## Essential, Bevin **Tells Commons**

#### Peace Impossible Unless Russians "Enter Freely"

LONDON, June 4 (AP)-Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin told the house of commons today that permanent peace in Europe could be guaranteed "only if Russia enters freely into the European settlement."

But, he said, "all through Russian speeches and writings" runs the "idea that the Russian methods alone represent democracy and that certain other systems are either fascist or crypto-fascist,"

"This is one of the greatest obstacles to peace," Bevin declared in a speech opening a full-dress debate on foreign affairs. The debate will continue for

#### Red Cooperation "JIM CROW" LAWS OF NINE SOUTHERN Meyer Elected STATES MAY BE VOIDED BY DECISION

WASHINGTON, June 4 (A)-Southern states looked to their "Jim Crow" laws today in the light of a supreme court ruling brushing aside Virginia's statute requiring segregation of negroes on interstate buses.

The court, in its 6-1 decision, said the Virginia law imposes an undue burden on interstate commerce and therefore is unconsti-

Dissenting, Justice Burton said that on yesterday's precedent similar laws in nine other southern states-North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, Texas and Oklahoma-could be held invalid.

Likewise, Burton asserted, validity of laws of 18 states which prohibit racial segregation could be challenged since "they differ sharply from laws on the same subject" in other parts of the country. The 18 were not listed.

Justice Reed's majority opinion in the Virginia "Jim Crow" case somewhat obliquely checked the matter to congress by concluding: "It seems clear to us that seating arrangements for the different races in interstate motor travel require a single, uniform rule to promote and protect national travel."

While concurring with the majority decision, Justice Frankfurter objected to any such single rule. Frankfurter contended that "congress may devise a national policy with due regard to varying interests of different regions."

## Navy Mobilizing To Take Over **US Shipping**

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)-A hint of new union concessions toward settlement of the threatened maritime strike on June 15 came today from President Joseph Curra of the CIO's National Maritime Union.

As the Navy started mobilizing to run the merchant fleet if necessary, Curran told reporters that a compromise 42-hour week

proposal "is the latest but not our last offer."

He dld not elaborate, but another spokesman for the union gave this follow-up explanation: "We're prepared to avert a strike, we don't want a strike. We're willing to compromise and sign a satisfactory agreement. The point is what is satisfactory."

Originally the union asked a 40-hour week at sea instead of the present 56 hours, demanding that each ship carry ten relief workers. Employers said this would be an "insupportable burden" making it impossible for American ships to compete with foreign lines. The new offer cuts the relief crew to 8, but still leaves a wide gap between the union and employer

positions. The conciliation conference took its first peek into the demands of West Coast seamen today behind closed doors, with no results immediately reported. Meanwhile the government took preparatory steps to run the nation's 3,100 merchant ships if the mid-June deadline goes by without settle-

## Russians Surely Do Not Want To Fight Another War, AP Correspondent Says

NEW YORK, (A) - Just back in the United States after almost five years in Russia a correspondent is struck and startled by the questions he is asked about the possibility of war with Russia.

"Tell me" said a young man just out of the Army, "should I go and re-enlist and try to get my old captain's job back? You've been living in Russia a long time. Aren't they about ready to fight

You get similar questions from businessmen, club women, housewives, laborers, policemen, the inevitable taxi driver and so on.

Having lived outside the United States for more than six years now, it is very difficult to understand the urgency of such questions and thoughts about Russia going to war.

If five years in a country means anything, if lengthy daily conversations with diplomatic persons in Moscow who have talks with Russian leaders have their worth, if having a Russian wife, knowing dozens upon dozens of just plain Russians as well as a smattering of the party faithful should be contributing factors in helping to understand the Russian mind and attitude of a people, then the only possible answer is:

As sure as there's a face on the Kremlin clock and Joseph Stalin has a mustache the Russians do not want to fight anybody.

In addition to the Russian people and leaders not wanting war with any country - and be a realistic England or the United States or both - the following factors which may not be generally known in America are worth consideration:

Russia suffered greatly in her war with Germany. She lost many men and women, a large amount of machinery and livestock. Russia's coal, iron and electrical

Like Alexander of Macedon, Jones asks no quarter, gives none when matching his shots against the foe. And he doesn't try to impress the spectators with his-


