Group Defers Final Decision On Show Title

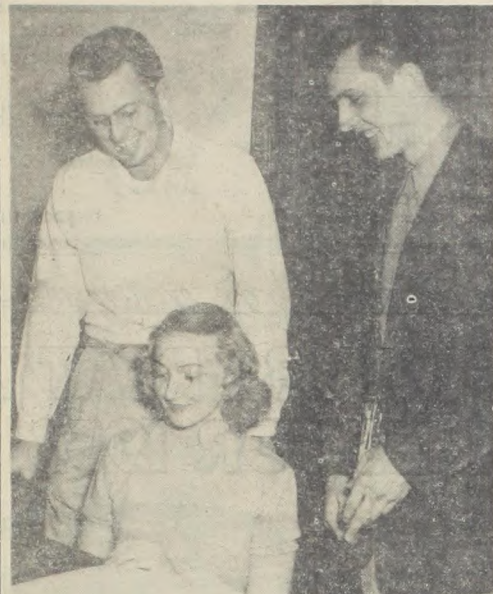
A petition to include four science departments in the name of the annual Engineers' Show was deferred and a motion to continue the usual name for this spring's show was passed by a meeting of the Engineers' Show Organization last night.

The organization, composed of representatives from all departments of the engineering division and the departments of chemistry, geology, physics and military science, appointed a four-man committee to investigate changes in the group's constitution. Those appointed were: Emmett Adair, Scott Poage, Pat Williams, and Kenneth Gilbert.

The four science departments had requested that their participation in the annual production be recognized by the use of the word "science" in the official title of the show.

A majority of the representatives voted approval of a motion to retain the name "Engineers' Show" for the 1953 presentation, according to Joe Hastings, manager of the show and representative of the engineering division to the Student Council.

Speech Radio-TV Members of NAEB

The National Association of Educational Broadcasters has notified the radio-TV section of the Tech speech department that the college has been made an official member of the association, says Woodrow Halvorson, assistant speech professor.

Mr. Halvorson says the NAEB, organized in 1924, is composed of institutions, groups and individuals engaged in non-commercial, educational broadcasting over institutionally-owned stations (AM, FM, or TV) or through facilities of commercial stations.

The committee and directors are reading scripts submitted by the following students: Harry Parker, Roy Smith, Dick Shockley, and Loraine Pipkin. Parker has entered two scripts and Miss Berry is co-author with Miss Pipkin.

Casting for the annual all-student show will begin when the script is chosen, said Thompson. Applications are being accepted in the Council office for the positions of: program advertising director, publicity director, program layout director, dance director, costume director, stage manager, lighting director and sound director.

Produced Camp Shows

Echols is a music education major, with minors in radio speech and physical education. A hushed, expectant near-capacity audience greeted Jascha Heifetz, violin virtuoso, as he walked on the stage of Lubbock High School auditorium Wednesday night. The interest was twice as great because here at last was the artist who had been prevented by illness from playing for this same audience last year. From the first final touch of the bow until the final bars of the last encore, Heifetz held his audience in perfect accord with the mood of the

Evening Program Registration Dates Set for February

Registration for the spring evening study program will be held Feb. 7-13, announces Dean George G. Heather, director.

Classes will begin Feb. 7 or the following week of Feb. 9-12. Date of the first meeting will be listed in the evening program catalog.

Four college divisions will offer a total of 71 courses. Arts and sciences will offer courses in education, English, government, geography, astronomy, mathematics, music, psychology, Spanish, and speech.

Business administration will offer accounting, business education, tests and measurements, economics, business law, insurance, C. P. A. law review, personnel management, typing, and business correspondence.

Engineering will offer only two courses: pottery, and art in elementary education.

Home economics courses include: woodwork, clothing, upholstering, weaving, trends and resources for elementary teachers, home care of sick and home safety, and development of the home-making program.

music. Beginning with Handel's "Sonata in E Major," at times lively and gay, then deeply sad, the violinist's greatness was immediately apparent. This was followed by Grieg's "Sonata in C minor" written for violin and piano. In it Heifetz shared honors with Emanuel Bey, his accompanist of 15 years, an accomplished pianist in his own right. This composition depicts the ruggedness of the Norwegian scenery.

Immediately after intermission came Debussy's "Il pleure dans mon coeur," a quiet, almost hauntingly beautiful song. Next the brief, lively "Presto" by Poulenc. Gershwin's "Bess, You Is My Woman Now," and "Tempo di Blues," both Heifetz's transcriptions, highlighted this part of the program. He transcribed five of the "Porgy and Bess" numbers because "Gershwin never got around to writing anything for the violin."

Vieuxtemps' magnificent Concerto No. 5 was the concluding number. This was one of the numbers Heifetz used after his return to the concert stage two years ago. Encores included "Sweet Remembrance" by Mendelssohn; "Banjo and Fiddle" by Kroll, and Godovsky's "Alt Wien."

Record Selections Donated by KFYO

Donald Hawkins Brown, a 24-year-old unemployed bus and streetcar operator, has been arrested on a murder charge in connection with the New Year's Eve slaying of Joe Campbell, 25, Tech graduate, in Dallas.

