NTSC Asks Name Change

It seems that Texas Tech and Texas A&M are not the only schools in the state considering a name change.

A bill proposing that North Texas State College be changed to the University of North Texas has been referred to the Committee of Education in the Texas House of Representatives.

In a telephone interview with The Toreador Friday, Paul Recer, editor of the Campus Chat, student newspaper at North Texas, said that the student body seemed to be enthusiastic about the proposed change.

Recer also said that the student government has appealed to the student body to write their representatives urging them to pass the bill.

"The President of the college has expected the change to occur, considering the facilities of the college, and in effect seems very pleased that the bill is before the House," said Recer. However, he pointed out that the President had made no official statement.

Commenting further on the reasons for the support of the name change, he said there are several state-supported universities in Texas that are smaller and that do not have the facilities that North Texas has, yet North Texas is still called a college.

He said that the alumni of the college had been pressing for the change for some time. He also said that the faculty and administration are supporting it.

According to Recer, this is not the first time a name change has been proposed at North Texas. In 1946, a bill was presented to the House, but it was killed.

When asked if the Campus Chat was taking a stand on the issue, Recer said, "Yes, but it is more of an 'it's about time' stand".

To Resemble Conventions

Political Rally Adds Color To Campaign For Campus Posts

Lubbock's Municipal Auditorium will take on all the color and excitement of a national political convention at 7 p.m. Tuesday when all candidates for campus offices participate in Texas Tech's first election rally of its kind.

Candidates for executive offices will be officially nominated and will personally appeal to student voters with campaign speeches.

Cheerleader candidates are planning outdoor activities in addition to yells and speeches for the program. A group from the Tech band may also play, according to Janis Jones, elections committee chairman and Student Assn. Secretary.

At approximately 6 p.m., cheerleader skits, talent shows and other booth activities will begin outside the Auditorium entrance.

At 7 p.m. Miss Jones will open the indoor rally with a welcome, followed by the invocation by Bill Dean. Pete Baker will introduce candidates, beginning with the office of the business manager and followed by the secretary, vice president and president.

Candidates for business manager and secretary will have four minutes to speak and those for vice president and president five minutes. Two-minute floor demonstrations may follow speeches made by executive office seekers.

Candidates for Council representatives will be introduced as they walk across the stage, Miss Jones said. Cheerleader candidates are divided into four groups, each of which will campaign for five minutes. Each group will lead at least one yell. They will conclude the Election Rally.

Immediately following the election program Red Raider fans will boost the Southwest Conference champs with a pep rally prior to their trip to the NCAA basketball playoffs in Lawrence, Kansas, Wednesday.

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Noon Forum Fires Queries At Editors

Faculty and students fired questions at three Toreador editors Friday in the Friday Noon Forum.

The forum, moderated by Franz Helbig, discussed the topic, "The Effectiveness of the Toreador." The staff members on the panel were Ralph W. Carpenter, editor; Preston Maynard, managing edi-

tor; and Carolyn Jenkins, news editor.

Soon after the discussion opened, a faculty member raised the question of how Toreador effectiveness was measured. Carpenter answered that the effectiveness was largely measured through advancements on campus as a result of editorial stands.

To this, a student asked, "Do you judge effectiveness by editorial stands alone?" Maynard explained that several factors must be considered in determining the overall effectiveness of the Toreador, such as readership, advertising and news coverage.

To the question of whether all the Toreador staff members are journalism members, Miss Jenkins answered yes, that there is seldom voluntary help from other than journalism majors.

Other subjects touched on were the presence of only one regular editorial column which several persons present termed as expressing only a conservative political philosophy (Just Some Gab by Jack Gibson), the necessity of all Toreador staff members being journalism majors (Why shouldn't students untrained in journalism be allowed to write for the paper?), the absence of editorial stands and articles on certain nation-wide controversial subjects and the purposes of the Toreador.

The next Friday Noon Forum will feature Kenneth Kinnamon, a Tech English teacher, in a discussion of the Texas senatorial race. The forums are from noon to 1 p. m. in the Anniversary Room of the Tech Union. Reservations must be made for meals served at the forum.

Solon Asks Tuition Hike

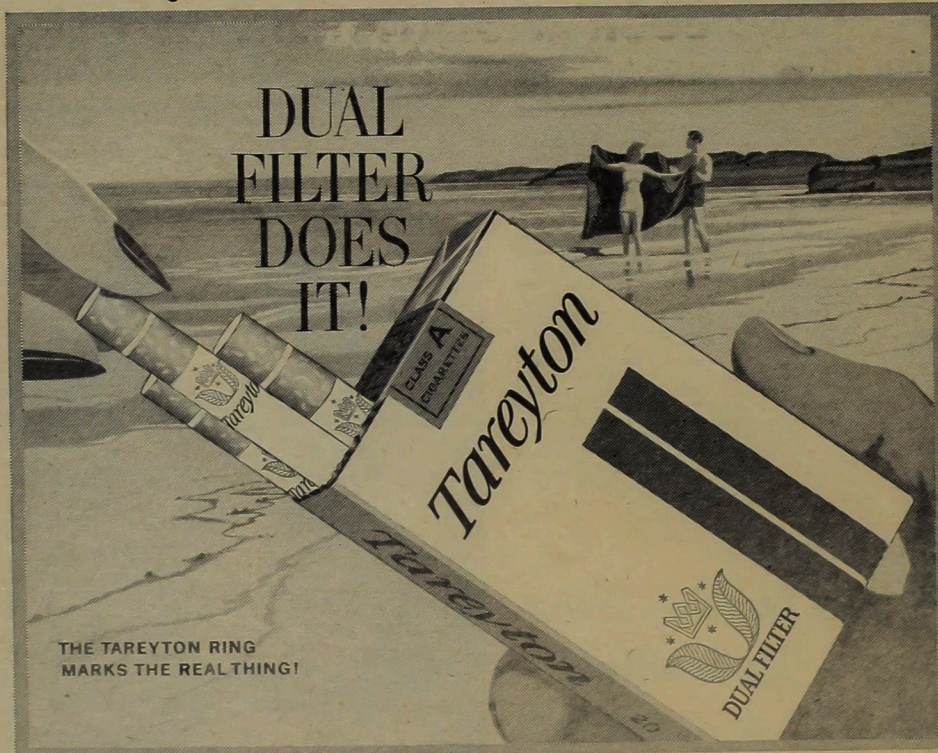
A bill was introduced into the Texas House of Representatives Friday to increase tuition in state colleges and universities from \$50 to \$100 per semester, the Associated Press reported Friday night.

