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

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

### **Dr. Beard Discusses** Viruses and Cancer

In a speech yesterday to the Tech Club of Sigma Xi, graduate research fraternity, Dr. J. W. Beard said the door is open for scientists to determine whether viruses are a cause of cancer in man.

man. The Duke University medical professor stated that a systematic investigation of virus tumors in the human has been a tedious, time-consuming and expensive en-terprise, and there have been many obstacles to practical de-monstration of the theory that cancers are virus induced.

HE EXPLAINED that now the combination of electron micros-copy and ultra-thin sectioning of tumors from man offers science great possibilities for protracted search of tumors from unknown causes

In addition to pointing out hope-ful signs that the possible role of viruses in cancer may be de-termined, Dr. Beard also remind-ed that "despite occasional clinical correlations, the mechanisms of origin of the myriad of tumors in the human remains obscure."

He called for expanded work in this area,

DR. BEARD is profesor in charge of experimental surgery and associate professor virology at the Duke University Medical School. He is known for research on surgical shock and influenza vaccine as well as for studies of viruses.
