

Demos want total withdrawal

WASHINGTON-Democratic party policy makers declared Monday that all U.S. forces should be withdrawn from Vietnam within 18 months, and urged President Nixon to appoint immediately a new top-level peace negotiator.

The Democratic Policy Council adopted a statement drafted by a panel headed by W. Averell Harriman, once the U.S. negotiator at the Paris peace talks.

The action came as the policy council put together what amounted to an interim Democratic platform. Former Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, the council chairman, said the declaration on Vietnam and on an array of other issues provides "a pretty good review of the state of the nation as we see it now.' There were proposals from more dovish Democrats that the party council demand complete withdrawal this year. On the other hand, such men as Rep. Jim Wright of Texas requested that the statement drop any troop withdrawal deadline.



Hijacker surrenders

MADRID-A man surrendered to U.S. military authorities in Spain Monday, identifying himself as the hijacker of a DC8 airliner diverted to Cuba on a Chicago-Miami flight nearly two years ago. He gave his name as Lawrence Malhou Rhodes and said he

hijacked a Delta Airlines plane at gunpoint Feb. 21, 1968 Records showed the FBI filed a complaint in Miami on Feb. 22,

1968, charging Lawrence M. Rhodes Jr., 28, of Welch, W.Va., with hijacking the jetliner and kidnapping the 108 aboard

Rhodes was being sought at that time on a federal warrant accusing him of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution in a \$12,000 payroll robbery. The warrant said a gunman kidnaped the payroll clerk of the Amherst Coal Co., in Logan County, W.Va., on Dec. 18, 1967, and held the clerk and his family until he was given money.

U.S. Embassy officials in Madrid said Rhodes presented himself to American authorities at the joint U.S.-Spanish air base in Zaragoza. American sources said, if he is the same Rhodes named in the FBI complaints, U.S. authorities would ask Spain for extradition.

Post Office spreads service

WASHINGTON - The Post Office Department announced Monday that starting Feb. 16 it will make home delivery service available to about 1.2 million families who have not qualified for it before.

Postmaster General Winton M. Blount said the new order covers about 4 million individuals who live more than a quarter mile from 18,700 post ofices too small to qualify for city delivery services.

"Because these persons don't live at least half a mile away from their post offices, they have not qualified in the past for rural delivery service," Blount said. "And, because they happen to live near one of the offices that does not have a city delivery service, they have lost out there too.,'

Blount's statement said that to get the new service it is only necessary that a majority of those living in the area ask their postmaster for it.

In separate statements both Texas' senators, Democrat Ralph Yarborough and Republican John Tower, said 77,866 Texas families are eligible for expanded rural mail delivery under the new program.

The judge also ruled that prosecution and defense lawyers will be allowed seven hours each for their final arguments, which will begin Tuesday. The government indicated the opening segment of its closing arguments would take up most of Tuesday's session. It was expected that the U.S. District Court jury of 10 women and 2 men would get the case sometime Thursday. The jurors have been sequestered in a hotel since Sept. 30. The trial began Sept. 24.

Thomas A. Foran, the U.S. district attorney, suggested that each side be allowed 10 hours to summarize the testimony of 190 witnesses and 20,000 pages of trial transcript.

Surplus bill on borrowing

WASHINGTON-President Nixon's projected budget surplus is built on borrowing and will disappear, a high congressional critic said Monday as the administration kept predicting a curb on inflation.

Rep. George H. Mahon, D-Tex., chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, while downgrading the importance of what he called the razor-thin \$1.3 billion surplus, nevertheless pledged his committee will do all possible to stay within Nixon's \$200.8 billion spending estimate for the year beginning July 1.

In defense of the budget, Secretary of the Treasury David M. Kennedy contended "there are definite indications that the policy of restraint is taking hold."

"I recognize that the results up to now-in terms of price changes-will not satisfy any of you in this room," Kennedy told the Appropriations Committee in written testimony.

I'm black and you're white.

What do I want more than anything else-to feel like I'm really a part of this society. I don't like walking into your classrooms and being noted as the colored guy or the Negro or the black guy that sits on the second row.

I don't really want you to speak to me when you're walking across campus. I know that if you say anything it's just because I'm black. You normally don't talk to the white kids you don't know, so don't talk to me either.

AS A MATTER OF FACT, I'd just as soon you wouldn't pay that much attention to me at all. Why do you have to be so aware of my presence? When I talk to a white girl, why do you always stare so much?

Don't you know that racism means more than just being openly prejudiced? It includes what you think and what you feel when you come into contact with me. Don't you know that I can see it in your eyes when you pat me on the back just because I'm black?

What are you going to do to solve the problem? I admit that I'm rather confused about the whole thing. You know-we're all caught up in this thing of black pride and black is beautiful. Don't let any of my fellow blacks find out, but now that I think about it, I really do appreciate you're going out of your way to be friendly-just so you don't overdo it.

And another thing, I don't understand why all of my people sit in their little corner of the Union. Sure, we're having a pretty good time, but how can we ever expect to get to know other students that way?

YOU KNOW, looking ahead, I think inter-marriage will be the final answer-or maybe the final indication-of America's race problems being solved. Sure, black is beautiful. But so is brown and yellow-and maybe even white. When the nation really can see this, racial inter-marriage won't be a big thing anymore.

That's probably the real hang-up in school integration right now, all these white parents are afraid their kids might someday want to marry the black kids they would be going to school with.

Maybe our generations will be different.

Students today are always voicing their discontent about boring courses, dull professors or the general education that our university affords us. They feel sure they would be better educated if Texas Tech would just listen to their demands.

Well, I'm sure this will come as a complete surprise to some students but this past week Texas Tech was the host for the Third Annual World Affairs Conference. The title of the conference was Australia, A Modern Happening, a topic in which most of us are not knowledgeable. This would have been the golden opportunity for most of us, as mature students, to further our education. Of course, the difficulty being that as mature students we would have had to have taken the time and effort to go to the Student Union and listen to some of the most noted statesmen, educators, diplomats and businessmen, all expert in their fields, talk on a subject that is rapidly taking prominence in the world.

We are quick to criticize the education we receive but we are slow to take the initiative in utilizing those opportunities afforded us. At the last major address there were only 40 students


