## NTSC Asks <br> Name Change

It seems that Texas Tech and Texas A\&M are not the only schools in the state considering a name change.

A bill proposing that North Texas State College be changed to the University of North Texas has been referred to the Committee of EduIn a telephone interview with The Torendor Friday, Paul Recer, editor of the Campus Chat Friday, Paul Recer, editor of the Campus Chat, student body seemed to be enthusiastic about the proposed change.

Recer also said that the student government has appealed to the student body to write their representatives urging them to pass the bill.
"The President of the college has expeeted the change to occur, considering the facilities of the college, and in effect seems very pleased that the bill is before the House," sald Recer. However, he pointed out that the President had made no iofficial statement.

Commenting further on the reasons for the support of the name change, he said there are are smaller and that do not have the facilities that North Texas has, yet North Texas is stlll called a college

He sald that the alumni of the college had been pressuring for the change for some time. He also said that the faculty and administration are supporting it.
