Tech vs. Texas





Carlen, Raiders set for UT showdown

Raider Head Coach Jim Carlen was short and to the point as he answered questions concerning Saturday's shoot-out between Tech and the University of Texas.

"We are going to have to do everything right and make no mistakes," the Raider boss said. "We know the task that lies ahead and we're ready."

Ready. That's a key word in the world of athletics when the game and the events preceding it are filled with a thing called emotion.

"We have had good, spirited work-outs this week," Carlen said, "and our guys are really looking forward to the game. We know what we have to do and we'll have to do that better than we've ever done before."

On the other hand, the Longhorns will also be ready. "You can take that Miami game and throw it out because it doesn't mean a thing," Carlen

said referring to the Texas' 20-15 loss to the Miami Hurricanes last week. "That Miami game has no bearing on the way Texas will play this week or on this year's conference race."

The Raiders have been working behind locked gates this week and Carlen admits that Tech has its regular share of unusual plays lined up for the game. But, he said, that's not the way to beat the Longhorns.

"To win this game," he said, "we must do what we do well and that's be able to move the football against their defense and hold our own on offense."

The Raider running back corps was bolstered this week with Cliff Hoskins' return to working out in pads. "Cliff is in pads for the second time since last spring," Carlen said, "and we'll just have to see if he can play. He's shown a lot of improvement but he has a way to go."

Hoskins has been suffering from a leg injury suffered during work-outs last spring.

Everyone else in the Raider fold is in top condition, including tailback George Smith and


Rufus Myers, who had been suffering from leg injuries also.

The Raiders will leave Lubbock tonight at 8:30 p.m. instead of the usual charter flights at 5 p.m. "If I could, I'd like to leave Saturday morning," Carlen said. "When you have a night game, that's an awful long time to wait for the game. If it wasn't for the bad weather, we would have left later."

One of the Raiders' major problems will be stopping the Texas wishbone attack, featuring fullback Roosevelt Leaks and company. But Carlen is confident the defense has come around and will do the job.

"I thought we handled the New Mexico wishbone very well," he said. "Our defensive ends played a good game and we'll have to do the same thing against Texas."

Some 12,000 Raider fans are expected to make the trip to Austin, which will include a Tech pep rally on the Capitol grounds before the game. From all indications, the game shapes up to be one they'll be talking about all season.

COACH'S CORNER

Darrell Royal Texas Head Coach

The receptionist in Austin was simply doing her job when she asked for my name and phone number. But the Tech operator was surprised that such measures were taken before someone was allowed to talk to Darrell Royal.

"My gosh, I didn't know this was like getting through to the president," she said.

It is indeed; because if His Eminence Daddy D isn't the president, he's the next thing to it in the eyes of Austin citizens.

The famed Texas coach was remarkably cheerful during the interview despite the fact that his team had all but blown their hopes for a national championship this year, when they lost their season opener to Miami.

"I'm second guessing," said Royal. "But I think we wouldn't have had so many fumbles (eight) against Miami if we had worked out in pads the previous two weeks." The reason why the Horns did not have contact drills, said Royal was because too many players had been injured. One player in particular, Roosevelt Leaks (the scourge of the Southwest Conference last year), had a broken thumb.

What does Texas have to do to

beat Tech?

"Let me answer that question in a general way," said Royal. "I think what we have to do more than anything else to beat any football team is to hold onto the ball. We didn't do that

"Well, I hope there's some similarity in results between this club and the one in 1968," said Royal. "But I don't see any real comparison. Back then the Wishbone was brand new and nobody knew quite how to

good passing attack.

"Ecomet Burley is very quick and strong," said Royal. "And Tech has as good a receiving corps as there is anywhere. When you have guys like Lawrence Williams receiving

"It's still shaky," said Royal. "Miami converted nine- long yardage situations against us and that really hurt."

The Texas coach even had the situations listed: third and six, third and four, third and six, third and six, third and five, third and 14, third and nine, third and eight, and second and 17.

Like many others, Royal believes the conference is stronger this year than last year.

"I think Baylor, Tech, A&M, and SMU are all better than they were last year," said Royal. "And they were pretty good last year."

During the Miami game, Royal sent Billy Schott in to attempt a 52-yard field goal. This was unusual in that Mike Dean is normally called upon to attempt long field goals. Schott just missed the attempt when the ball hit the crossbar and bounced back. Does Royal plan to keep using Schott in these situations?

"I knew I was stretching it a little bit", said Royal. "But Billy had the wind behind him and I thought he might make it. As it turned out, I missed my guess by a yard.

