At the joint meeting of the Athletic Committee of the Board of Directors and the Faculty Athletic Council Jan. 25 - at which the student representative was absent - it was decided to give Weaver the two-year extension. Thi complete situation and reasons for this that be of the upper echelons of our college administration.

The one important reason released to the average student and person supporting the Red Raiders was that the two assistant coaches hired at the Jan. 25 meeting, Joe Kerbel and I. T. King, wanted assurance that Weaver would be at Tech "longer than a year"

The die was cast at this meeting, the matter settled as far as the people on the athletic boards were concerned. But when the news leaked out that the extension was in the planning, anonymous persons on campus protested under the aegis of the Suitcase Club.

Wednesday, Feb. 12, a banner appeared protesting the extension. Sometime between midnight Wednesday and sunrise Thursday a number of leaflets es were distributed over the campus protesting the extension. The student body protest was climaxed Friday night when the student body president and the Student Council representative to the three-member Athletic Committee of the Board in closed door session for over an hour.

What the students told the Com mittee will, and no doubt should, remain secre

How wide a representation of student body opinion the Suitcase Club had is a matter for speculation. But by Friday estimates of the general attitude on campus could be estimated. In an opinion poll conducted by THE TOREADOR, 18 said "no," 12 said "ves," nine were "neutral," and two had "no comment" when asked about the extension.

The poll was as accurate as possible and was made up as proportionate as possible among general students, faculty and athletes.

As a final indication as to how wide the attitude on campus was, the Student Council, representing the student body, carried a protest to the athletic Commit tee, and the nature of the testimony was such that it was held in closed door session.

This in summary is what happened in extending Coach Weaver's contract. The athletic groups decided on the action. The student body, too late and both in unapproved and approved methods, protested. The Board granted the extension.

We have the facts. What will be the results? What is the next step on the part of the student body?

Weaver has said this action will mean much in stabilizing the athletic program. He reports the recruiting program is progressing better than any time since he has been here. The addition of Kerbel and King has strengthened the coaching staff. Area students are and will be more interested to Tech because of the opportunity to "represent West Texas" in Southwest Conference play.

Upon entering the Southwest Conference, Tech's depth was "cut in half," Weaver said, by Southwest Conference
rules against playing freshmen. This and other adjustments of entering the Conference will keep us from having a top team this year. But the future is rosier because of players now being recruited, Weaver says.

So, with the incoming material, with the strengthened coaching staff things appear to be looking up within the athletic department

The Student Council is urging the student body to support the team and coaches. This seems like sound advice. There certainly is going to be no improvement in the team, in the athletic administrative setup, if we don't support the team.

All the reasons for the recent action aren't known to the average person, nor will they be known. Simply because of this fact, we must admit the possibility, even the probability, of there being definite good reasons other than those known of for the contract extension.

Aside from any opinions, prejudices, against the athletic administrative setup, there is no Techsan who has any ill will toward any part of the team itself. This alone is reason enough to support the Red Raiders.

The student body has expressed itself in every means in its power. All has been done that could be. Therefore, we can have no grounds for a bitterness that can do only damage in the future.

The student body of Texas Tech will support the Red Raiders with all the spirit that they have in the past.
