

Texas A&M Will Display New Look

Texas Tech will be looking at a new coach, a new formation and several new faces when they line up against the Texas Aggies Saturday night in the Cotton Bowl at Dallas.

The thinnest Aggie team in four years will make its 1958 debut under the direction of a new coach, Jim Myers, replacing "Bear" Bryant, who has instituted a new formation, the single wing, to replace Bryant's Split-T.

The current A&M eleven lacks the depth and speed of the last two seasons but should have better passing and kicking. Seven starters are gone from the 1957 team that won eight, lost three and was rated for three weeks the No. 1 team in the nation.

GONE ARE Heisman trophy winner John Crow, Loyd Taylor and Bobby Conrad — three of the finest backs in any conference. Also missing will be quarterbacks Roddy Osborne and Jim Wright; all-conference end Bobby Marks; All-America tackle Charley Krueger and center John Gilbert.

Sixteen lettermen return and only end John Tracy, tackle Ken Beck and halfback Richard Gay, all seniors and two-year lettermen, have seen a great deal of action.

In addition to the inexperience problem Myers has also had the task of installing his single wing attack. The change-over during spring training was termed successful by Myers who had to "eram" a lot of offense into his players in a short time.

Two "castoffs" returned last spring after missing the 1957 season and gave the coaching staff some cause for joy with their work. They were halfbacks Ed Dudley and Luther Hall, both of whom looked "promising."

Dudley, who lettered as a sophomore in 1956, ran from the tailback slot and apparently nailed down the No. 2 spot behind veteran Charlie Milstead.

Hall, who did not play enough to letter in 1956, will be given chances at both tailback and fullback this fall.

WHILE Myers is rather gloomy about his chances a quick rundown of the team by position indicates that all is not sour cream at Aggieland.

At ends Tracey is the only proven performer. Don Smith, a two-year letterman, should be able to step in and do a good job. The other four are sophomores Ralph Smith (Don's brother), Jack Estes, Travis Nevill and Nolan Adams. These four will be used at weakside end with Smith currently holding down the No. 1 job.

Byron Caruthers, a squad center last year, will occupy the third end behind Tracey and Don Smith on the strongside.

At tackles the Aggies have Beck and three other lettermen — Carl Luna, Bill Darwin and Bill Godwin. Beck, Darwin and Godwin, in that order, will work at strongside tackle. Robert Garner, a junior squadman from 1957, is No. 1 on the weak side with Sophomore George Gray and Luna behind him.

A BIG SORE spot in the forward wall last year was at guard and it appears as if it will continue to be one. Allen Goehring and Tom Howard, both lettermen with little experience, are the current starters with other lettermen Joe Munson and Buddy Payne right behind them. Carter Franklin and Wayne Labar, sophomores, round out the candidates here.

At center will be Gale Oliver, a letterman, with sophomore Ray Northrup close behind. Ray Doucet, a letterman at guard last year, is No. 3.

Gay will hold down the blocking back slot in the Myers Single Wing with newcomers Bill Cauthorn and Charles Martell backing him up. Gay was a terror as a blocker the last two years when he lettered at fullback.

AT WINGBACK the Aggies have a real problem with nothing

TEXAS TECH'S Red Raiders invade the Cotton Bowl Saturday night to open against the new look in the Southwest Conference—The Texas Aggies.

The Ags are operating under a new coach and a new system this year and will be interesting to watch. Jim Myers has picked up the blood and thunder right where Paul "Bear" Bryant left off when he returned to Alabama. Myers, a former Marine, moved down from Iowa State last January and brought with him the single wing.

Of course learning and using the single wing will be new and a bit difficult at first for the Aggies. But on the other hand it's liable to be a little new and difficult for opponents to defense against.

A&M IS THE ONLY eleven in the conference running it and the last team in the SWC that tried it had fair success. Arkansas swept to a championship four years ago under Bowden Wyatt with the single wing and was hard to stop.