David Knaus

Raider middle guard

Everytime Tech plays Texas, nothing else matters except coming home with a big piece of what you might call that broasted Bevo beefsteak.

The Tech-Texas game is the one that breaks the ice and usually relieves all the tension that builds for the contest. The Raiders, 2-0, go into the Texas game with a tested and tried offensive front that was a question mark at pre-season, but they have proved themselves in the victories over Utah and New Mexico.

The Raiders' defensive front will face its biggest test of the young season, but the middle man in the Tech defense, David Knaus, said that he's confident in the defense for the Texas battle, which will launch the winner into an early lead in the SWC.

Knaus, the 6'3", 230-pound junior, won the starting position at noseguard this fall after having surgery on his knee last spring.

Knaus said, "We are better this week than we were against Utah and that's what we aim to be, to improve each week. We didn't come on like gangbusters against Utah, but we definitely played better against New Mexico. We are going to be even better Saturday."

"I've got complete confidence in our defense right now," Knaus said.

Knaus continued, "We've got a lot of big-play guys on defense, several who come up with the ball when you need it. I'm not that kind of player, I don't think."

David referred to the big-play artist of three years at the noseguard position, All-

American Donald Rives. Knaus said Rives is not as strong as he is but that Rives is a little quicker.

Knaus said, "He's a leader and a big-play maker. He's certainly not as strong or as big as I am. The thing about Rives was that he ran a lot. He could go one way laterally and then change his direction and come back the opposite way to make a tackle."

"I'm trying to be a consistent player," David said, "to play and get the job done every play."

Knaus goes up eyeball to eyeball against the three best offensive linemen the 'Horns have in center Bill Wyman (6'2", 235 pounds), Don Crosslin (6'1", 231 pounds) and Bruce Hebert (5'11", 212 pounds) who is the smallest of the three but like DKR said, "Anyone who plays in the trenches for Texas has at least 200 lbs. of muscle, some good old-fashioned brains, and a few grams of fight."

Wyman and Crosslin were both All-SWC selections in pre-season. Hebert and tackles Bob Tresch (6'4", 235 pounds) and Rick Thurman (6'5", 240 pounds) or Bob Simmons (6'5", 236 pounds) are somewhat inexperienced.

Knaus said, "Those three are probably the best blockers they've got from our scouting report. Wyman is a battler. He's going to be tough and he's one of the quickest men I've been up

against.

David suffered a knee injury in the first week of spring drills and it was bad enough to require surgery, but he said his knee is stronger than it was last year.

Knaus gained around 20 pounds between his freshman and sophomore years, but he said he hasn't lost very much quickness. "I got down to around 225 last week, but I'd like to get up some for Texas, because they are bigger than anybody we've faced."

Knaus said one of the most difficult things to do is closing up the gaps outside. "Sometimes I get too anxious to get around the end instead of protecting the inside," he said.

Knaus and the rest of the Raider defensemen must stop the Wishbone, or is better put as the Akins to Leaks set.

Knaus said, "Leaks is so important to their offense. He goes with it nearly every play; inside, outside, off-tackle. They've got plays where he finds the crease himself. He might start one way and veer all the way back to the crease, and he's good at this."

Knaus said, "Akins is young but he's a good football player. And Leaks — I don't think you can compare him to anybody, not even to Rich Diller of New Mexico who was a good fullback."

David forgot Texas for just a moment to tell about the touch-


down he scored against Utah that came after Gary Bartel's block of a punt.

Knaus said, "We had a rush on and I went through the left-center guard gap which left Gary open outside. Then I ran down the sidelines behind Larry (Hamilton) who was looking up to try and snare the ball before it hit the turf. But, I saw it fall and here came a Utah man too, and it was like a couple of mad-dogs fighting over a bone. But, I

knew I had possession of the ball.

David Knaus knows the tradition behind the Texas domination. He lives down the road a bit in San Antonio. Knaus said, "I just want to win and get back to Lubbock as soon as I can."

Well, Knaus and the Raiders have a good chance to break that tradition Saturday and to come home smelling like some of what you call that there broasted Bevo beefsteak.



Texas defensive line big, quick

Darrel Royal's Texas Longhorns have a defense which gets very angry when an opposing team tries to cross the Orange's last double stripe which leads to paydirt. The Horns get so angry that opposing teams only worked up

Tech put fear into the Longhorns last season as the Red Raiders led for most of three quarters before a pass interference call and two fourth quarter fumbles let the Bevo Boys get away. Tech's point total of twenty was more than any other team scored on Texas last year except for Oklahoma's 27 which was good enough to win.

