

Adams Resigns Speaker At Retreat

Under Fire

Monday Night

WASHINGTON (AP)-Sherman Adams resigned under fire Monday night as President Elsenhower's top assistant.

The former New Hampshire governor said that he has been beseiged by "a campaign of villification" by those seeking to remove him from public life and it is clear these efforts "have been intended to destroy me and in soding to embarrase the administration and the President of the United States"

ADAMS ANNOUNCED his decision to get out of the second highest job in the White House in a dramatic nationwide television-radio appearance. He said his action is "final and unqualified, it is not open to reconsideration."

Elsenhower accepted the resignation is the disclosure last June that Adams accepted costly gifts and favors from wealthy Boston industrialist Bernard Goldfine while Goldfine was in difficulty with two federal agencies.