The cries that have come from Aggieland would leave one to believe that the Aggies couldn't beat Lubbock High School with all their inexperience.

Well sir, they have 16 returning lettermen, 12 of whom saw action in at least 25 quarters last year which is well over half the games played.

They return linemen like Ken Beck, Allen Goehring, Bill Godwin, Carl Luna, Gale Oliver, Don Smith and John Tracey.

IN THE BACKFIELD they have Richard Gay, Gordon LeBoeuf, Charles Milstead and Ed Dudley.

This doesn't sound exactly like the Aggies were on their last lap. I think Aggie Publicity Director Jones Ramsey deserves a special award for the way he has managed to understate this team. Make no mistake about it, A&M will be double tough.

ON THE OTHER HAND the Red Raiders don't appear to be ready for the Aggies. A virus that hit the team has weakened some of the performers that DeWitt Weaver was counting upon heavily. Included in that list are big center E. J. Holub, last year's leading ground gainer halfback Ronnie Rice, center Bill Turnbow and halfback John Roberts.

These boys will be in uniform against A&M but since most of them have missed at least one week of drills it is doubtful as to how much they will be able to play.

Saturday's scrimmage session showed that Tech is going to have its hands full with the Ag single wing. Both the first and second units had considerable trouble defending against Aggie plays.

Texas Tech's Red Raiders begin winding up drills today in preparation for Saturday night's clash with Texas A&M in the Cotton Bowl.

The Raiders have spent a good deal of this week trying to iron out their defense. Coach DeWitt Weaver has expressed concern about Raider defending of the Aggie single wing.

"RIGHT NOW WE aren't deep enough but it looks as if all our injured boys and all the one who were down with the virus will be able to play Saturday night with the possible exception of Ronnie Rice," Weaver reported. Rice has been out for almost two weeks with the same virus that struck down several other team members but has had the hardest time recovering from it.

The team has been looking better and sharper since two-a-days drills were closed last week. Weaver reports that the boys seem to be able to work harder with only one practice session.

THE RAIDERS will probably line up against the Ags with Jerry Selfridge and Gerald Seeman at ends, Phil Williams and Jim Henderson at tackles, Jerry Stockton and Gene Bentley at guards, E. J. Holub at center, Jerry Bell at quarterback, Floyd Dellinger and Milton Vaughn at halfback, and Glenn Amerson at fullback.

Five of the Raiders will be trying to wipe out the sting of two losses to Texas A&M when the teams meet in Dallas Saturday night.

Among the participants in the 40-7 loss to Texas A&M two years ago in Dallas as well as in the 21-0 defeat suffered here last year were end Gerald Seeman of Fort Worth, tackles Jim Henderson and Phil Williams of Lubbock, halfbacks Milton (Rabbit) Vaughn of Littlefield and Jimmy Knox of Graham.

FULLBACK DOUG DUNCAN of Wellington is also a survivor of the Dallas loss but did not play last year. Others who played in the '57 defeat who return are ends Bobby Stafford of Roaring Springs and Jerry Selfridge of Borger, guard Jerry Don Stockton of Tuscola, center Bill Turnbow of Burk Burnett, quarterbacks Jerry Bell of Ballinger, and Ken Talkington of Tyler, halfbacks Ronnie Rice of Lefors, John Roberts of Stillwater, Okla., Mickie Barron of Childress, and Floyd Dellinger of LaVega, and fullback Floyd Cole of McCamey.

To halfback Mack Pogue, the Raiders' alternate captain from Sulphur Springs, belongs a distinction: His only appearance against the Aggies was a 41-9 Texas Tech victory four years ago. Pogue, a Tyler Junior College graduate, went into the service after the '54 season.

Workouts begin officially Monday for Tech's freshman Picadors and expectations are high that this year's group will be the finest in history.