After a nation-wide search, the suspect was taken into custody Wednesday in a Fort Worth taxidermist's studio. Police claim Campbell, a finance company collector, was trying to repossess Brown's automobile. He supposedly went to Brown's apartment to repossess the car on the night of Dec. 31, the night Campbell's body was found in his blazing auto.

Firemen said the vehicle and fragments of the man's clothing smelled of gasoline.

Student Handbook To Be Out Soon

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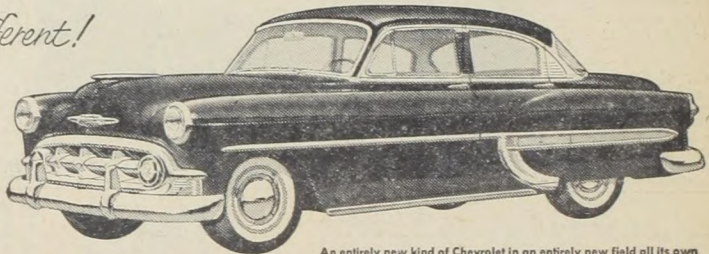
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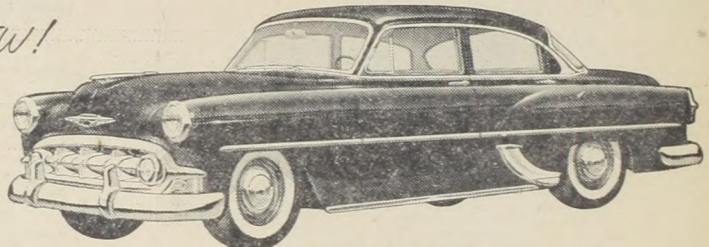
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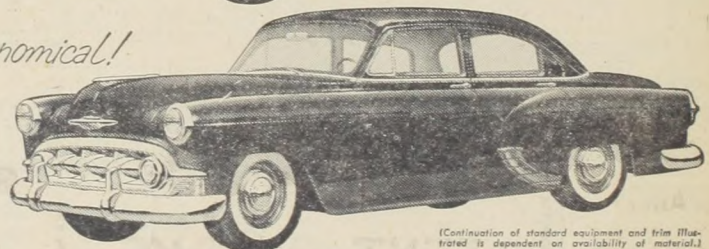


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H-SU Hands Tech First League Loss, 69-63

Hardin-Simmons' Cowboys used third quarter scoring spree to and the Tech Raiders a 69-63 conference defeat in Abilene Tuesday night.

It was the first conference setback for the Raiders, and it was the third consecutive triumph for the Cowboys in league play.

It was 6 foot 7 center Hank Green of the Cowboys that spelled defeat for the Raiders with his hook shot in the third quarter. Green sank a big 12 points in the third stanza, as the Cowboys took 52-52 lead.

Paul Nolen continued his blistering conference scoring pace by inking 26 points. Nolen really went to work after the Raiders had fallen behind, 60-44. His shots pulled them to within 8 points of the Cowboys, but that wasn't enough.

The Cowboys changed their style in the fourth canto with the quintet trying to score rather than tall. It worked rather effectively, as the Raiders could never catch the Cowboy sharpshooters.

Jim Reed, who usually holds the spotlight with his work under the backboards, was second to Nolen in scoring with 13 points. Lew Martin was next with 8 tallies.

The contest was close throughout the first half, with the Cowboys leading at intermission, 31-8. But the Raiders couldn't stay

up in the unfriendly home of the Cowboys.

Following Green in scoring for Hardin-Simmons was Doyle Brunson with 19 points and Durward Smith with 10.

The defeat left the Raiders with 2 wins and 1 loss in conference play, while holding a seasonal 6-6 record.

The next conference contest for Tech will be January 31 against West Texas State in Canyon.

Museum Displays De Erdely Work

A collection of 20 drawings by Francis de Erdely, Hungarian-born Californian, is now on display in the Art Gallery of the Museum.

In the collection are "Nostalgia," which took first prize in the 17th annual exhibition of water-colors, pastels, drawings and prints at the Oakland Art Gallery; "Head of Old Man," which won first honorable mention in the 17th annual exhibition of artists in Los Angeles and vicinity, at the Los Angeles County Museum; "Mother and Child," which merited an award at the 1952 International Madonna Festival, Wilshire Methodist Church, Los Angeles. Born in Budapest, Hungary, in 1904, Mr. De Erdely studied at the Budapest Royal Academy of Art, and in other art schools and institutions in Europe, before coming to America in 1939.

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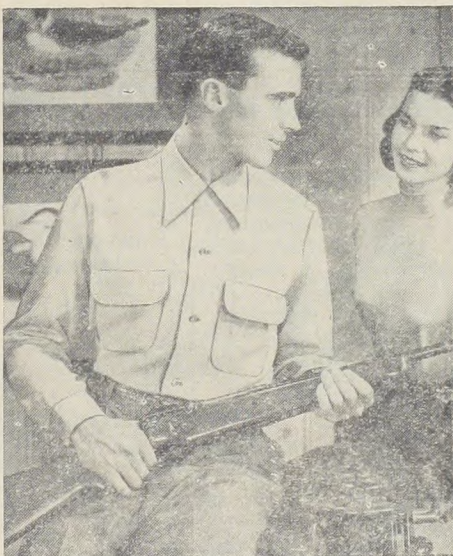
