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### Legislative Allotments ....

THE DAILY TEXAN, student newspaper at Texas University, recently published an editorial complaining of the allotments being given that institution by the state legislature. The editorial carried the theme, in a rather hesitant manner, that the state's largest institution of higher learning was not receiving what they deserve in the way of money.

The Texan has long been one of the Southwest's greatest college papers, but a few weeks ago began to decline rapidly in its editorial powers. A recent editorial in that newspaper advocating communism brought the wrath of the state legislative bodies down on officials there, and the Texan was placed under faculty supervision.

Since that time articles placed on the editorial page have lacked fire and vigor that for so long was a characteristic of that paper. This recent article asking for more money from the

that paper. This recent article asking for more money from the House was the one that championed all of the rest.

The article was very reserved in its denouncing of the wisdom shown by our legislative bodies in this cut of allotments. The writer raved for paragraphs on what great men we had in our Senate, but how wrong they were to cut such a great institution's allotment so drastically. The article even carried the figures, in percentage terms, on how much loss the university was suffering in comparison with other state schools.

Here at Texas Tech, officials have never complained about such items. It seems to be the feeling of Techsans and their leaders that if Tech deserves a raise in allotments the legislators will give it to this college. But where the university has the right to complain about their finances we simply do not know.

That institution has more financial backing than any one in the state. The land they own would support any other five colleges in this state. We believe in share and share alike, but for years the state university has hogged most of the educational allotments. When they suffer a small cut, in proportion to what Tech has suffered, we can endure their complaints no more. allotments. This college has always received the jackals share of the state's financial support, while Texas University has received the lion's share. When that educational institution received a drop in state allotments of some twenty per-cent, it hurt them about one half as much as it did Tech when she suffered a cut of some six per-cent.

We are proponents of free speech and even more so of free education. When the *Texan* spoke boldly about the legislature cutting allotments, it received the hearty approval of *The Toreador*. But they were a little too selfish in their motive. That is what we dislike so much.

It is common knowledge that any one college paper can do nothing about such things. And especially is this true when editorials are written in such a selfish, martyred manner. But with all state schools working together perhaps something might be

Faculty members here have suffered greatly from this cut, as have departments and the college as a whole. With the added load of instructing government students, the entire administration here is overworked. But with all this added load the legislature forced Tech to cut expenditures even more—when

We have never been too well situated here, with reference to finances. With the last cut we are even worse off. We feel that when conditions will allow a normal amount of money to be given to the furthering of education here, it will be done without hesitation by state officials.

But we condemn The Daily Texan for its selfish outburst on state school allotments. If they have the brash conceit to complain about meager finances at the richest school in the state; then what can The Toreador say in regard to the situation at Tech . . .