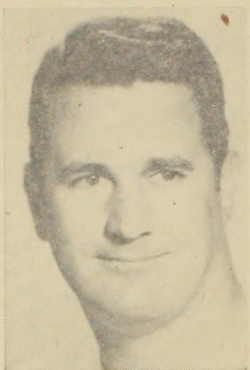

Outlook...

A lot of work is in order this week, especially on defense. One factor that might have slowed everyone down Saturday was the fact that for two weeks Weaver and his assistants have held two-a-day drills and most of the players were completely worn out. A return to single sessions this week should bring out some improvement in performance.

ARKANSAS and Baylor kick off the earliest Southwest Conference campaign in history Saturday night in Waco. This year's race boils down to a battle between Texas, TCU and SMU. But as usual the teams picked to do well probably won't while Baylor, picked for the cellar, is liable to win everything.

The conference will be tough, as it always is. Texas returns almost the entire team that went to the Sugar Bowl while TCU and SMU

both return almost everyone also. The Christians and Methodists will be deep with offensive attacks.

Rice is being boomed as the darkhorse although they lost King Hill and Frank Ryan. A&M is figured to be out of it due to the change in formations made by Jim Myers. Arkansas and Baylor lost heavily from teams that weren't too high last campaign.

UT Cross-Country Team Opens at Fort Worth

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 18—The University of Texas cross-country team begins its 1958 season Oct. 11 in Fort Worth in a quadrangular met with Texas Christian, Southern Methodist and Texas Tech.

The meet is one of eight, including the national, on Coach Froggy Lovvorn's schedule. The Longhorns, who have won more Southwest Conference cross-coun-

try titles than any other team, will have one of their least-experienced teams in several years. The situation, already serious, was made more so recently when Gordon Ratcliff, one of last year's mainstays, dropped from school.

Top man this year, as last, is expected to be Joe Villarreal, SWC mile and half-mile king. Villarreal will be aided by Drew Dunlap, Ken Savage, Humberto Adame, John Cotten, Andre Bou-

chard, Don Dishong, David Mulder and Charles Rosemond.

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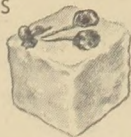
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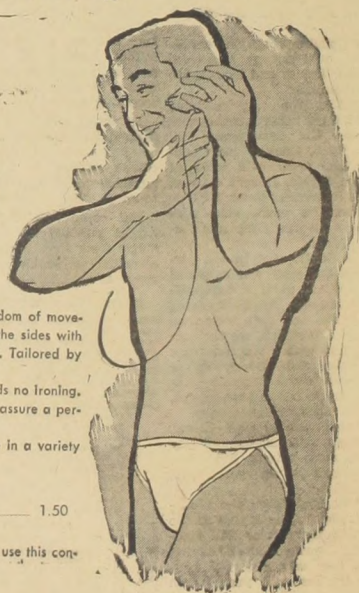

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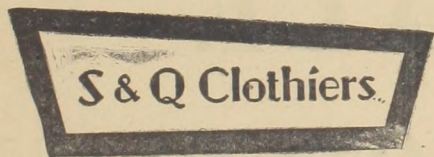
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Longhorns Open Against Georgia

AUSTIN, Tex. Sept. 18—Texas opens its 66th football season here Saturday night against the school that figured in the start or finish of two of the Longhorns' most unusual campaigns.

This 1958 inaugural marks the third meeting of the University of Texas and the University of Georgia on the football field. The first was a surprise Orange Bowl triumph for Texas on New Year's Day, 1949.

The other occurred just a year ago, when the Longhorns started their recovery program with a 26-7 triumph in Atlanta. That season, like the one in 1948, ended with post-season fanfare, but not nearly so successful.

STRANGELY ENOUGH, Texas compiled a 6-3-1 won-lost-tied record over each of the two regular seasons. The 1948 crew started out highly-rated, the Southwest Conference favorite, but suffered disappointments, then atoned for them with a smashing victory over the nation's eighth-ranked Georgia team in Miami.

Little was expected of the 1957 Longhorn crew, but it put together

enough surprises to finish second in the conference and earn an invitation to the Sugar Bowl.

