G. E. Giesecke Named Vice President

Sul Ross Takes Top Honors at Rodeo; Leonard Gets Tech's Only First Place

Sul Ross State College walked off with top honors at the fourth annual Texas Tech Intercollegiate Rodeo last weekend. Sul Ross was national intercollegiate rodeo champion for 1952, and in the final month of competition, is leading in points for the title for 1953.

Following the closing performance of the rodeo, Tex Martin of Sul Ross was crowned champion all-round cowboy. Martin is the leading contender for national all-round cowboy, and also leading in saddle bronc riding. Beverly Thorn, of Sul Ross, was named all-round cowgirl.

Members of the Sul Ross team amassed a total of 487 points to lead the field. Hardin-Simmons University with 431.5 points, took second place.

Johnny Leonard, who placed

first in calf roping, was the only member of the Tech team to take first place in any of the events. Leonard, at the present time, holds third place in the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association ribbon roping contest.

Tech wound up its rodeo Saturday with two shows and a barbecue on the Engineering Mall. More than 3,000 persons turned out for the four performances.

Deadlines Given For Post-Grads Finishing In May

Graduate students planning to finish their work in May have four deadlines to meet before they can graduate, according to an announcement from the office of Dr. W. B. Gates, Dean of Graduate Studies.

May 22 is the last day to submit final drafts of theses and dissertations and pay the binding fee.

Caps, gowns, and hoods must be picked up at the College Bookstore not later than noon, May 23.

Commencement rehearsal will be held at 8:30 a.m. May 24. The president's reception for the graduating class will be from 4 to 6 p.m. the same day, and the Baccalaureate sermon will be at Jones Stadium at 8 p.m.

Commencement exercises are scheduled for 8 p.m. at the stadium May 25, and 5 p.m. May 26 is the last day to return academic regalia to the Bookstore.

Lights Suggested As Senior Gift

Street lights to be placed in front of the Student Union Building have been recommended as the senior class gift, says Larry Bedford, chairman of the gift committee.

McClellan Home Is Given To Tech

Mrs. Len McClellan, widow of a pioneer South Plains rancher, has given her home at 2501 19th St. to Tech, President E. N. Jones announced Saturday. The 10-room brick home will be sold by the college and the proceeds will be applied on the construction of an infirmary building in memory of Mr. McClellan.

Total cost of the new infirmary has been estimated at \$200,000. It will be known as the "Len McClellan Memorial Infirmary" and the permanent structure will probably be located across the street east of the new Student Union Building and north of Knapp Hall.

The proposed building will be the first unit of a student services center which will contain testing and counseling facilities, to safeguard the mental as well as physical health of the students, Dr. Jones says.

Former Dakota Dean Fills Academic Vacancy

Dr. G. E. Giesecke, who has been dean of the School of Applied Arts and Sciences at North Dakota Agriculture College, Fargo, has accepted the appointment as vice president of Texas Tech in charge of academic administration; Dr. E. N. Jones, president, announced Saturday.

Visited Campus

Dr. Giesecke was a visitor on the campus in mid-April and at that time met with the board of directors, the deans and the faculty.

His appointment fills a vacancy left by Dr. Jones, elevated to the presidency last September to succeed Dr. D. M. Wiggins.

Dr. Giesecke received a B.A. degree in 1931 and the next year studied at the University of Marburg in Germany. He received a master's degree in 1934 and a doctor of philosophy degree in 1939. His major field was foreign languages, with emphasis on German. His degrees were received at Stanford University.

Will Move To Lubbock

In the announcement of the appointment, Dr. Jones did not indicate when Dr. and Mrs. Giesecke and their five-year-old son, Mark, would move to Lubbock or when Dr. Giesecke would assume his new duties.

The new vice president, who is a native Texan, will administer only academic affairs.

Halbe Gill, Fort Worth senior, will represent Tech in the Sons of American Revolution oratory contest to be held at the Gunther Hotel in San Antonio Saturday. His oration is entitled "Foreign Policy of the American Revolution."

Dr. Kuntz Acting Psychology Head

Dr. James E. Kuntz has been appointed acting head of the psychology department for the remainder of the spring semester and into the summer, according to an announcement released from the president's office. He will replace the late Dr. L. C. Hutchins.

Dr. Kuntz, who came to Tech in 1951, has been serving as an associate professor in the department.

Sales will be limited to 350 tickets. Prices are \$3 date and \$5 stag. The prom, which will be formal without corsages, will be held May 15 in the ballroom of the Student Union Building.

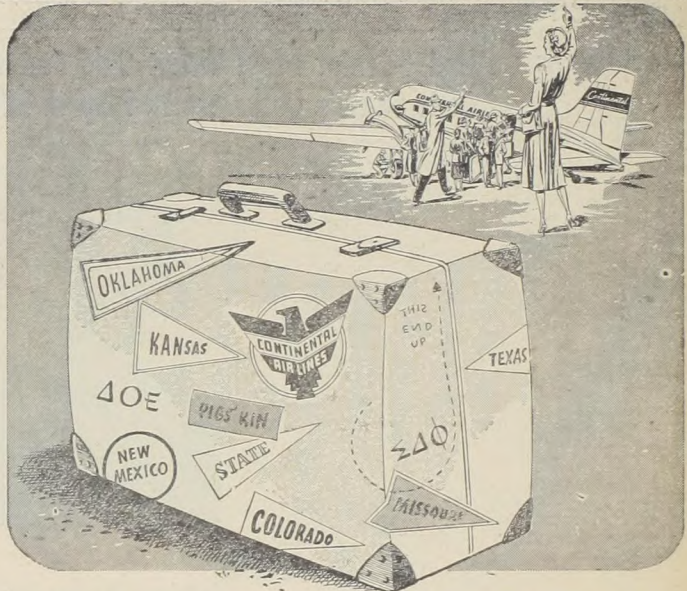

The meet was last held in 1951 with Kemas taking the title.

