MAHD Will Assist Employee Education

By the time all details are worked out, employees of the Muleshoe Area Medical Center and the Muleshoe Area Health Care Center will have the opportunity for further education with help.

After discussion Wednesday night during the MAHD Board of Directors meeting, it was agreed that such a plan would prove to be very beneficial to the district, so MAHD administrator Phillip Langston was asked to work out details of such a plan for final approval by the board.

Board members agreed that such a plan would prove to be very beneficial to the hospital

district, and were in complete agreement with the plan.

In its final form, the plan for continuing education for hospital and nursing home employees can be used one time by the employee.

It will be discussed further at the next MAHD meeting.

Other business discussed with no final disposition made include the discussion of the possibility of acquisition of a small computer for the administration office; and discussion on a policy for indigent care for illegal aliens who seek medical aid at the Muleshoe Area Medical Center.

Board members agreed to ask for a six month extension to pay the balance of a bank note obtained for operation funds while the MAHD was waiting for the first tax receipts to be paid. Originally, the bank note was for \$400,000. At this time, slightly less than \$300,000 is left on the note.

After discussion, board members gave the 'go-ahead' for a complete environmental impact study to be conducted for an FHA loan.

The MAHD board also asked the administrator to notify bidders for the hospital insurance of a deadline to submit bid for the insurance on the MAHD building and equipment complex. It was noted that an appraisal has now been made of all buildings, equipment and the pharmacy.

Both the hospital administrator, Phillip Langston, and the nursing home administrator, Rachel Snider, reported on the status of their respective facilities.

Following the report of routine activities, the board went into executive session to consider personnel matters, as noted on their agenda.

EMS Purchases New Ambulance Supplies

The Bailey County EMS Organization has recently purchased several pieces of equipment for use on the Bailey County ambulance units. This equipment includes two Life-Pak V heart monitor batteries and one Scott Air Pack.

These pieces of equipment are of vital importance to any advanced life support ambulance service for quality patient care. Usually, though, the mere cost of these items is prohibitive for purchase by rural services.

The Life-Pak heart monitor batteries are rechargeable nickel-cadmium batteries used by the EMS service to power a heart monitor/defibrillator. This monitor makes it possible to monitor the patient's heart functions and, if needed, to pass an electrical

current through the muscle of the heart. The unit must be used 'at the scene' and the purchase of these batteries insures that the service will never be in a possible situation where power will be lost in a life-threatening moment.

The Scott Air Pack is a self-contained breathing apparatus used in situations where pressurized air would be necessary. Situations involving fire, smoke, Cont. Page 6, Col. 2

FmHA Loans For Drought Are Available

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Muleshoe, FmHA acting county supervisor, Jacqueline E. Morgan, said Wednesday.

Bailey County is one of twelve in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from drought.

Morgan said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Morgan said. "Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss."

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 22, 1990 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season, Morgan said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U. S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a Cont. Page 6, Col. 3