Georgia, which also made big comeback strides last year, is the sixteenth state university to invade Austin's Memorial Stadium. Saturday's meeting will be the fourth between Texas and a state-of-Georgia eleven. The first was in the 1943 Cotton Bowl game which the Longhorns won, 14-7, from Georgia Tech.

WHILE TEXAS HEADS into its second season under Darrell Royal's tutelage with only half of its 1957 lettermen, Georgia comes to Austin with 22 of its 33 award winners back in harness. Furthermore, Wally Butts has nine of last year's starters at his command, while Royal can summon only three.

Rated No. 20 by one of the national magazines, Georgia is, by the admission of Coach Butts, "improved at all positions." Dean of the Southeastern Conference head coaches, Butts is in his 20th season as tutor of the Bulldogs. He is particularly pleased with the team's confidence, an attitude undoubtedly gained by a final victory

over Georgia Tech after holding Auburn, the national champion, to a one-touchdown decision.

Among the Bulldog returnees are Captain Theron Sapp, a

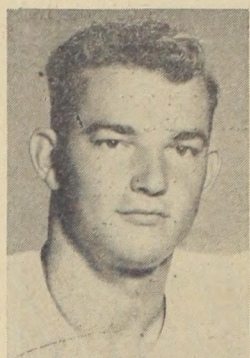
mighty fullback who was the ball-carrying leader against Texas as well as for the full season; Quarterbacks Charley Britt, who was a standout sophomore passer and ball carrier, and six of the seven starters up front.

COACH BUTTS also is blessed with sophs from a highly rated 1957 freshman squad.

Texas, of course, is without six of seven of its regular forwards of last year and minus Walter Fondren, its versatile field general. Fondren ranked second to Fullback Mike Dowdle at rushing in the Atlanta affair, completed three of his four passes, engineered three scoring drives and counted one of the four touchdowns.

The Bulldogs will be familiar, however, with End Maurice Doke, Backs Mike Dowdle, Don Allen, George Blanch and Bobby Lackey, and Co-Captains Bob Bryant and Arlis Parkhurst, most of whom distinguished themselves in the 1957 game. New to them will be Halfback Rene Ramirez, who made quite a name for himself last year after only a brief appearance against the Bulldogs,

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Arizona's Doherty Expresses Optimism

TUCSON—Arizona's head football coach Ed Doherty, in the wake of a disastrous 1957 season (1-8-1), will meet this fall's schedule with a special kind of optimism. Contrary to what the football analysts believe, that Arizona will go winless in 1958, Doherty strongly states, "We are not conceding defeat to anyone on our schedule. We may not have the personnel to make an impressive record this year, but this will be a team that will give every opponent a battle down to the final gun."

One of the hardest work schedules experienced by varsity and freshman teams in a decade of UA football was in full operation from the opening of fall practice.

WITH SPECIAL emphasis on speed, conditioning and wind exercises Doherty's varsity squad also went through some light contact work the second day of drills. The 47-man team, heavily marked with sophomores is faster overall than the 1957 squad, and seems to have more spirit and drive, an element that has been successful for Doherty-coached teams in the past. The Arizona backfield, faster and better balanced than last year's, is mostly sophomore with little ex-

perience. But Doherty believes that it will be a backfield which will learn quickly and perhaps come into its own by the middle of the season.

The last few days the Wildcats have been sent through offense patterns. Doherty has used a combination of backfields in an attempt to find the best working unit for speed and adaptability to his slot T offense.

THE ARIZONA LINE, with a scarcity of depth and experience, has good size and fair speed. Doherty believes that this line is faster than last year's, and could improve considerably.

The first Arizona injury could cost the Wildcats the services of a 6-4, 230-pound lineman for ten days to three weeks. Mike Mullahey, a junior from Honolulu, Hawaii, suffered a dislocated shoulder during the second day of practice and was sidelined.



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
