At the age of 14 Spalding was
graduated from Bologna Conserva-
tory of Music with the highest
honors accorded anyone since Mo-
zart. He made his professional de-
but in Paris and shortly thereat-
ter appeared with Adelina Patti at
the Chatelet. His American de-
but was at Carnegie hall, where he
appeared as soloist with the New
York Symphony orchestra conduct-
ed by Walter Damrosch.
spalding made his first concert
tour of the United States in 1906
as soloist with the Dresden Phil-
harmonic orchestra. Since that
time he has appeared and been re-
engaged from one to twenty times,
with almost every leading symph-
ony orchestra in America and Eu-
rope.
He is the only American violinist
who has ever performed at the
Scala Opera house in Milan and he
is one of three violinists ever in-
cited to appear as soloist with the
famous Paris Conservatoire orches-

## Legislative Allotments.....

THE DAILY TEXAN, student newspaper at Texas University, mints being given that institution by the state legislature. The editorial carried the theme, in a rather hesitant manner, that the state's largest institution of higher learning was not receiving what they deserve in the way of money.

The Texan has long been one of the Southwest's greatest college papers, but a few weeks ago began to decline rapidly in its editorial powers. A recent editorial in that newspaper ad-
vocating communism brought the wrath of the state legislative bodies down on officials there, and the Texan was placed under faculty supervision.

Since that time articles placed on the editorial page have lacked fire and vigor that for so long was a characteristic of that paper. This recent article asking for more money from the House was the one that championed all of the rest.

The article was very reserved in its denouncing of the wisdom shown by our legislative bodies in this cut of allotments. our Senate, but how wrong they were to cut such a great institution's allotment so drastically. The article even carried the figures, in percentage terms, on how much loss the
was suffering in comparison with other state schools.

Here at Texas Tech, officials have never complained about such items. It seems to be the feeling of Techsans and their will give it to this college. But where the university has the right to complain about their finances we simply do not know. That institution has more financial backing than any one in the state. The land they own would support any other five col-
leges in this state. We believe in share and share alike, but for years the state university has hogged most of the educational


This college has always received the jackals share of the state's financial support, while Texas University has received the lion's share. When that educational institution received a
drop in state allotments of some twenty percent, it hurt them about one half as much as it did Tech when she suffered a cut We are proponents of free speech and even more so of free education. When the Texan spoke boldly about the legislature cutting allotments, it received the hearty approval of The Tor-
eador. But they were a little too selfish in their motive. That is what we dislike so much. nothing about such things. And especially is this true when edo-
torials are written in such a selfish, martyred manner. But with
