Court Will Rule On Number of **Council Seats**

Tech's Supreme Court has been ked to interpret the Student mustitution's provision for ap-rtionment of Student Council presentatives among the under-aduate divisions. J. C. Chamb-s, Council president, announced sterday that the case had been ferred to George Lemon, chief stice of the Court. The provision in question reade:

In doubt is whether a division with approximately 350 students ennolled should be allowed one representative "automatical-by" plus a second on the basis of its enrollment. If the Court decides that such is the case, the Division of Home Economics, which had only one representative this year, will be allowed two for next year and the Division of Agriculture will continue to have three. If the Court rules that an enrollment of 350 entitles a divi-sion to only one representative, Home Economics will continue to have one and Agriculture will be cut to two.

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



I found that, in addition to the engineering of switchboards, its work involved the supervision and the actual handling of customer calls. It struck me like a wonderful opportunity to combine staff engineering and field management.

"My first impression was right, too, because my work covered both. First, I had on-the-job training assignments in several different kinds of offices—local, Long Distance, dial and manual. Then



I worked in engineering, translating estimates of future growth into the actual number of circuits and switchboard positions required.

"Now I'm supervising the operation "Now I'm supervising the operation of one of the boards I helped engineer. Briefly, my job is to see that my district gets the kind of equipment it needs and that what we have is functioning prop-erly. Working with people is another major part of my job, too, because I serve in an advisory capacity to the supervisors of the Long Distance operators.

"Needless to say, I'm happy with my job. A job I didn't even know existed."

Emmett Smith's job is with a Bell Telephone Company. There are similar opportunities for college people with Bell Telephone Laboratories, Western Electric and Sandia Corporation.

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
