Lubbock, Tech see political flurry

Dole blasts Democrats in UC speech

Personal jabs against Democratic presidential candidate Jimmy Carter overshadowed the planned agricultural policy statements in Republican vice presidential candiate Robert Dole's visit to the city and address at Tech

The Kansas senator delivered what had been termed a "non-political" address at the University Center Theatre to an overflow crowd consisting predominantly of Tech students.

Dole was welcomed to the Tech campus by an enthusiastic crowd of Republican supporters and introduced by former Republican gubernatorial candidate Jim Granberry, now cochairman of the Lubbock County Republicans.

Dole expressed his appreciation for the warm reception early in his address and proceeded to deliver personal jabs against the Democratic candidate.

"It seems like this audience knows a winner when they see one," Dole said. The senator loosened up the crowd by comparing the Republican campaign with Tech's own Red Raider football

"If we do as well as Tech's Red Raiders have done so far, then we should have no trouble at all on November 2(date of general election)," Dole said.

Dole went on to comment about last week's vice presidential debate in

"I think the debates went very well." he said. "However, I did get somewhat bothered by all the hot air."

"The Republican ticket expects to carry the state of Texas," Dole said. "Texans are discerning voters and we are taking their 26 electoral votes very seriously.'

Dole then aimed his comments directly at the students, speaking of their role in the future of the United

"Both President Ford and I have noticed a change on the campuses across the nation," Dole explained. "The students of today have a way of seeing through politicians and businessmen. They are able to see them for what they really are."

Dole also said that college students have a curious nature and want to know more about a politician's stand than just a lot of "political rhetoric."

"I have found that the main concern of most young American men and women is the moral strength of their potential political leaders," Dole said. Dole moved on to the area of the two partys' platforms and their vast differences.

"The current agriculture program of the nation is basically a sound one," Dole said. "This is probably the first time in a long time that we have gotten

the government off the farmer's back." Dole criticized Carter's stand on agriculture and attempted to show the faultiness of Carter's proposed grain

reserves and export license program. "When Carter finds time to think about issues like the nation's agricultural stand, instead of personal issues, he might see that his ideas are not very valid," Dole said.

Dole's most viscious attack against the Democrats came when he charged that the Democratic ticket was being headed by George Meany, president of the AFL-CIO, instead of Carter.

Dole said that Meany's influence on the Carter campaign was overpowering. "Someone once asked Meany why he didn't run for president himself," Dole said. "Meany said that it would only be a step down from his current position."

Dole also stated the Republican's strong stand against gun control and forced busing.

On the defense budget, Dole said that the present budget is practically impossible to cut and still maintain an efficient program.

"The game of world peace is a tough one," Dole said. "In order to win this game you have to deal from strength and not from weakness."

Dole went on to say that if Carter were elected president in the general election, Democratic vice presidential candidate Walter Mondale would not be open-minded about the defense budget.

"Mondale's voting record in the Senate clearly shows that he is for cutting defense costs, no matter what the circumstance may be," Dole said. "It's because of people in government like Mondale that we are having so much trouble with defense spending at

Dole summed up his speech at the theater by asking for support in the final days of the presidential campaign.

"I think it's time that we started talking about what's right with America," Dole said. "Our party has tried to be honest and candid throughout the campaign and I think we have succeeded."

"The people of this nation need to take a long, hard look at the issues and the subjects at hand," Dole said. "The best hope for this country lies in experienced and trusted leadership.

That's definitely what it's all about." Following his speech, Dole walked from the UC to Lubbock County Republican headquarters on University Avenue, shaking hands and talking with Tech students on the way.

At Republican headquarters, Dole endorsed local candidates and was given a "Crunch Carter" T-shirt by Hank Clemmons, representative of Tech's chapter of Young Republicans.

Dole thanked all of the workers at the Republican office and asked for their total effort in the final days of the

"This campaign goes far beyond our own party interests," said Dole. "Our interests now must be directed totally to the future of our nation."

Leaving Republican headquarters, Dole returned to Lubbock Municipal Airport where he departed for a campaign stop in Jackson, Miss.

