

Buffaloes Upset Red Raiders

Grabbing the lead early in the ball game, and holding it the rest of the way, the West Texas State Teachers college Buffs upset the Texas Tech Red Raiders there Tuesday 50 to 42.

The victory gave the Buffs undisputed leadership in the eastern division of the Border Conference, and season's edge over the Red Raiders of three out of four.

Overflow Crowd

Burton gym was packed with a capacity crowd, and close to 400 fans from throughout the Panhandle were turned away at the gates.

J. W. Malone, West Texas Teacher's All-American star, repeatedly broke past the guards of the Red Raiders, and showed deadly accuracy for the basket from the corners to jolt up 26 points and scoring honors of the night.

It was Jay Kerr, Tech veteran from Odeña, who kept the Red Raiders in the ball game, and poured in 17 points to spark the losers.

Malone opened the scoring with a field goal, and Garland Head hit a two-pointer to tie the score. Malone dropped in a free shot, and Ardis Barton again tied the score for the Red Raiders.

Buffs Open Up

The Buffs then opened up a barrage of basket, and ran the score up to 19 to 5 before Kerr hit another field goal. Kerr then launched a rally, hitting two more field goals to cut the Buff lead to 2-10.

The Red Raiders made it a dog fight until the end of the first half, and the intermission came with the Buffs leading 29 to 20.

After the intermission, the Buffs pulled away. Late in the ball game, the Red Raiders cut the lead to 41 to 33, but for the rest of the game could no more than hold their own.

Texas Tech's home basketball season will be concluded in the gym Monday night when the Clovis Army Air field quintet pay a visit to Lubbock for a return game with the Red Raiders.

The Red Raiders won a 49-48 game in Clovis between semesters and expect another tough encounter Monday. The visitors presented a lineup of former college and professional stars and these men are expected to be on hand again here. The airman in the previous game led most of the way and were upset by Tech because the winners were in better physical condition and were able to drive to the finish.

Coach Polk Robison will use his regular lineup of Jay Kerr, Garland Head, Allen Close, Bill Kelley and Ardis Barton as starters for the final home game, it is expected. Also getting in the game will be Tilley Speed, Tuff Nabors, Bob Lofland, Tom Levay, Gene Hardey and others.

Tonight and Saturday night the Red Raiders will be in Abilene for a two-game series with Hardin-Simmons Cowboys. Tech was victor in two games with HSU here last week and should have little trouble taking another pair. The Cowboys are small, but fast, and have caused trouble for opponents but have won few games.

The basketball season will be ended Feb. 28 and March 1 and 2 in Albuquerque when the Border conference tournament is scheduled. Tech and West Texas will represent the eastern division against top teams of the central and western division.

West Texas State's Buffaloes trimmed the Red Raiders Tuesday night by eight points, the same margin Tech defeated them by three weeks earlier. J. W. Malone of the Buffaloes ran wild, racking up 26 points for his team, while Jay Kerr paced the Raiders with 17 points. Garland Head was definitely "off," as he scored only 7 points, which is the least number he has been held to thus far.

Tech will go to the Border Conference Tournament in Albuquerque early in March, as the Raiders are runner-up in the Eastern Division. Arizona U. has captured the Central or Middle Division. The Tourney favorite will be Arizona U., as they have defeated the best teams in all three divisions. However, anything can happen and usually does.

Twenty-six teams, twelve college and fourteen high schools, have entered the 14th Annual Border Olympics to be staged in Laredo March 8 and 9. Tech has entered this meet along with Oklahoma A and M, Texas A and M, Texas Christian, Texas U., Rice and several others. Only one district winner has been determined at present but the remaining district champions will be announced later. Darrouzett of high school in district two has won the right to represent that district in the regional play-off.

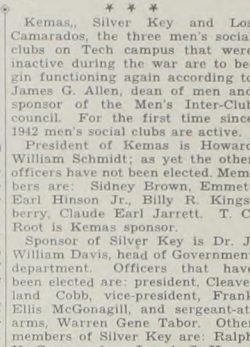
