Ford, Carter continue to campaign heavily

Campaigning in key industrial states, President Ford sought to demonstrate his leadership in nuclear policy Thursday while Jimmy Carter attempted to persuade, but not promise, voters that their taxes would be lower if he is elected.

Ford, campaigning in Cincinnati, Ohio, unveiled plans for an international effort to prevent the spread of nuclear weapons. He coupled his proposals with a promise that construction of uranium enrichment facilities in Portsmouth, Ohio, would begin early next year and would mean 6,000 new jobs.

CARTER TOLD a rally in Cleveland he cannot promise a substantial tax reduction that a day earlier he had

Final day for absentee voting

Today is the last day to vote absentee or to turn in an application for ballot by mail, according to Texas Secretary of State Mark White.

Students may vote absentee if they are registered to vote in a county other than the one where they are going to school or if they will not be in the county in which they are registered at the time of the election.

Applications for ballot by mail may be picked up at the county clerk's office. After filling out the application, the voter must send the application to the county clerk in his home county.

The county clerk will then mail the voter an official ballot which must be returned to the county clerk's office no later than 7 p.m. Tuesday.

John Hill to appear

John Hill, Texas attorney general, will make an appearance in Lubbock today for a 3:30 p.m. press conference at the Lubbock County Democratic Headquarters, according to local Democratic headquarter officials.

Along with Hill at the conference will be Robert C. Krueger, Democratic Congressman from New Braunfels, District 21.

After the press conference, Hill and Krueger will speak to the public at the headquarters.

Hill took office as the State of Texas' 45th Attorney General on Jan. 1, 1973 and was reelected to a four-year term ending Jan. 1, 1979.

Kreuger was chosen by the people of District 21 in New Braunfels over Republican and American party candidates in November, 1974.

AT A STOP in Indianapolis, Ford told an overflow crowd at the Scottish Rite Cathedral that his Democratic opponent has suffered "a precipitous decline in popularity" because his campaign depends on a "discredited old formula of more promises, more programs, more spending."

It was part of a continuing note of GOP optimism.

Aboard Air Force One, White House chief of staff Richard B. Cheney contended that Ford's campaign has made such inroads in the Deep South that the President may need to carry only four of the eight most populous industrial

CHENEY SAID the President and his strategists originally had thought he would have to carry at least five of the "big eight" - New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Texas and California. But Cheney said Republican polls indicate Ford's prospects in the South look promising in Louisiana, Mississippi, Virginia, North and South Carolina and Texas.

After a year's worth of debate and controversy, the Faculty Council voted Thursday to support the recommendations of Dr. Arnold Gully's ad hoc committee on pass-fail.

FACULTY COUNCIL members voted to endorse the committee's six proposals, which will now go to the office of the president for final approval. Tech President Cecil Mackey stated he would hand the matter over to Charles Hardwick, executive vicepresident, accepting his recommendations for action.

The recommended policy is as

"Undergraduate students may take up to 13 semester hours toward satisfying degree requirements in which they will be graded on a pass-fail basis. Courses specified in the catalogue as available only with passfail grading, and courses taking in excess of degree requirements are not included in the 13-hour restriction.

"NO MORE THAN nine hours of course work used to satisfy general degree requirements may be taken

pass-fail. A student may be restricted by his college or department from taking a course pass-fail which is a prerequisite for a course or courses in his major field.

"No student on probation will be allowed the pass-fail option.

"A student must declare the intent to take a course pass-fail no later than the last day on which a grade of 'W' is automatically given for courses dropped. A student who has chosen to take a course pass-fail may subsequently change to a letter grade basis

no later than 30 days prior to the first day of final examinations.

"THE NAMES OF students taking a

course pass-fail will not be made known to the instructor. "Courses taken in the declared major

or minor shall not be taken pass-fail unless required by the department. The department of the major or minor will decide whether courses taken under the pass-fail system, before a student has declared a major or minor, shall count toward satisfying the degree requirements.

Mackey expressed a desire early in the metting to be removed as presiding officer of the Faculty Council, saying the faculty should be able to run their own meetings.

"I THINK IT'S undesirable and inappropriate for the president of a university to chair its chief faculty organization," Mackey said. "I don't think it's helpful for me to be here and I would prefer finding, as quickly as possible, an alternative to the situation," he said.