However, Tech's point total was somewhat misleading in

for the needed touchdown. As a result of Tech's inability to move the ball within the 20 Don Grimes set a Southwest Conference record for four field goals in one game. However, it wasn't enough as Texas won, 25-20.

"If we are going to win," said Dick Rader, Tech offensive back coach, "we are going to have to run at them hard and our line is going to have to whip their front people. They have a big, quick defensive line with a great end in Malcolm Minnick and a great linebacker in Glenn Gaspard. Their other three linebackers are good players also. Texas plays the run with

Tech's other tailback, George Smith, kidded this reporter that he did not want to say anything about Texas. "The last guy from Tech that mouthed off about Texas was a guy named Bruce Dowdy who said that he loved to play Texas because he liked to hit Steve Worster. Texas worked Dowdy over real good in that game and I don't want nothing like that happening to me."

In a more serious vein, Smith said that what Tech would have to do against Texas was move the ball inside. "It's hard to get outside against Texas," said George, "because their ends play so far outside. That end of

hitting, you just get a little gun shy."

Fullback John Garner was already preparing himself mentally for Texas as he was all business in his interview. "All I know," said John, "is that each of us has a job to do and we are going to have to do it. Texas is a good team and it won't make any difference that they lost to Miami."

Myers agreed with Garner that Texas had a real strong team even after the loss to Miami. "I do feel like since Miami beat them then we have a good chance if we get after it enough. It is time that we beat them."

Wyman anchors UT offensive line

Even before the advent of the Wishbone, there was a common phrase to describe the Texas offense—"Three yards and a cloud of dust." And a further indication of Texas offensive thinking was Darrell Royal's statement of the early '60's, which he still adheres to—"Three things can happen to you when you pass...and two of 'em are bad."

Little wonder then why Texas prides itself on the effectiveness of its offensive line. Now that most teams have adjusted their defenses sufficiently to handle the Wishbone, Texas has had to concentrate more and more on the execution of its seven mules up front. Rarely has an All-America team of late not included a Texas lineman. Recently there was Bob McKay and then Jerry Sisemore. This year Longhorn center Bill Wyman is a potential All-America candidate.

"Our offensive line played very well against Miami," said Wyman. "It's just that we couldn't hold onto the ball."

Game films of the Miami contest (which the Horns lost 20-15) will bear Wyman out. One example in particular showed the Texas offensive line opening an enormous hole for running back Joe Aboussie. He looked like he was headed for a certain touchdown—then the ball simply fell (without anyone's assistance) out of his hands and Miami recovered.

"The Miami loss was just one of those

things," said Wyman. "You just have to blow it off and try to do better."

Texas had been chosen as a strong challenger for national championship honors before the Miami game. One might think there has been tremendous damage to the Horns morale since the Miami loss.

"Oh, I think we still have good morale," said Wyman. "Personally, I'm looking forward to the game with Tech."

Wyman sees very little difference between the offensive line this year and the one last year which took the Horns to a Cotton Bowl win over Alabama.

"Of course we lost Sisemore," said Wyman. "And you just can't replace a guy like that, but I think we still are a very solid unit."

Like everybody else, Wyman thinks the Southwest Conference is stronger this year than in 1972.

"Tech is better, so is SMU, and Baylor has a better team this year," said Wyman. "I think the conference champion this year will probably end up with one loss."

Wyman believes that the main thing Texas has to do this week to beat Tech in Austin is to hold onto the ball.

"We've got to be much better in our ballhandling," said Wyman. "And we have to keep blocking the way we did against Miami."

Raider split end

Jeff Jobe is confident Tech can upset the University of Texas Longhorns Saturday as long as the Raiders establish a potent passing game against the Steers.

Jobe, junior letterman from Corsicana, alternates with Calvin Jones at split end, giving the Raiders the most awesome receiving potential in the conference.

Jones is regarded as the speedster of the two while Jobe relies on tremendous hands to give opposing defenders fits.

Miami tore Bevo's secondary to shreds last week in recording what has to be one of the major upsets of the season. Texas had tremendous success stopping the Miami run with such behemoths as Malcom Minick, Sherman Lee, Fred Currin and Doug English guarding the front line, but the secondary was a different story. Texas relies on a cushion type secondary to

prevent the long pass, but it has its shortcomings when it comes to the short passes. Tommy Keel, Bruce Cannon and Jay Arnold are the big names in the secondary, but each has his problems covering certain patterns.