Dole's visit is the first by any vice presidential candidate during a general election. It is the only one currently planned by any of the four contenders for the nation's top two positions.

Educational ethics, values and the demands made on higher education will be topics of discussion at the third annual Conference on Higher Education today and Friday at South "Higher Education Faces the

Challenge of Century III" is the theme

of the conference, sponsored by the Area of Higher Education and Junior College Center of the Tech College of

Education. Approximately 200 to 300 administrators and faculty members from West Texas and eastern New Mexico will participate in the conference, according to Dr. Kenneth Freeman, chairman of the area of Higher Education.

Dr. Stanford Erickson, senior research scientist at the Center for Research on Learning and Teaching at the University of Michigan, will address "The Challenge of Instruction" in the afternoon session.

Briscoe, White urge support for Carter

Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe Wednesday urged Lubbock residents to prove once again that Texas is a Democratic state by backing the Democratic ticket headed by Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale.

Briscoe and Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White stopped at the old Lubbock Regional Airport terminal Wednesday as part of a state wide campaign swing designed to boost the candidacy of Carter and offset appearances by Republican vice presidential candidate Robert Dole.

WHITE ALSO emphasized the importance of electing the Democratic presidential nominee.

"The governor and I are going all over the state on behalf of Jimmy Carter and the Democrats in the State of Texas," White said.

Briscoe said he was very encouraged about the Democratic ticket and wants to prove once again that Texas is a Democratic state.

BRISCOE SAID his ties with Carter went back to days when Carter was governor of Georgia.

"Texas borrowed a zero-based budget concept from Jimmy Carter when he was governor." Briscoe said. 'We need to have that kind of leadership in the national government."

Briscoe encouraged people to work "harder than ever" to put Carter in the White House.

MADISON SOWDER. Lubbock County Democratic chairman, said it has been a long time since a governor has come out to actively campaign for

the national ticket.

Part of the reason the governor is becoming more active Sowder said, may be because Texas is becoming more conservative and more of a twoparty state.

"Downstate is Carter country, but the Dallas area is more for Ford," Sowder said. "This area is somewhat of a marginal area - thought not really crucial - and both parties want to consolidate their support."

NEXT WEEK, Sowder hopes to have Billy Carter, brother of Jimmy Carter, stop in Lubbock for more campaigning.

The Democratic party is operating a phone campaign and will be doing some walking and door to door campaigning later, according to Sowder. In an interview during the stop,

Briscoe said his earlier statements concerning the inefficiency of education were related to making students better educated in op-

"I ISSUED instructions and requested aid to make job opportunities better known, provide better coun-seling, and better information," Briscoe said.

Briscoe said Texas needs more resident doctors and he supports the Tech Medical School. Briscoe said he did not know if he would support a bill to partially support the budgets of teaching hospitals with state funds.

Briscoe said he was not aware of any concern about budgeting inequities that might arise between those schools with permanent funds and those universities without, as he cuts university budgets for improved efficiency.

Sen. Bentsen speaks before Student Senate

U. S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen told students Wednesday night that more auditing is needed at all government levels to achieve government's original purpose.

Setting up foreign and domestic policy is fine, Bentsen said, but more work is needed on administrative policy on the inside. BENTSEN BRIEFLY addressed a

student senate meeting and answered questions from the audience.

Law School Senator Woody Glenn asked Bentsen about the statement made in a Common Cause publication which said Bentsen had one of the largest campaign contributions of any senator running for re-election.

Bentsen said the contribution estimate included contributions made while he was running for President along with contributions for his senatorial campaign.

CONCERNING A question asked by Arts and Sciences Senator Jullie Martin about the student loan default rate, Bentsen said he has already passed legislation for organizations to pass bonds with tax free interest to be used for student loans.

Bentsen said he is also in favor of cutting down on the number of forms which must be filled out for loan requests and simplification of the

Bentsen also said he has introduced legislation providing a tax credit to parents who save for the education of

FOLLOWING BENTSEN'S speech, Danny Koch was sworn in to fill a vacancy as Arts and Sciences senator.