> "Now the candidates seem to be doing a lot of fence-sitting," Higgins said. "After the elections, we hope we can get them to take a stand and work out the problems."

> TECH REGENTS and the LCHD Board of Managers have been working on possible solutions for administering the hospital. Projected operating cost figures for the hospital, presented at a recent regent meeting, show a \$47.4 million deficit for the first 10 years of operation of the hospital.

But if the LCHD takes over full administration and operation of the hospital, a tax increase for Lubbock County might be necessary, officials

"Lubbock County taxpayers will end up funding the hospital no matter what," Higgins said. Lubbock County voters in 1967 approved a bond issue for the teaching hospital and approved the creation of the LCHD.

"IT'S RIDICULOUS to pass off a \$22 million hospital, paid for by Lubbock County taxpayers, to Tech and say, 'Here, take this little gift so we don't have to worry about it," Higgins said. "Tech doesn't need Lubbock County's money—they get enough money from the state."

Higgins said both Tech and Lubbock are suffering because of the arguing about administration of the hospital.

"What's going on now is detrimental to Tech and Lubbock," she said. "As long as all the bickering and politicking keeps up, nothing will happen."

HIGGINS WAS CRITICAL of the regents and LCHD Board of Managers. "I'm a speech therapist, and I

wouldn't attempt to tell a journalist how to run a newspaper," she said. "I don't see how the men on these boards (regents and LCHD board) can presume to tell doctors how to run a hospital. The two boards are made up primarily of lawyers and accountants and businessmen."

LCHD and Tech officials have met with state legislators at subcommittee hearings on possible state funds for teaching hospitals. Sen. Chet Brooks plans to sponsor a bill when the legislature convenes in January which will provide state funds for teaching hospitals.

"We'll watch the legislature and see what happens," Higgins said. "And after the elections Tuesday, if the elected officials still won't take a stand on the hospital situation, we'll start the petition drive again."

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
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
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

Tower: Ford to carry Texas

AUSTIN (AP) - Sen. John Tower told a Capitol news conference Thursday he senses "the surge in Texas for the President."

"In Texas, I find Ford partisans are optimistic. I think we will win if we develop our potential."

State Republican Chairman Ray Hutchison said he finds the percentage of undecided voters "is narrowing, and they are coming to the President, in our judgment."

Hutchison said he finds people are tired of old issues, such as Jimmy Carter's Playboy interview, and want to hear more on such topics as "horizonal divestiture," in which large corporations would be forced to rid themselves of diversified companies.

Tower said they want to hear about gun control, right-towork and cuts in defense spending.

Ehrlichman begins sentence

SAFFORD, Ariz. (AP) - John D. Ehrlichman, once one of Richard M. Nixon's closest aides, slipped into the Swift Trail Federal Prison Camp here Thursday to begin serving his Watergate sentence.

John Haddin, camp administrator, told reporters that Ehrlichman did not even want to be told which reporters want to talk to him. Ehrlichman, who entered the camp at 10:30 a.m. local time, "doesn't want any communication except from his family and attorneys," Haddin said.

Earlier in the day, two federal judges in Washington granted Ehrlichman's request not to wait for a Supreme Court review of his convictions and ordered him to report to the camp by Nov. 1 to begin serving a minimum sentence of 30 months.

Ehrlichman is the first of the three men closest to Nixon and the highest ranking member of the Nixon administration to date - to be imprisoned.

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
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Why is the sky falling?



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

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

The Longhorns enter this week's game with a good case of the red face. Last week they escaped with a victory and that was all. It was not an artistic game as the Longhorns backed into a 13-12 victory over SMU.

"It wouldn't be too far from your quarterbacks - we are our worst (game) since 1965," Longhorn Coach Darrell Royal said. "But even though I was not pleased with the way we played, I don't want to play it over," said Royal.

The big factor in the game was the gifted toe of sophomore kicker Russell Erxleben and the mad dashes of running back Johnny (Lam) Jones, who gained 122 yards on nine carries.

Erxleben, who figures to be a key factor against Tech, raised his nation - leading punting average to 49.5 yards per boot, with a five-for-54.2 night against SMU last Saturday.

Head Coach Steve Sloan is very concerned about Erxleben as he said "field position will be the key to the game."

With Erxleben booting the ball 50 yards each time he punts, he could keep Tech in bad field position all af-

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
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
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
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
