The court, whose justices are appointed from the student body, summons to appear those students who re-
ceive a ticket for a traffic or parking offense on the campus. Violators are warned and told what the court can do about repeated offenses.

Students who receive tickets a second time are again warned of the course which the court can follow concerning repeaters.
On the third ticket, the court is empowered to refer the case to the Disciplinary committee, which may banish the three-time loser's car from the campus or insist that it be sent home.

Last year many of those summoned to tell their stories to the court chose to ignore the summons. Since traffic problems seem to be increasing for Tech, the court will surely not be as lenient as it was on such students.

Cooperation from the student body will make it unnecessary for the court to demonstrate the powers it has been granted.
