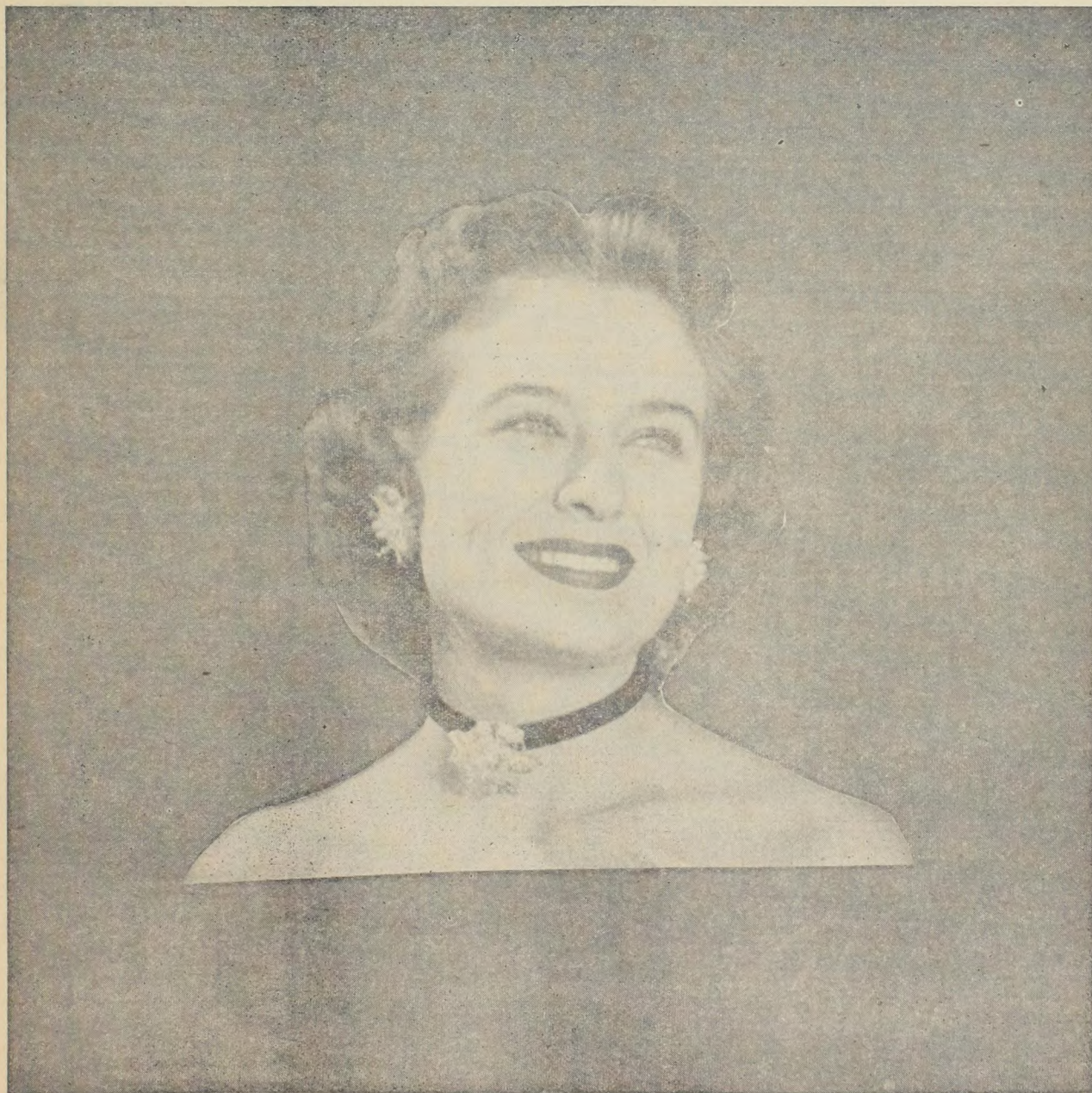

#### Five Linemen Cut From Baylor Squad

Five members of Baylor University's football team, including the entire center of the famed Baylor line were kicked off the squad for breaking training rules.

"The Baylor Lariat" reports that Coach George Sauer has expelled from the team center Jim Taylor, guard Dan Miller, and guard Dugan Pierce. Taylor, Miller and Pierce were members of the first string varsity team and had played in most of Baylor's games this year. The other two players losing their athletic scholarships were Jimmy Davenport and Paul Carver.