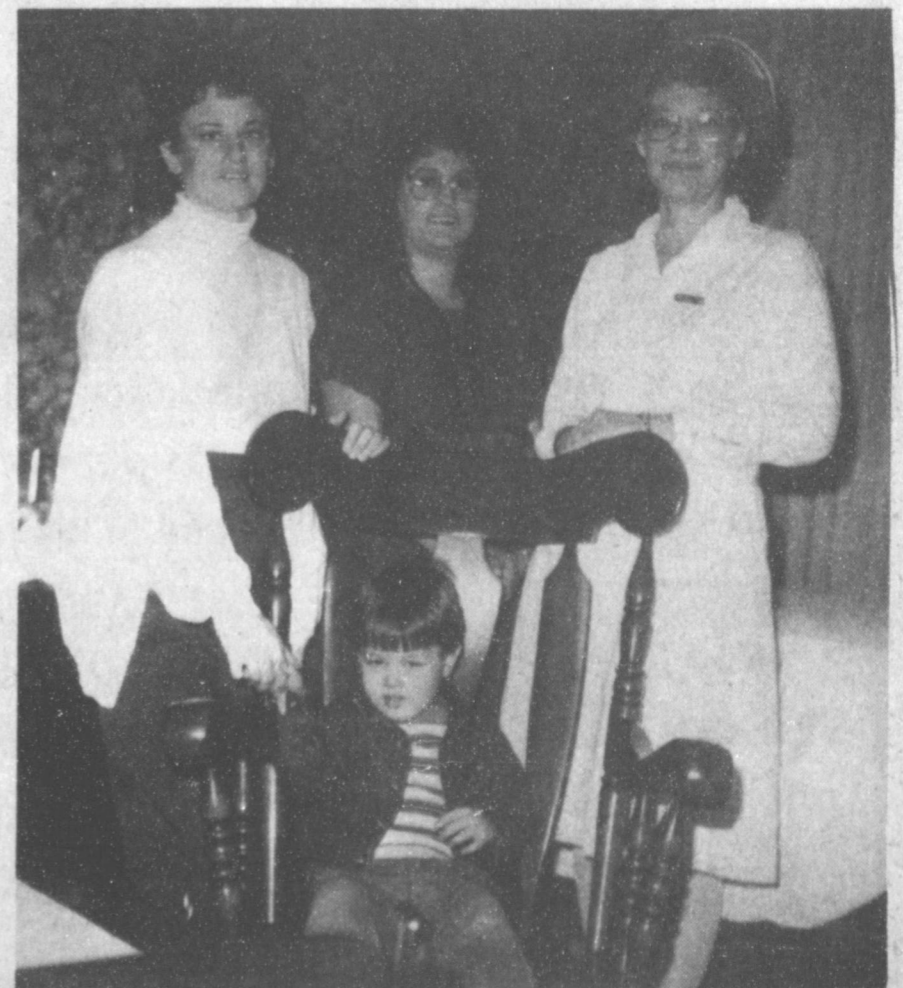
"This meeting will include nationally known experts in various fields and give local community leaders the tools needed to develop their economic-development programs," he said.

Law Enforcement Courses Offered At South Plains

A course in background investigation, designed for law enforcement officers, is scheduled Feb. 19-21 by the South Plains College law enforcement academy.

The class will meet 8 a.m.-5 p.m. in the SPC Law Enforcement/Petroleum Technology Building, Room 115. Cost is \$24 a person and instructors are personnel in SPC's two-year law enforcement program.

Officers successfully completing the course will receive 24 hours credit required every two years by the Texas Commission Law Enforcement Officers Standards and Education, according to Larry Nichols, an associate professor of law enforcement at SPC.

"This course is designed to help law enforcement officers do background investigations on the qualifications of prospective peace officers," said Nichols.

Topics of the course will include general legal considerations, the investigation itself and evaluation of background evidence.

Advance registration is needed. A minimum of 12 persons is required.

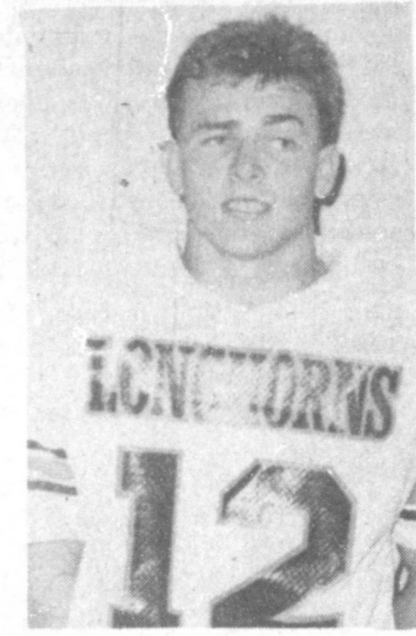

to Heaven. The Japanese think that the crane are so pretty that they are part of their wedding rituals. Don, thank you for a good program.