Arnold is a converted defensive end who has the job of covering Jobe Saturday night. Jobe feels that Arnold is a little slow to play in the secondary because he is used to working on the line.

"We might pick on Arnold a little bit because both Calvin and I can beat him on the run," Jobe commented.

Jobe is sure Tech can beat the cushion because Texas doesn't have the secondary speed to keep up with Tech's receivers.

When Jobe isn't running pass routes he is usually blocking on someone and that someone this week will be Arnold or left corner Terry Melancon. Arnold definitely has the blocking edge

because of his size but this doesn't worry the surehanded Jobe.

"My blocking has really improved this season and I think I can block on either Arnold or Melancon with good success," he said.

Alternating with Jones does have some drawbacks in Jobe's opinion because its hard to keep up momentum.

"Its hard to keep up with the play of the game when you aren't out there all the time, but I guess we do have the advantage of being fresh off the bench every other series.

Jobe's favorite patterns are down and outs or curl patterns, or down and ins. He feels that these will work effectively against the Longhorns because of the secondaries' lack of speed.

Jobe is certain the Raiders are really up for the Longhorns and that the term attitude couldn't be better.


"Everyone is ready to play and with Texas losing last week we are even more excited."

Last chance for Barnes, seniors against Longhorns

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is a story by Red Raider senior quarterback Joe Barnes in which he relates his feelings and the feelings of the other seniors as the Tech squad preps for the conference opener against Texas.

For the 19 seniors on the Tech football team, Saturday night is our last chance to beat the Texas Longhorns. We have tried twice, but unsuccessfully in both attempts. This year, the third try will be the charm.

For the first time since I've been at Tech, I personally feel we are more capable of beating Texas than ever before. Coach Carlen and his staff have finally put together a team of athletes who are equal in talent and ability to the Longhorns. All we have to do is execute, eliminate all mistakes and play heads-up, hard-nosed football and we will win the game.

Last year I felt that we should have beaten Texas. We lost 25-20 due to three costly errors in the fourth period. We gave them 10 easy points due to our mistakes. We moved the ball up and down the field all night, but once we got inside the 20-yard line, Texas came up with the big play and we had to settle for four field goals rather than four

touchdowns. We finally got a touchdown, but it came too late — only eight seconds remained in the game.

This year we are going to Austin with a lot of things going for us. We have an experienced, mature and undefeated team. We know that Texas can be beaten because Miami proved it last week. We should not have any psychological or mental blocks working against us.






UT sports editor picks 'Horns by five

Buck Harvey was cautious as he discussed what the University of Texas would have to do Saturday against Tech to rebound from their opening game loss to Miami.

"Sure we (Texas) had lots of fumbles," said Harvey, the sports editor of the Daily Texan, the University of Texas student newspaper. "But Miami fumbled once on our ten and also threw an interception in our end zone so the turnovers were really pretty balanced."

Harvey rated the Longhorns a five-point favorite over the Raiders in Saturday's clash but added that Texas would have to

hang on to the ball if they want to win.

"We fumbled eight times against Miami and lost," he said. You look at SMU who fumbled seven times against Oregon State and they still won so you can't really blame our loss all on fumbles. We rushed for over 300 yards but every time we would get close, we would make a mistake and it would put an end to our drive."

As for the Texas team as a whole, Harvey said he felt that some phases of the Longhorn game were better than last year's offerings.

"Our offense looks much improved this season," he said.

"It's still the same basic wishbone offense that Texas has been running for years, but I think we have better runners this year than we've ever had and they really make the offense go.

"Marty Akins has been a big improvement at quarterback. It's really too early to say that he is better than Alan Lowry was, but he definitely runs the wishbone offense better. Roosevelt Leaks is his same old self and Tommy Landry and Joey Aboussie have done a good job. Now if they can only hold on to the ball."

As for the defense, Harvey cited the main problem against Miami as being one of aggressiveness. "Our guys admitted after the game that they didn't play an aggressive defensive game," Harvey said. "There were a lot of people standing around on defense."

The Texas defense has been changed slightly this season. Instead of being so conscious of the run, the 'Horn linebackers have been dropping back to help with pass defense.

"Passing is the place where people hurt us last year," Harvey said. "so this year the

linebackers are dropping off to try and shut-down some of the passing lanes."

Harvey, in picking the Longhorns to win the game by five points, stressed the fact that it should be a great game. "There will be 81,000 people at the game," he said, "and I don't think they will go away disappointed for not having seen a good game. I'm picking Texas but in order for them to win, they will have to keep from fumbling the ball and be able to move against the Tech defense."