Sauer indicated that the "latest instance of rules infringement occurred in the early morning hours Saturday prior to the A&M-Baylor game."

Although the five are technically still in the school, they can never play on a Baylor football team again, nor can they ever play for another Southwest Conference team.

And at Texas A&M two students have been suspended, one for theft and the other for unauthorized command of freshmen after taps. Both suspensions will remain in effect for the remainder of the school year.

Seventeen sophomores in the Aggie Band were campused until the end of the semester and placed on probation for the remainder of the year for marching down the quadrangle of the East Area at 3 a.m. playing "Texas Fight."

Excessive class cutting is now history at Davis and Elkins College in West Virginia. According to a new rule, upperclassmen are to be assessed a \$1 fine for each cut over the specified amount of cuts allowed. Freshmen aren't even considered. They may take only the regular amount of cuts, and if they insist on taking more than are allowed, they may be dropped from the roll any time the professor desires — with a final grade of F.

"The Missouri Miner" has listed the ten commandments of the ROTC.

Sandra Shook is Texas Tech's Second Homecoming Queen.

The 21-year-old beauty will be crowned tonight at ceremonies preceding a giant pep rally and bonfire scheduled to kick off the Homecoming Celebration.

Miss Shook, who adds this title to those of 1955 Gator Bowl Queen, 1953 Tech Beauty, and runner-up for South Plains Maid of Cotton in 1954, won over four other nominees selected by the Double T Association Sunday.

The other finalists will act as Attendants to the Queen during her coronation tonight and at halftime at the Tech - Arizona football game tomorrow.

They are: Doris Wampler, junior from Clovis, N. M.; Eva Garza, junior from Kermit; Jimmie Faye Maxwell, senior from El Paso; and Shirley DuPriest, junior from Waco.

This year's election of the Queen by the Student Body was a departure from the method by which the first Queen was selected last year. The 1954 beauty was chosen by the Double T Association. This year, the Association trimmed the field of 17 nominees to the five finalists, but the students were the final judges.

Miss Shook was one of the five finalists for last year's Homecoming Queen. She is music education major, a member of Kappa Alpha Theta social sorority, Mu Phi Epsilon honorary music fraternity, and Future Teachers of America.

She was elected to the Student Council last year and is song

leader and social chairman of KAT. She is also representative to the Association of Women Students for Mu Phi Epsilon and a member of the Tech Choir.

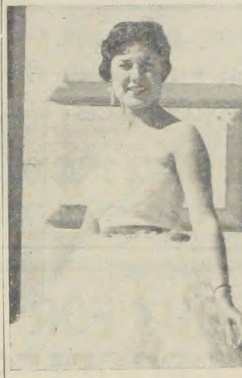
Awards will be made at 10 p.m. tomorrow during intermission at the student dance in the Union ballroom.

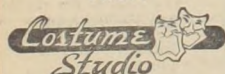
## BONFIRE SET EARLY; OUTHOUSE IS LOST

### Debate To Feature 'Selective Enrollment'

Should Texas Tech adopt a program of selective enrollments in 1956?

This question will be the subject of an Oxford-style debate at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the Ballroom lounge.

Boone Brackett, pre-med major, and Richard Bell, government student, who are both sophomores from Lubbock, will make up the affirmative team.

Willis Taylor, freshman and Craig Austin, sophomore, both government students from Lubbock will debate the negative side of the question. Jo Ann Addison, Denver City junior, will serve as moderator.

This question was chosen, according to Wendell Roberts for several reasons. The University of Texas has found it necessary to restrict enrollments there to those persons who attain a minimum score on college aptitude tests; otherwise, enrollment would greatly exceed facilities, both in the physical plant and in the staff.

Texas Tech, with its booming enrollment, is even now facing the same problem. Should Tech continue to permit wholesale enrollments at the price of quality in its graduates? Or, has Tech the moral and legal obligation to provide a

college education for any student who desires it?

Thus a fundamental conflict between two diametrically opposed schools of thought in higher education is inherent in the question to be debated.

All members of the student body and faculty are invited to attend and see both sides of the question. Also, in an Oxford-style debate, members of the audience may question as well as give their own opinions to the debaters.

Each debater will have eight minutes to develop his constructive argument, and each will have four minutes for rebuttal. A thirty-minute question-and-answer period will follow.

Over 200 Tech students turned out for the first Oxford-style debate last spring when the topic "Resolved: Texas Tech should admit Negro students in 1956" was heatedly debated, said Roberts, who is chairman of the Union lectures and debates committee.