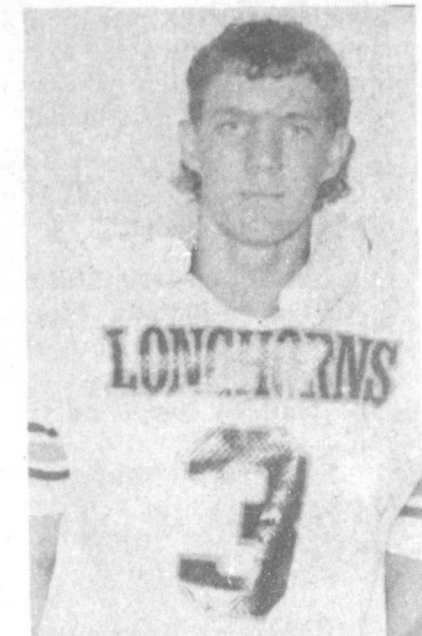
Someone has said that the crane's was one of the wonders of the world.

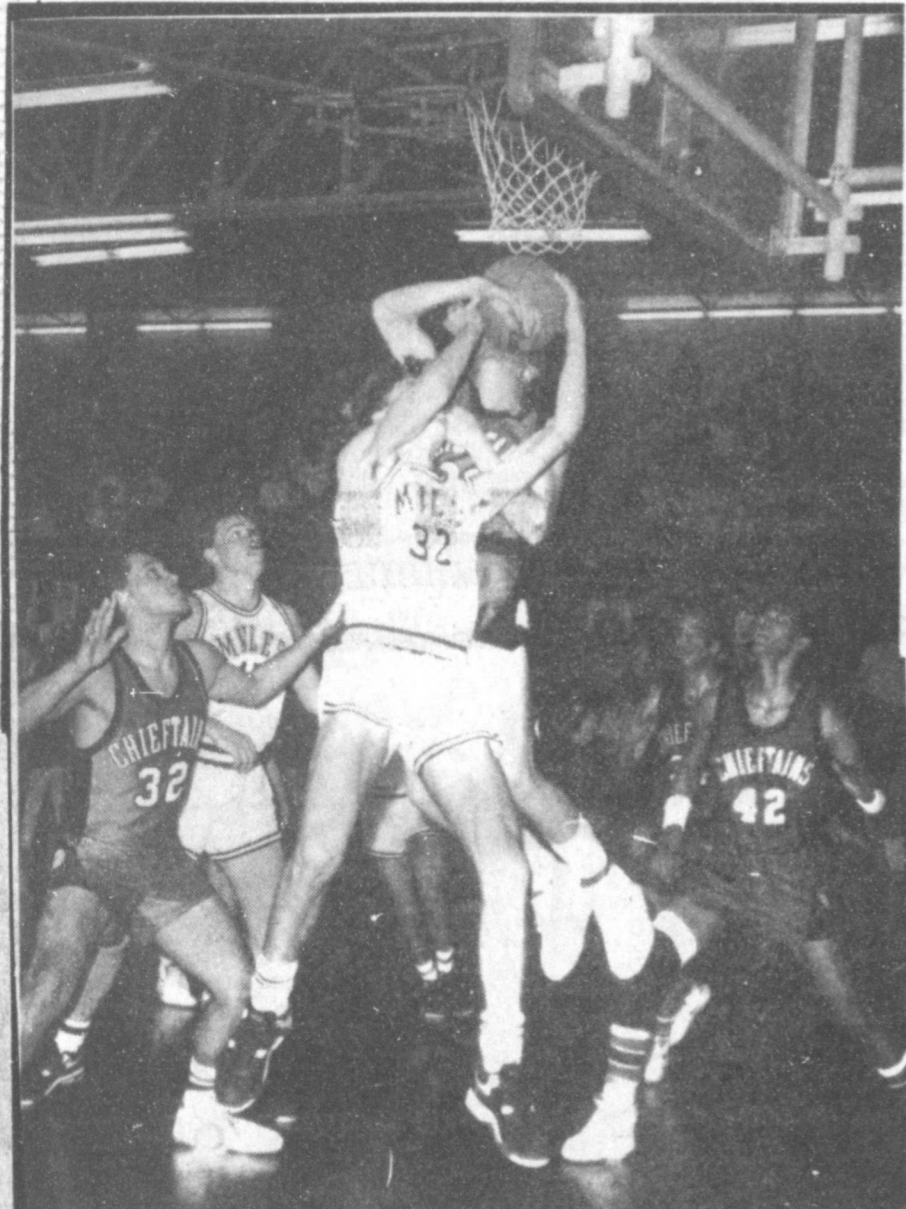

