Tech's Recreation hall was made possible by the college so that students, regardless of their interests or club affiliations on the campus, would have an opportunity to participate in social activities. When a few students misuse or swipe equipment from the recreation center, they not only defeat the purpose of the center, but are unfair to themselves and their fellow students.

Reports from Recreation hall officials show that number of valuable pieces of equipment have "disappeared' from the building this semester

Officials point out that equipment checked out by students and not returned must be paid for by the students. It is, therefore, to the best interest of the student see that all equipment is returned in good condition.

When equipment is taken from the building, the Rec reation hall is not able to give the proper service to the students. In one instance, amplifying equipment was borrowed without authorization from the Recreation hall that was needed for a square dance. Similar cases have been reported throughout the semester

Officials feel that perhaps students are not aware of the inconveniences caused by their "borrowing" equipment without authorization. Every article in the Recreation hall was placed there for use by the students, but this does not give any person the right to misuse or pilfer the equipment.