Oxford-style debates originated with the Oxford Debating Society at Oxford University, England. Dr. Henry J. Shine, assistant professor of chemistry at Tech, has attended many of the debates at Oxford. Each Friday night, all other school activities come to a

halt, and the debating hall is always filled to capacity, he says.

Dr. Shine pointed out that the Oxford Debating Society has, on occasion, caused international scandals. In fact the society once censured by the English Government for debating the question "Resolved: England should never participate in another war."

Mussolini thought so much of student opinion in England that he was encouraged to go ahead with his invasion of Abyssinia, he was so sure England would not interfere.

Sure enough, England did not interfere, and the invasion was successful. The Oxford Debating Society brought the wrath of the English Government down upon its head, Dr. Shine concluded.

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# Schlinkman, Cavazos Top Ex-Raiders

Walter Schlinkman, the former flash from Dumas and Kingsville's Bobby Cavazos have set more individual records than any other Tech player.

The Tech fullback tore Creighton apart for 206 yards in 27 carries to lead Tech ball carriers for one game. Schlinkman, an ex-Green Bay Packer star also leads in yards gained rushing in one season with 871 in 1945.

Bobby Cavazos, a 1953 star

scored 80 points in one season to help the Raiders into the Gator Bowl, and set a record. The Kingsville star also leads in total career rushing with 2278 yards from 1951-1953.

Cavazos scored four touchdowns against Arizona to tie with G. C. Dowell, Charlie Calhoun, and Elmer Tarbox for the most touchdowns in one game: four.

Gene Barnett, Tech's Cotton Bowl star, completed eight of 24 passing attempts for 175 yards against St. Mary's on that historic

day in 1939 to set a Tech passing record. The season passing record was set by Freddie Brown in 1947. Brown completed 57 of 117 throws.

Tarbox, intercepted 11 passes in 1938 for the pass interception record. He also returned an interception in 1937 for 90 yards to lead in that department.

Present Raider, Jack Kirkpatrick honored West Texas State and Tulsa in the same year by returning kickoffs of 100 yards against them in 1953.



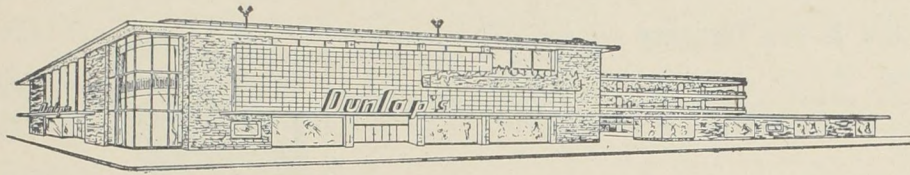

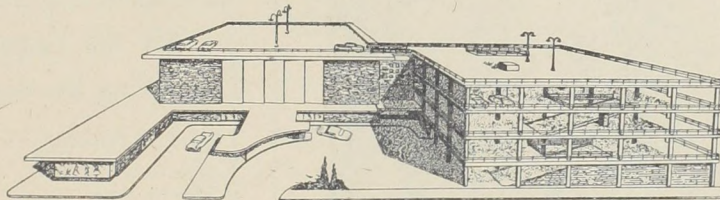

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# Tech, Arizona Meet Saturday

With a full house of old grads and exes looking on, the Texas Tech Red Raiders will be out to capture a Homecoming victory over the University of Arizona Wildcats at 2 p.m. Saturday in Jones Stadium.

The Border Conference clash will be the highlighting event of two full days of activities honoring alumni of Tech.

Threatening to steal the thunder from the Raiders and Tech's special activities will be the nation's total offense leader, Art Luppino.

Luppino, last year's leading scorer in the nation and this year's top ground gainer in the Border Conference, will be only one threat to the Raiders.

Another will be quarterback Skip Corley who is one of the conference's leading passers, in second place. Nationally, he holds down the number 18 position.

Two all-conference linemen, guard Ed Brown and center Paul

Hatcher bolster the Wildcat attack.

In spite of their big guns, the Cats will not bring an impressive record into the battle. Arizona has beaten Colorado A&M, and Idaho. Losses have been to Colorado, Oregon, and Texas Western. West Texas and Arizona played to a 20-20 tie to complete the record.

On the opposite side of the ledger, Tech's record isn't particularly expected to scare many future opponents. The Raiders have won three, lost two, and tied one. In Border Conference competition they own a win over West Texas

and a tie with potent Texas Western.

