### Solon Asks **Tuition Hike**

A bill was introduced into the A bill was introduced into the Texas House of Representatives Friday to increase tuition in state colleges and universities from \$50 to \$100 per semester, the Associated Press reported Friday night.

House Resolution 933, calling for the tuition increase was in-troduced by Rep. McGregor of Waco.

Vaco. Out of state students would pay \$250 a semester. The tuition hike would go into effect, if the bill were enacted into law, on Sept. 1, 1961.

No information was available late Friday as to whether the bill had yet been assigned to committee by House Speaker James Turman.

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



