# Astroturf installation work starts in stadium

Preliminary work began Monday for the installation of the synthetic surface, Astroturf, on the floor of Jones Stadium.

The preliminary work will consist of first stripping off the top 10 inches of soil, which will be moved to other parts of campus evidently the Ranch Headquarters area near the new West Texas Museum.

After the stripping, work will begin on installation of concrete retaining walls and gutters at the north end of the stadium. Another 21/2 feet of soil will then be dug out

> After the Astroturf is installed, a 14-foot wide Tartan Track made by Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing will be poured around the field to serve as a track for the Red Raider mascot and to protect the Astroturf.

THE ENTIRE PROJECT will be finished by early June if the contracted completion date for the preliminary work is met, according to Norman Igo, Tech director of new construction. Igo said these contractors had told him that barring bad weather, the preliminary work would be complete by mid-April. This would move the final date back to mid-

In any case, Igo said the installation should be complete by the Coaches All-American football game this summer. The turf will not be installed in time for spring football practice as the athletic department had once hoped.

The total cost of the project is slightly more than \$379,000 in three parts — \$108,000 for preliminary work, \$226,660 for the Astroturf and \$45,000 for the Tartan Track

## Dr. Andrew Edington speaks as Willson Lectures begin

An educator, author and administrator noted for his frank and practical approach to the problems of the individual in today's complex society will be the speaker at Texas Tech's 1970 series of Willson

He is Dr. Andrew Edington, president of the Schreiner Institute, Kerrville, whose experiences in working with people range from individual counseling to coaching prison teams in Alabama.

He has selected "The People Business" as the theme of his four lectures based on his background as a teacher and advisor to persons of all ages.

The lectures, scheduled for 10:30 a.m. today and Wednesday and at 9:30 a.m. Thursday, will open to the public without charge.

EDINGTON ALSO will be available for more personal discussions from 1 to 3 p.m. each afternoon, today and Wednesday, according to Col Haynes Baumgardner, chairman of the University Speakers Lectures beginning today in Tech Union Committee. These meetings will be in the Union Anniversary Room.

> A native of Alabama, Edington received his education at Southwestern College, Memphis, Tenn., and at the University of Alabama. He has been head coach and superintendent of the University Military School, Mobile, Ala., and coach at Spring Hill College.

During World War II, he served with the U.S. Navy in the Atlantic and Pacific theaters of operation as captain of escort vessels and as commander of an escort task

For two years, on a spare time basis, he coached prison athletic teams in Alabama penal institutions.
