# Student Association elections set for today

Student Association elections today will climax a week of campaign speeches, rallies and interviews for the nine executive office hopefuls.

Candidates for president of the Student Association are Mike Anderson, Elata Ely and Grant Foreman.

Vice Presidential candidates are Robin Cash, Larry Meyers and Roger Settler. Allan Soffar is candidates make "a lot of noise but running as a write-in candidate.

Bonnie Craddick is running unopposed for secretary as is Sam Stennis for business manager.

AT A RALLY Tuesday, the candidates argued their platforms to an audience of 37, including three reporters and the seven candidates present.

The rally began with a substitute speaker for presidential candidate Grant Foreman. The speaker never identified himself except as Abbot. He referred to Foreman as the "savior of Texas Tech."

This speaker's explanation of Foreman's absence was "he doesn't believe in politics as such." The entire speech thereafter consisted of jokes.

For example, on the problem of parking space on campus Foreman plans to "import five million parking spaces from Siberia." The audience replied with loud whistles and hollering.

Anderson, spoke next. He was not sure how to follow up the previous speaker he said. He emphasized, however, that student government was not a joke.

ANDERSON WENT on to say, "I don't have any quick or easy answers concerning finances.

Miss Ely, spoke third. She explained that many ideas which the candidates endorse actually had been around a long time. She also proposed to make sure these ideas were acted on.

Miss Cash, the first vicepresidential candidate to speak, stressed two main points. The first one was "student power in government (which includes

communication with the students). The second idea was the need for a resident legal advisor on campus. She added, "the law school could

help but it has two drawbacks. "We need a lawyer with prestige and the law school faculty could not properly fight the administration without fear of their jobs.

Meyers, emphasized action on senate resolutions (statements of popular feeling on a subject by the student senate). Meyers said these resolutions should be carried to the right people.

A brief rebuttal session followed the general presentations of each candidate. At this time less than 15 people remained in the room to listen (including three reporters and the candidates themselves).

5,000 expected to vote

## Candidates considered 'apathetic'

Five thousand Tech students is the maximum number expected to vote in today's executive elections, and Joe Hillbun, Alpha Chi Omega election chairman, said, "We'll be lucky to get that

In last year's executive election 6,839 students voted. Interest in that election was

prompted by widespread rumors of SDS participation in campus issues. Mike since been realized. Anderson, presidential candidate said. The students felt threatened and responded in the large voter turn-out, said Student Association President Jay Thompson.

Even the candidates are apathetic this year, Anderson said. The students do not think they can accomplish anything by voting, and there has not been as much personal canvassing this year by candidates.

FURTHER PROOF of student apathy is that two candidates are completely unopposed: Bonnie Craddick for secretary and Sam Stennis for business manager Anderson said he thought both candidates qualified, but the overall idea of student government is hurt when offices are

unopposed. Thompson thinks students are wrong who think the student government accomplishes nothing. The bus system was first discussed

in the student senate, Anderson said. Issues in the 1967 winning platform were promises by Max Blakney that he would work toward getting a traffic engineer for Tech and concluding the fall semester before Christmas. In 1967 only 4,709

students voted. The 1968 winning platform was a promise by Mike Riddle to end Saturday classes and to begin a teacher evaluation program. That year, 5,210 students voted.

PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE Grant Foreman contends the student senate is a farce, and has no power. Thompson said the students complain about the student government's lack of power but that it has as much power as the students will give it. By voting, students can express their individual concerns. If they do not think the executives in the Student Association are personally interested, the students can vote for candidates to represent them in the Student Senate, he said.

Students who live near the campus might be interested in a resolution that is being researched to start an off-campus bus system, one that would to to apartment houses to pick up students. This measure would affect numerous off-campus students and give them a reason to vote, Thompson pointed out.

Another measure designed to affect all Tech students is a proposed student discount from Lubbock merchants. If Lubbock supermarkets gave a 10 per cent discount, for instance, off-campus students could save money. If the University Avenue merchants were persuaded to give a discount, this would affect most of the student body, Thompson said.


#### Chief suffers

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

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

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