House Resolution 933, calling for the tuition increase was introduced by Rep. McGregor of Waco.

Out of state students would pay \$250 a semester. The tuition hike would go into effect, if the bill were enacted into law, on Sept. 1, 1961.

No information was available late Friday as to whether the bill had yet been assigned to committee by House Speaker James Turman.

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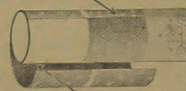

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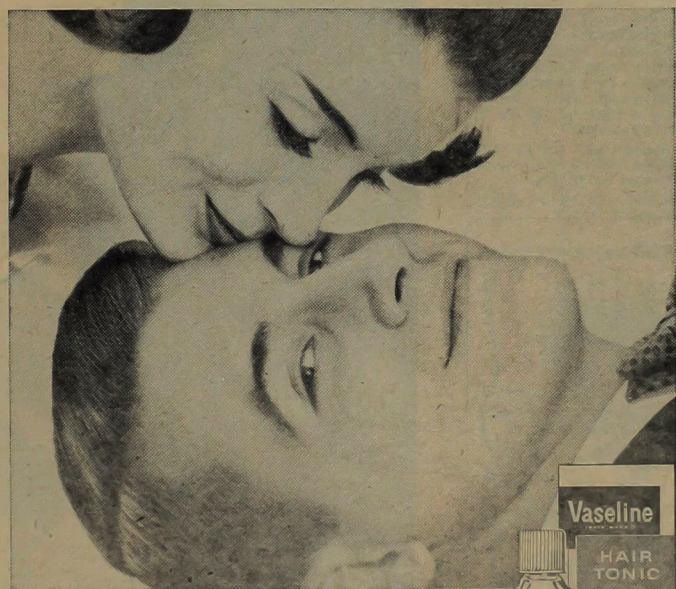
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Diamond Nine Wins Two Games Friday

Coach Berl Huffman's eager baseballers opened the 1961 season with a pair of identical 3-2 wins over Highlands University Friday at the Mackenzie Ball Park.

The Raider nine had to come from behind the long way in the second contest, tying the Highlanders in the last regulation inning and sending the tilt into two extra frames.

THE OPENING game was almost devoid of hits with each club clearing two safeties. Both of the Raider hits came in the game-winning third.

With the score knotted at one-all, Tech hurler Mike Bromley led off the big inning with a single, the first Raider hit of the season. Second baseman Dennis Willett followed the pattern with another one-bagger, sending Bromley to third. Highland pitcher Oso Balli dropped Dave Gibbons' infield hit, scoring Bromley and sending Willett on to third. Willett tallied the second run of the inning, the third of the game, on a fielder's choice by George Gibson.

HIGHLAND scored its initial run in the second, on a walk and a double, and the other in the sixth, on a walk and a fielder's choice.

Bromley started on the mound for the Raiders and was relieved in the seventh by Joe Barlow. Oso Balli started for Highland, with Sanco Mayo coming in the third.

Tech jumped ahead by a run in the opening frame of the second game. Willett got on via an error by the rightfielder. Gibbons grounded out and then Bill Dean and Gibson walked back to back. Darwin Hilliard grounded out to short, with Willett scoring on the play. Sam Gipson went out second to first to end the inning.

THE VISITORS went ahead in their half of the second. With two out, Tech's Roger Evans issued free passes to Jerry Thompson and Sam Baczewski. Both runners scored on a triple off the bat of Humberto Gonzales.

The Raiders sent the tilt into extra innings with a single run in the bottom of the seventh.

Cagle Davis led off the Raider

rally with a booming double off the left field fence. Dean Horton made it one away, popping out on an attempted sacrifice. Bill Easterwood, pinch hitting for Ramey Brandon, got a base on balls, and Bromley came in to run for Easterwood. Willett was safe on a miscue b the second bager and Davis came in on the play with the tying run.

THE GAME would have terminated in that inning had Dean walked in the third run. With the bases loaded and two out, Dean was apparently hit by the ball. However the official ruled that the ball hit the Raider's bat, running the count to two strikes. Dean fanned the air on the third offering, giving the Highlanders another chance.

Not until the ninth did the Raiders finally garner the win. Gibson singled in Dean from second for the victory.

The Tech nine will attempt to extend its winning streak when the same clubs meet again today at Hodges Park in another double-header, beginning at 1:30.

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
