## Cotton Burr Feed Tried With Cattle

 Cattle eating cotton burrs?To the uninformed this does sound improbable, but W. L, Stangel, dean of agriculture, tells of an
experiment that started today where beef breeding cattle will be ively.
This experiment on wintering breeding cattle will be in three divisions. One lot of cattle will be
fed cotton burrs plus a protein fed cotton burrs plus a protein
supplement, another will be fed cotton burrs silage plus a protein supplement, and the third group pounds of molasses. The protein supplement consists of one pound of meal and one pound of alfalfa The cattle will be weighed at the beginning of the experiment, and then will be weighed again in 21 days, James Barr, senior animal husbandry major from Ball
