatly influenced by her nutritional status throughout the year, said Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

If a cow is allowed to calve in poor or thin body condition, the odds are against her to maintain a 12-month calving interval.

Cattle are usually fed hay during the winter, but if not enough energy is supplied by that hay, additional grains should be supplied, Tanksley said.

Producers should have their hay tested to obtain the real protein content. This enables them to feed cattle without over them to feed cattle without overor under-feeding.

Producers also should make allowances for weather conditions, said Tanksley. As temperatures drop and wind and rain increases, nutritional needs of cattle increase as much as 20 percent.

A dry pregnant cow can usually live on 20 pounds of average quality hay per day during the winter. But if hay quality is poor or the weather is cold and wet, an additional 2 to 3 pounds of a 20 percent protein supplement shoull be fed daily, said Tanksley.


A cow nursing a calf needs about 5 to 6 pounds of a 20 percent protein supplement with about 22 pounds of hay per winter day.