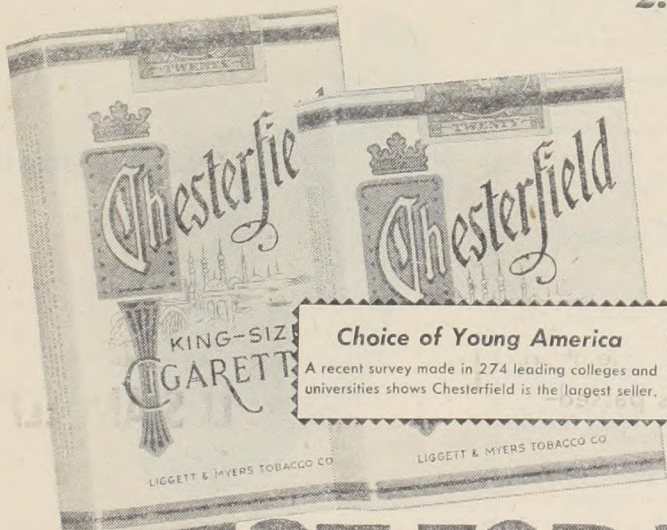

SOPHOMORE WILL GO TO HOLLAND

Rainer Named Lubbock Community Ambassador

Glenn Rainer, 19-year-old Lubbock sophomore, will receive an expense-free, two-month trip to Holland this summer as "community ambassador" from Lubbock. He was selected at a meeting of civic and service clubs Tuesday night.

Melvin Deardorff, business administration major from Lubbock, was selected first alternate, and Donnie Dean, government major from Lubbock, was selected second alternate. The five finalists included Rainer, Deardorff, Dean, E. A. DeShazo, and Karl Dockray.

To Give 150 Speeches

Rainer's expenses will be paid by Lubbock civic and service clubs. When the pre-law and accounting student returns, he will relate his experiences to Lubbock civic clubs and describe European life as he saw it. Also upon his return, a total of 150 speaking engagements have been set for him. He will make reports by mail while in Holland.

Frank Crowell, general project chairman, said that 33 persons applied for the ambassador position. "Of that number only 16 completed requirements and we selected the five finalists from those 16 at a meeting last week."

Will Visit Principal Cities

The candidates must have lived in Lubbock for one year and plan to stay in Lubbock for at least one more year. They were selected on the basis of appearance, personality, fairness toward others, and knowledge of American government.

Rainer will be "briefed" here to prepare him for the trip. He leaves for Holland from New York July 1.

His first week in Holland will be spent in a university in Goningen studying contemporary history. The next four weeks he will live with a Dutch family. During this time he will visit the principal cities of the country.

Student Council Representative

The last week of the trip will be spent in Paris, France. Rainer will return to New York Sept. 14.

Rainer, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Rainer of 2605 30th St., graduated from Lubbock High School

where he was photographer for both the yearbook and the student paper.

He has been a member of the Tech debate team for two years. He is a representative to the Student Council from the Division of Business Administration. He spent six weeks in Mexico City last summer studying the Spanish language and customs under the direction of Dr. T. Earle Hamilton, associate professor of foreign languages.

"I only hope I can do as much for the people of Lubbock as they have done for me by offering me this excellent opportunity," Rainer said.

He and the other finalists were questioned more than two hours before the choice was made.

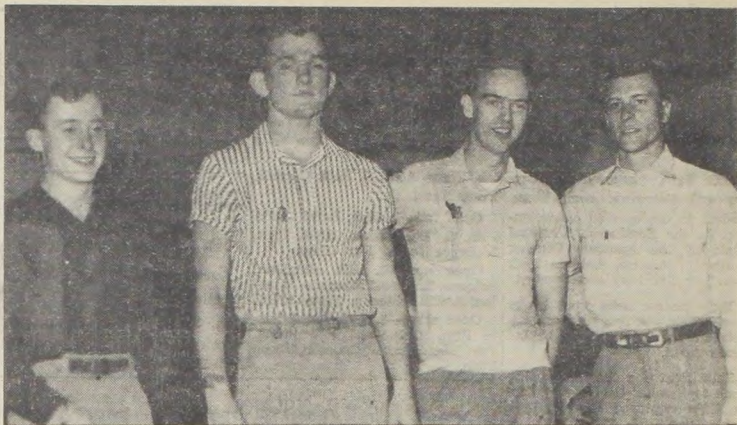
Awards Banquet Thursday Evening

A Tech graduate has been awarded a \$5,000 scholarship by the Ford Foundation for Advancement of Secondary Education.

In connection with the grant, Miss Stelle will study at Columbia University, New York City, and in the General Mills Research Laboratory in Minneapolis, Swift and Company in Chicago, and the General Electric Laboratory in New York City.