Rules committee chairman David Sterrett has reported that two vacancies for senator are still open, one in Business Administration and the other in the College of Education.

Senators also passed a resolution expressing student resentment against a proposed rate increase and directory assistance charge by Bell Telephone. ANOTHER RESOLUTION com-

mending the Saddle Tramps on their fortieth anniversarey was also passed along with a resolution declaring Nov. 1-5 Education Week on campus...

Senators Chuck Campbell, Linde Lowrey and Blair Sanders were voted by the senate to attend the Texas Student Association convention in November.

Student Association President Terry Wimmer said Wednesday that approximately \$1,775 was raised in the United Way campaign drive sponsored by the SA Monday and Tuesday.

RHA discusses budget deficit

dormitories may be increased next year because of a projected deficit in the current 1976-1977 fiscal budget, according to Chuck Mundy, Residence Halls Association (RHA) programs

The projected deficit of more than \$300,000, Mundy said, is expected because of a forthcoming energy

MUNDY READ a statement from Fred Wehmever, associate vice president for Administrative Services, during a discussion concerning an upcoming energy saving contest between the dorms at RHA's Wednesday night

Mundy noted Wehmeyer as saying \$43 million was budgeted for the entire campus energy needs for the current fiscal year.

However, Mundy said, because of construction on many new buildings and renovation of older buildings on campus, the budget will not be sufficient to cover the costs for the summer sessions at Tech.

A RESOLUTION calling for an energy-saving idea contest was passed at the meeting. The contest calls for ideas on how the actual contest should be operated. The contest will probably begin in mid-November and continue through the spring semester, Mundy

The idea contest, which will begin Oct. 27, will be given to winning dorms that submit the most feasible suggestions, he said.

Another resolution concerning a new paint policy was approved also.

THE NEW POLICY, which will begin in the spring semester, will allow dorm residents to paint their rooms with paint supplied by the housing office. However brushes, masking tape and drop cloths, normally used in painting a room, must be supplied by the dorm resident, according to the policy.

The free paint will be given to dorm residents for "improvement of room only." Residents will have to supply the paint if a color change is wanted.

Look at the VP's too

Recent vice presidential debates and Sen. Robert Dole's visit to our own city Wednesday, have prompted discussions on the two vice presidential candidates.

Many may be inclined to say, "Why worry about those two guys? It's the President you're voting for."

TRUE. BUT he could end up as President.

Of the six Presidents since World War II, four been presidents. Public awareness of the onceobscure job has been increased as Americans watched vice presidents Truman, Nixon, Johnson and Ford step into the Presidency.



There was much discussion at both national conventions this year on allowing the convention to have more say in partys' vice presidential candidates in the future. Many argue the party's approval is routine and is made at the last minute in the confusion of the convention, with no time to check the nominee's record.

THE VICE PRESIDENTIAL debates told the voter very little about the men's political records. The debate consisted of cheap shots, and the usual campaign rhetoric. Discussions centered on party philosophies and the presidential candidates—as should be expected.

Sen. Walter Mondale was stiff as a board with obviously calculated gestures. Dole tried too hard to be cute and filled his talks with more one-liners than substance.

DOLE CAME OFF much better in his Lubbock appearance. He addressed himself to

the issues of the campaign, pointing out differences between the two tickets.

Dole still tried to be funny but this time most of the things he said WERE funny. He can't be criticized for dealing low blows. That's what he was "hired" to do. Ford can't stoop too low without ruining his Presidential "image." Dole was selected to provide the colorful, aggressive style of campaign oratory the President lacks.


MONDALE was selected to strengthen Carter's ties with the liberal factions of the Democratic Party, especially with labor's powers that be. Many also felt he would season Carter's anti-Washington image with Mondale's 11-year experience in the Senate.

The candidates' records, as taken from the Congressional Quarterly, point up major differences in the candidates' voting patterns. For instance Mondale voted for allowing commonsite picketing by unions; Dole voted against it. Dole voted for and Mondale voted against efforts to curb busing for school integration.

