

THE GREAT CAP AND GOWN CONTROVERSY

TECH'S Business Administration school has come into its own. With acceptance in the American Association of Collegiate Schools of Business, Tech gained-status of rank with the leading business colleges and schools in the nation.

Membership in AACSB, the equiva-lent of accreditation, is based on qualita-tive rather than simply quantative evalu-ations — which means a great deal more than just size of a school.

than just size of a school. Tech's BA school was found to have favorable qualifications in the number of credit hours taught by persons with doc-torates or other graduate degrees, the size of instructional and administrative loads, whether the school was subject to undue political influence, library facili-ties and faculty research by the investi-gators. gators.

And membership was granted first try contrary to at least two investiga-tions as the rule.

Important side benefits afforded by membership in the AACSB are new academic opportunities to business ad-ministration students. These will take the form of business administration hon-or societies which can be installed only on campuses of member schools.

And, above all, is the value added to a degree in BA from Tech. The mem-bership, by accreditation it gives, materially increases the value of the de-

Congratulations are due Business Administration on their work to raise the standards of the school and for their success in becoming a member of the Association.

desire. Patrick, who was born in 385 A. D. in England, was captured by the Irish and made a slave while he was still a young boy. When he received his religious call, he escaped to the Contin-ent for study and training on-ly to return to Ireland for re-ligious nurposes.




