benefits, effective Jan .1, was approved yesterday by the House Ways and Means Committee. Chariman Wibur D. Mills, D-Ark., said he expects the House to
pass the bill probably next week. This would allow time for Senate pass the bill probably next week. This would allow ime tor Senate
action beforec Congress adjuouns for Christmas. To produce benefiti-increasing legislation in time for enactment
this year, the committee postponed action on all other proposed changes in both Social Security and wellare legistation, on which it held extensiviverearings.

WASHINGTON-The Senate voted yesterday to increase the
personal income tax exemption from $\$$ sooo
to spoo, handing personal income cax exemplion from the
Presiden Nixon his first major defeat on the tax reform bill In $58-37$ vote, the Senate ignored the threat of a veto
an amendment by Democrat Albert Gore of Tennesse.
The Gore proposal would provide an average tax cut of more than 18 per cent by 1971 for families earnings
greater windall for millions earning less.

It replaces in the big tax bill an administration-backed provision that would have eut tax rates without changing the exemption and
delayed the impact until 1972 . This approach has also been approved by the House.
The Gore proposal, if finally enacted, would raise the personal exemption to sy00 next year and to s800 in in 1971 . Regardless of the
outcome, income tax returns due next April lor 1969 income will not beaffected.

Iready rumors have been spreading about a new head coach for the Red Raiders being named for next year.

l961. In his first year at Tech King posted a $4-6$ season mark after the Raiders had just won one ball game the year before in their first The next year was a disappointme

The next year in 1965 King had his greatest year as a Red Raider The team went $8-2$ that year losing only to Texas and Arkansas. For his efforts King was named coach of the year by Texas sports year. In 1966 the team had its first losing season since 1962 with a $4-6$ record but the team did beat Arkansas the final game of the season. In 1967 King started another non-losing streak as he has not had a losing season since 1966
King has only had three losing seasons in his nine years of
coaching which is a very good record in a conference that boasts two of the greatest college powerhouses in football today. Arkansas and Texas brings up another point why the Raiders have not won the Southwest Conference championship so far in it's ten year history. These two teams have consistently been ranked in the
top ten the past decade.
go to these go to these two great teams instead of one who is the youngest in the nation. They meet Saturday for the national championship. nation. They meet Saturday for the national championship.
There are many great teams in this country their respective conferences for many vears but Texas and Arkansas are the best in the country. This means that the Southwes Conference is one of the toughest if not the toughest in the country.
It is quite an accomplishment for a team in its first decade to have a winning record.
A new coach for Tech would not be any kind of solution at all. Look what happened to Baylor last year when the school decided to fire head coach John Bridgers. Baylor had had some losing streaks Baylor has not been able to win a single game in a season.
Also. Tech has a very young ball club with only 16 senior graduating. The team also has some very fine sophomores tha have already proved themselves this season.
The team has had some bad breaks this season but still they
managed not to have a losing season. Against Arkansas last week hey played their heart out, but unfortunately they just were utclassed by the number two ranked team.
In a partial survey of Southwest Conference sports writers the question of King staying on with the Tech organization was
discussed. It was decided that King was doing well with the Red Raider organization.
One Fort Worth sports writer put it this way. "I ve always looked forward to talking with King. He is a very brilliant coach. He is by