Numerically, at least, the Weavermen should be at their strongest since the opening victory over the University of Texas. All-conference performers Jim Sides and Jerry Walker will be ready for the game. Both saw limited activity in last weekend's contest with WT.

The only two doubtful participants are end Don Waygood and halfback M. C. Northam. Both have received minor injuries in this week's practice that could slow them up for the game. If Waygood doesn't start the call will be sent Bobby Young.

The Wildcats will be seeking their second victory over Tech. Back in 1935 the Wildcats won 7-6 for their first and only victory. However, Tech has a long lead in the overall series. The Raiders have won 14 times, lost one and tied one.

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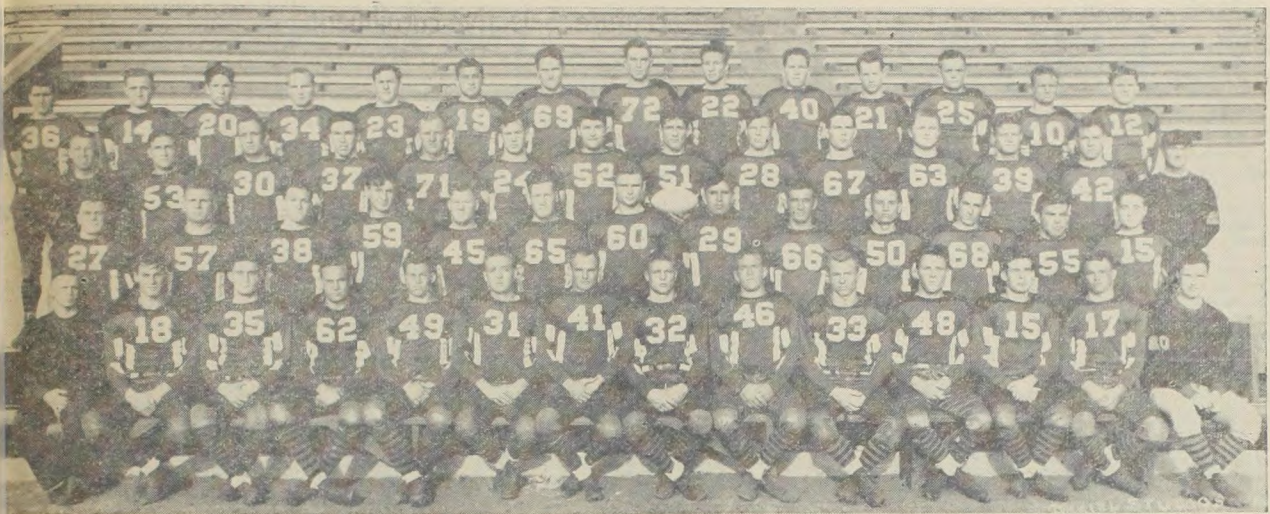

# Exes Will Remember Great 1938 Team

"We should be a little stronger than we were last year, but we've got a tougher 'schedule' were the words of Coach Pete Cawthon, head mentor of the Red Raiders before the 1938 grid season.

Coach Cawthon's words soon became the understatement of 1938. All his team did was charge through 10 opponents unbeaten and roar into the Cotton Bowl before bowing to St. Mary's College on New Year's Day 1939.

Before 42,000 fans the amazing Raiders fell to the heavier Gaels 20-13. Battling back, Tech scored all of its 13 points with only 11 minutes remaining. Elmer Tarbox and E. J. McKnight scored the touchdowns. Joe Marek got the PAT.

The Red Raiders were the nation's leading scoring team. They scored 274 points in the regular season while giving up only 35. The team ranked 11th in the nation.

Tarbox, halfback, was named as the most valuable and most popular player in the Southwest. A poll held by a cereal company and

Texas State Network provided him with this honor. Tarbox was also named on the All-Southwest grid team.

Davis, Tarbox, and Gene Barnett were named honorable mention All-America.

Highly-regarded Montana State opened the season on Sept. 18. The Raiders routed the Bobcats 35-0 before 7,500. Calhoun, Webb, Barnett, Latch, and Tarbox each scored touchdowns. Guzick who was injured in the contest, kicked two PAT's and Marek and Flusche kicked one each. Webb caught a pass from Barnett for the extra point.

The next Saturday with Bull Rankin at quarterback Tech rolled over Wyoming's Cowboys 39-0. Rankin had two TD's and Holmes, Calhoun, Scott and Atkins had one each. Marek had two placements and Flusche had one.

