City commissioners have called an elec-tion for Dec. 11 to decide if propertied vot-ers of the municipality wish to approve \$50,000 in bonds to finance costs of opening Fourth Street.

If the City can perform this requirement for the amount, it will be a good invest-ment. The street, we have said repeatedly, is a necessity not in its own right but as a pivot for an extensive expansion of the U.S. 80 system.

The City does not have the available firances for current operations and for a capital investment such as this. Hence, if the project is to be realized, it is almost imperative that the bonds get an affirma-

We can imagine that this is hardly the most propitious time to attempt to float a bond for public improvements, but there are seldom times that satisfy all the elements of convenience. Moreover, conditions at a given moment should not always govern the decision upon an issue, for these are amortised over many years and eco-nomic conditions tend to level out. Over the long haul, we have no doubt that the City can conveniently handle the repay-ment without creating any serious budget-

ary problems.

Assuming that the public will approve the bonds, and that both City and Howard County will quickly complete all right-ofway obligations, it seems to us that some thinking ought to be projected to the uiti-mate plan for the highway through the

When Denounced, Individuals Should Have Right To Defense

WASHINGTON - A deepseated conviction for fair play and decency in human relations is one of the underlying traits of President Eisenhower's character. It es out again and again in the warm and impulsive remarks he makes both in press conferences and on more formal oc-

That impulse was evident in his brief talk to the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith when the President was given the League's Democratic Legacy award. He said that every man should have the right to face his accuser. No one, said the President, can hide in the shadows while practicing character assassination.

Those simple words could re related di-

rectly to many of the disturbing aspects of the current compulsive search for to-tal security in an insecure world. But the members of his staff who, as the President pointed out, had so thoroughly briefed him for his talk believe he had one par-ticular instance in mind as he spoke. That was the case of Lieutenant Milo J. Madulovich of the Air Force Reserve who had been found on the base of a record full of anonymous accusation to be a se-

full of annual curity risk.

The President had personally concerned himself with the Radulovich case. The final responsibility rested on Secretary of final responsibility rested on Secretary of the Concerned of hower wanted to make sure that

the young reserve officer got fair play. Secretary Talbott has now found that Radulovich is not a security risk. He over-Radulovich is not a security risk. He over-ruled the findings of an Air Force board that held the young officer a security risk because of continuing association with his father and sister who were in turn alleged to have had Communist associations. Ra-dulovch denied under oath he had been influenced ideologically either by the sis-ter or the father.

ter or the father. The charge seemed to many equivalent The case attracted wide attention after Radulovich hired lawyers to fight publicly to retain his status, Talbott has shown common sense and—in the context of our troubled time—courage in finding for the accused officer. Investigation of the father's background did not warrant the accusations made anonymously against him. They seem to have grown out of a bitter partisan quarrel within the eider Radulo-vich's trade union in Detroit.

In many ways the Radulovich case ildustrates the dilemma of the day. Within the Air Force it has been said that if the sel and carried the case to the public in a somewhat spectacular fashion, the Air Force board might not have felt under necessity to defend the case originally

But if such a fight had not been made it is conceivable that the whole matter might have been considered behind closed doors as routine with the issue concluded on the side of caution. That would have derstandable in view of the grow ing timidity in the Executive branch of government before the loud political exploitation of the Communists-in govern-

This, in the view of one observer, is the essence of the matter—the right to a defense. It is all very well to say, as Air Force officers have said, that separation from the service for security ground foes not mean conviction for a crime. But in the times in which we are living it tends, if there is any publicity, to be equivalent to the stigma attaching to a criminal conviction.

In sometimes angry letters this observer is accused of "defending" this or that accused person. There is a dangerous confusion here. In instance after instance I have not "defended" the individual question. I have insisted again and again on the right of the accused to a defense under the historic process of law built up so painstakingly over the centuries.

True, the Communists repeatedly abuse the privileges as they did in their outis conduct in the trial of the 11 top party leaders. True, they are part of a secret conspiracy. But if we resort to their technique of guilt by denunciation, then we have lost one of the great foundation stones on which our strength to resist communism is based. This concern inherent in the recent statement of the Roman Catholic bishops who reaffirmed "the essential dignity of man . . .

the rights which flow from it."

It must become more and more the concern of all Americans not blinded by prejudice. If hatreds are allowed to destroy fundamental freedoms under law. then we will have sown the whirlwind and no man will be safe. As a fair-minded citizen, the President himself must be increasingly aware of this danger.

Some years ago, the wife of a former British prime minister, Ramsay MacDondying. She called her husband to ber bedside because there was a message she felt she must leave with him before he died. And these were her words: Whatever else you do, put romance and enthusiasm into the lives of our children."

I think that this is one of the wisest deathbed statements I have ever read, for what greater inheritance could any mother pass on than to give her children the romance of living and cager enthuslasm for life itself.

Are you an enthusiastic person? Do.you constantly feel a sense of dynamic energy throughout your entire being? Do you get a tremendous thrill from living? If you must honestly say, "No," in response to any of these questions, God help you, for no one is fully realizing his

possibilities who does not have his share of enthusiasm. Shortly after Sir Edward Appleton, of the University of Edinburgh in Scotland. was awarded the Nobel Prize for his work in physics, he was asked his secret of success. He told the interviewer he could

enswer-in only one word: "Enthusiasm." And he added, "I would put enthusiasm above professional skill." When the president of a great American railroad was asked a similar question. he replied, "The greatest asset that any man in business can possess is enthusiasm.

If you have two men, one with more intual equipment and better train than the other; if the other has more enthusiasm, he will outdistance the first." Yale's late great Professor William Lyon Phelps used to lecture to audiences of school teachers on "The Excitement of Teaching." I once commented to him that

The Bible tells us, "In Him we live, and move, and have our being." So the secret of enthusiasm is to get into contact with the flow of Divine energy and creative power which comes from God. Don't cut yourself off from it. Instead, get your self in tune with the vibratory forces of the universe, become possessed by the powerful force that flows from God.