DOLE VOTED FOR and Mondale voted against reviving the death penalty for certain federal crimes. Mondale voted for a national system of no-fault automobile insurance, which Dole opposed. Mondale voted for and Dole voted agaisnt halting production of the B-1 bomber, cutting back on work on the Trident submarine. scrapping the Safeguard ABM complex in North Dakota and reducing U.S. troops in Europe by 40

Obviously, there will be disagreement on who made the wiser votes. But the main thing is to look at these candidates' records along with those of the presidential candidates.

You're getting a package deal. Make sure you like it.

A face-to-face look at personal issues

Republican vice presidential candidate Robert Dole's visit to the Tech campus was one of many "firsts."

It was the first time a vice - presidential candidate has ever visited the Tech campus in the history of the university.

IT WAS THE FIRST time any of the top four candidates for the nation's top positions had come to Tech for campaigning during a general election.

And, for me, it was the first time I got a face-to-face dose of the ever popular "dwelling on personal issues" aspect of this year's campaign.

It's true that all four candidates have been guilty of this type of campaigning. However, to listen to a candidate for one of the nation's top two positions make continous personal jabs against his ticket's two opponents is a little more than I could take.

ROBERT DOLE definitely had some things to say in his speech to the crowd at the University Center Theatre. In fact, he did make some valid comments concerning the Republican Party and its platform.

However, his continous remarks, both directly and indirectly, about Carter's Playboy interview and religious background, took away from his statements on Republican policy.

DOLE MENTIONED early in his speech that Carter was a man who "has smeared prominent Americans for whatever curious political purpose pops into his mind."

He then went into detail about Carter's interview with Playboy, stressing points dealing with Carter's slur of Lyndon Johnson.

JUST WHEN this subject was getting a little out of hand, Dole started talking about the debates with Mondale in Houston last Friday.

"It wasn't the coldness (weather) that bothered me," said Dole. "It was having to stand around all that hot air for an hour that really bothered me."

DOLE THEN went on to speak of agriculture. This pleased me, since this was supposed to be the main reason that Dole was here at Tech.

But, before he could even make a statement on Republican agricultural policy, Dole couldn't resist a personal jab at Carter. After all, the majority of the crowd had been taking all the other personal comments so well.

Obviously referring to the Carter interview with Playboy, Dole remarked, "If Carter could take his mind off 'other things' for awhile, he might see that his stand on agriculture issue is hardly valid."

THIS TYPE of personal cutting against the Democratic ticket went on throughout his speech. The cuts were very hard for me to

Dole then had the nerve to wrap up his speech by referring to President Ford and himself as "kind, compassionate men who have pledged ourselves to be as honest as we can during this election."

That statement is definitely the straw that broke this reporter's back.

IT SEEMS HARDLY fair to me that Dole can actually label himself as "kind and compassionate" when he has just finished issuing verbal abuse against his opponents.

Perhaps a person needs to be completely non-partial to either party before he can make a valid judgement of the best man for the job.

I DON'T SEEM to be able to. I don't say that Carter is innocent of personal attacks on Ford and Dole. That is definitely not

It just seems to me that, at this stage of the political contest, the candidates should try to look at the issues that will affect the nation as a whole, instead of concentrating on the personal lives of their opponents.

MONDAY, CARTER issued a statement saying that neither he nor his running mate would continue their attacks on Ford's personal

So far, they have lived up to their pledge. I wish I could say the same for the Ford-Dole ticket.

In an election year, when the future of our nation is at a very crucial stage, it seems policy statements concerning areas such as defense spending, farm programs, and tax reform should have the spotlight, instead of continuous personal attacks.

PERHAPS THE election should be decided on how many mistakes a candidate has made during the campaign. The candidate with the least mistakes would be the winner.

As ridiculous as that seems, it could be the deciding factor for many of the voters. What could a nation expect to see from a President who has been elected because he "goofed up" the least amount of times?

If things do not change very quickly, and the contenders for the nation's top two spots do not direct their statements to more positive areas, the winner could very likely turn out to be the man who makes the second-to-last goof.

Akins is a teaching assistant in drawing at Tech. She credits her Tech art department professors for success ob-