Thirty Red Raiders arrived in Buffalo, N. Y. the following week for a game with Duquesne University. In a battle of defenses Tech came out on the long end of a 7-6 score. Barnett passed to Webb for six points. Marek converted for the victory.

Back home again Tech handed Oklahoma City U. a 60-0 defeat before 7,000 with reserves seeing considerable action. Rankin scored three touchdowns. Marek, Holmes, Balfanz, Hill, McKnight, and Akins were other scorers. Balfanz kicked three placements. Marek, McKnight, and Ramsey got the three other points.

Next the Raiders went to Missoula, Montana, for a 19-13 victory. Tarbox scored all three touchdowns.

October 22 found Texas Tech beating Texas College of Mines 14-7 at Odessa. Atkins and Tarbox scored the six-pointers. Marek converted twice.

Loyola's Wolves were beaten in Lubbock 55-0 after Tech's open date. Tarbox and Webb each got two counters and McKnight, Hill, Balfanz, and Rankin one. Marek kicked four extra points, Balfanz

one, Green one, and McKnight one on a pass play.

Tech beat favored Gonzaga U. from Spokane, Washington, 7-0 Nov. 11. A Homecoming crowd of 10,000 witnessed the contest. Ramsey set up the score with his passes but Marek got both the TD and PAT.

At Albuquerque on Nov. 19, against New Mexico University, Tech won 17-7. Marek scored a touchdown and kicked an extra point and a field goal. Calhoun got the remaining six points.

In the final regular game the Raiders topped the Marquette Hilltoppers 21-2. Barnett, Tarbox, and Webb got the touchdowns; Marek, the extra points.

Back in September, 1938 Coaches Cawthon, Dutchy Smith, Berl Huffman, and Ed McKeever opened practice with 50 men. After several practice sessions a starting lineup was finally picked.

On the first string Tech had Thurman Bostick, a 1937 regular from Brownwood, and George Webb from Itasca at ends. Line Captain Abe Murphy and giant Bill Davis of Grapevine were returning to their tackle positions. Manning the guard posts were Dixie White, Lubbock; and Holt Waldrep, Slaton. At the center post was Rex Williams of Sherman.

Captain Frank Guzick, Sherman, center and linebacker on the 1937 team was switching to the quarterback slot. Guzick would

still play linebacker on defense. The Indian Flash, Bobby Holmes, and Elmer "The Great" Tarbox were the two great halfbacks.

Charley Calhoun rounded out the backfield at fullback.

The Raiders also had many talented reserves. The ends were: George Philbrick, hustling senior from Dallas; Prince Scott, soph. from Huffman; E. J. McKnight, Mexia; and Jack Whellis, soph. from Mart.

Lettermen Leonard Latch, Lloyd Taliaferro, and Elbert Overton headed the tackle reserves. Along with them were newcomers J. B. Gilbert, Cameron; Gordon Miller, McAdoo; and Durwood Herring of Mineral Wells.

Wilmer Green, Gainesville; and Phil Harmon, Idalou; were returning guard lettermen. Other guards included Forrest "Tex" Jones; and sophomores Lonnie "Primo" McCurry, Lubbock; Jack Shanks, Monahans; and Ramsey Wilson, Amberst.

Rafe Nabors and Chester Hemsell were the reserve centers.

Ralph Balfanz and Ray Flusche provided quarterback insurance.

C. L. Storrs, Lubbock; Johnny Sims, Mineral Wells; Woodrow Ramsey, Chillicothe; Milton Hill, Lubbock; Billy Dodd, Sherman; Gene Barnett, Dudley Akins, and Charley "Buzz" Barnard.

Joe Marek, Temple; Bull Rankin; Charles Dvoracek, West; and Frank Svetlik, Bay City were the reserve fullbacks.

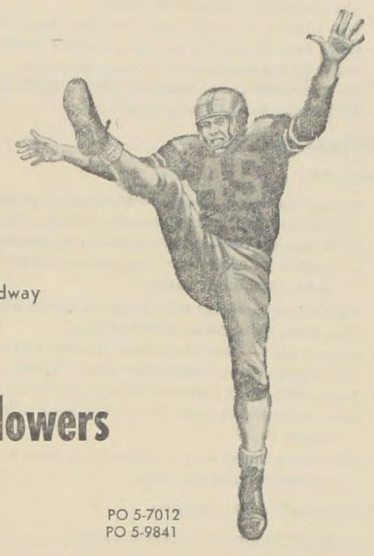
