EMS Purchases New Ambulance Supplies

The Bailey County EMS Organization has recently purchased several pieces of equipment for use on the Bailey County ambulance units. This equipment includes two Life-Pak V heart situation where power will be lost monitor batteries and one Scott in a life-threatening moment.

These pieces of equipment are of vital importance to any advanced life support ambulance service for quality patient care. Usually, though, the mere cost of these items is prohibitive for purchase by rural services.

The Life-Pak heart monitor batteries are rechargeable nickelcadmium batteries used by the EMS service to power a heart monitor/defribrillator. This monitor makes it possible to monitor the patient's heart functions and, if needed, to pass an electrical

current through the muscle of the heart. The unit must be used 'at the scene' and the purchase of these batteries insures that the service will never be in a possible

The Scott Air Pack is a selfcontained breathing apparatus used in situations where pressurized air would be necessary. Situations involving fire, smoke, Cont. Page 6, Col. 2

FmHA Loans For Drought Are Available

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Muleshoe, FmHA acting county supervisor, Jacqueline E. Morgan, said Wednesday.

Bailey County is one of twelve in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from drought.

Morgan said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Morgan said. "Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.'

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 22, 1990 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season, Morgan

FmHA is a credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a Cont. Page 6, Col. 3

It was an aggressive game for the Lady Mules as they battled right down to the wire against the Bobbie's, losing out in the final analysis by two points, 40-42.


Both Amy Harrison and Wendy Green fouled out and watched a part of the game from the sidelines.

Cosmetology Exam Scheduled For Jan. 24


The next pre-entrance exam for the 12-month cosmetology program at South Plains College will be Jan. 24.


The exam, scheduled from 9-11 a.m., will be administered in the SPC Student Assistance Center, located on the third floor of the library. The Fee is \$10.





A course in background investigation, designed for law enforcement officers, is scheduled Feb. 19-21 by the South Plains College law enforcement academy.

The class will meet 8 a.m.-5 p.m. in the SPC Law Enforcement/Petroleum Technology Building, Room 115. Cost is \$24 a person and instructors are personnel in SPC's two-year law enforcement program.

Officers successfully completing the course will receive 24 hours credit required every two years by the Texas Commission Law Enforcement Officers Standards and Education, according to Larry Nichols, an associate professor of law enforcement at

"This course is designed to help law enforcement officers do background investigations on the qualifications of prospective peace officers," said Nichols.

Topics of the course will include general legal considerations, the investigation itself and evaluation of background evidence.

Advance registration is needed. A minimum of 12 persons is

to all homeowners on their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 or over. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans.

your local appraisal district office at the address shown below for all exemptions you may qualify for. Application forms are available at this

address. If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1989 you won't need to apply again for 1990 unless the chief appraiser requires you to

However, if you passed your 65th birthday or became disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you moved to a new home, make a new application for 1990.

The deadline

for applications is April 30, 1990. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.