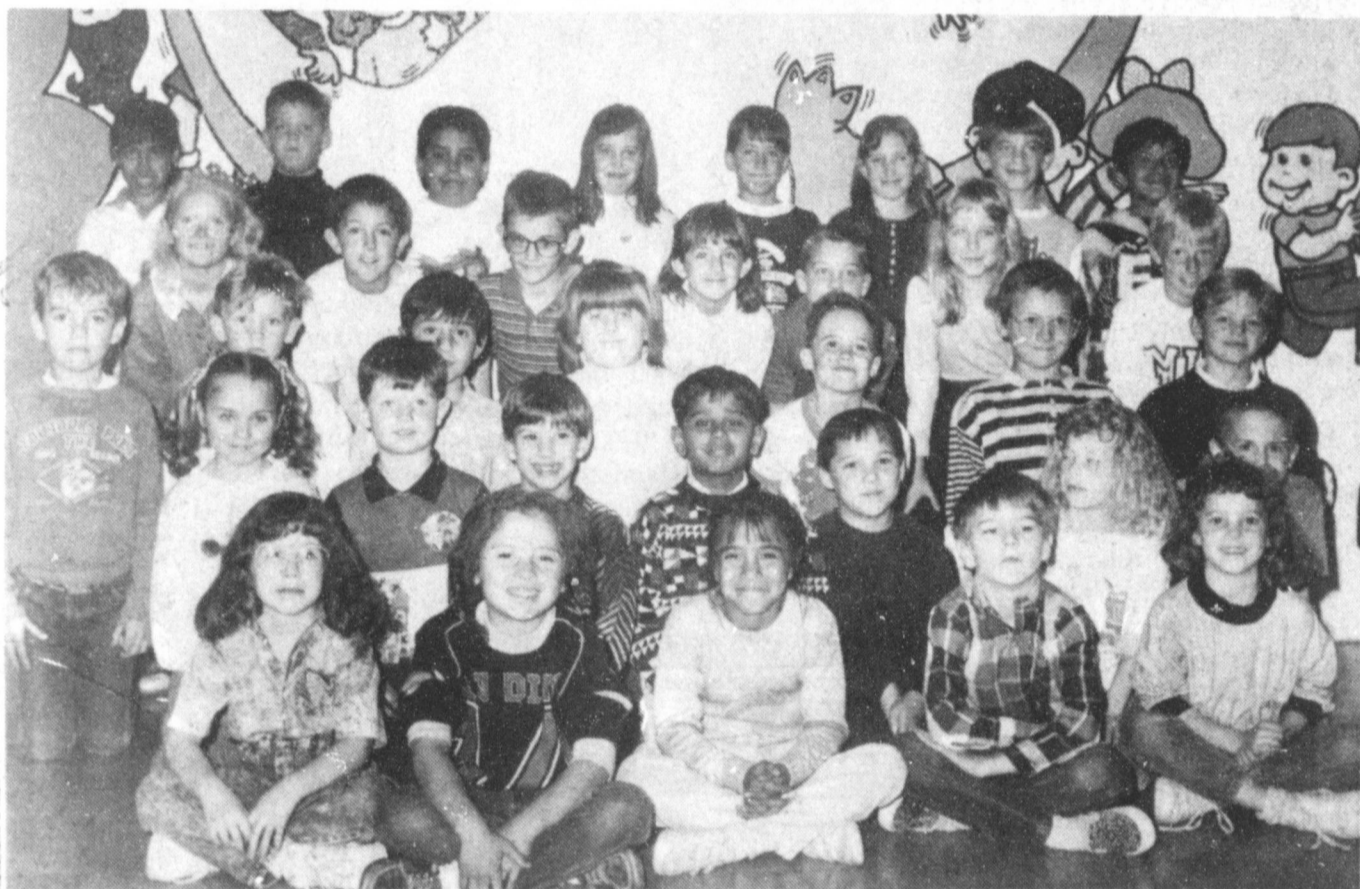

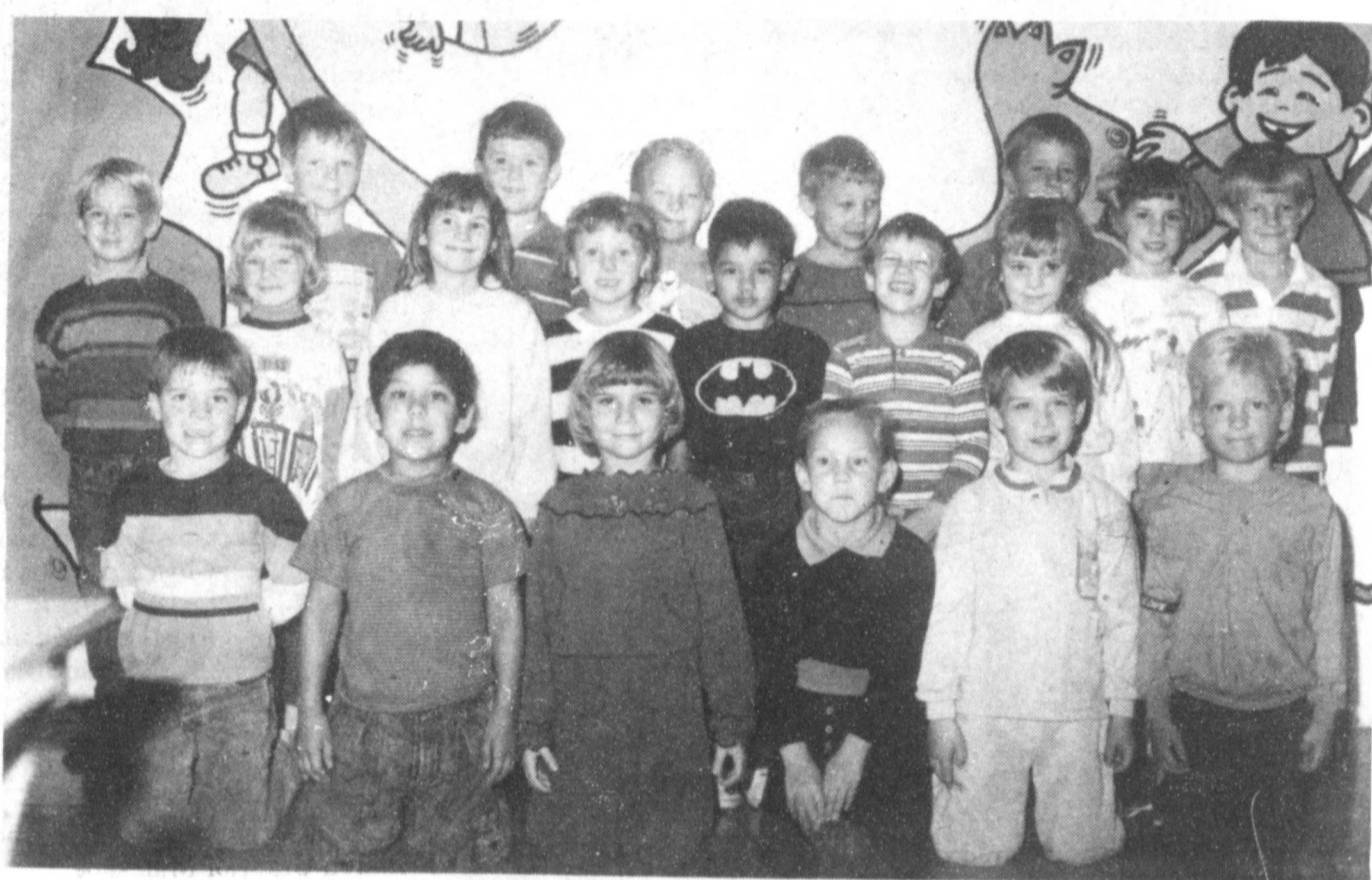
