

Roof Section Inches Way Towards Sky

Inching slowly upward, the 380-ton east roof sections of Texas Tech's new classroom and office building moved off its resting place Friday afternoon.

With "sidewalk superintendents" offering advice, the mammoth slab had moved to 13 inches by 3:10 p.m., 17 inches by 3:30 p.m., and 37 inches by 4:30 p.m.

SAND IN THE hydraulic jacks on top of the columns delayed the raising somewhat. Workers spent a large part of Friday afternoon cleaning and adjusting the jacks, after three jacks were reworked Friday morning, also due to sand.

About every two feet the slab was checked to make certain its level. After the equipment is in complete readiness it is expected the slab can be moved about 6 to 7 feet an hour.

ORIGINALLY scheduled for Wednesday morning, the lifting began Friday afternoon and is expected to continue next week, with the floor sections being raised after the roof is secured.

All slabs are expected to be in place in about 30 days, provided all goes well.

EACH FLOOR of the building is divided into three sections and weighs approximately 425 tons.

Two consoles are located on the roof section at present and are used to control the lifting. Only a quarter-inch variance is allowed in the level of the giant slabs during the lifting process.

ORDINARILY about eight hours will be used to raise a section.

The Lift Slab Corporation, using a patented process, is lifting the roof and the 425-ton floor sections by the hydraulic jacks set on top of the columns.

TWO GIANT BOLTS are attached to the jacks on each side of the columns. After the slab is

raised the steel collars around the columns are welded to the supporting contact for the slabs.

The \$1,000,000 classroom and office building will contain 72 offices and 27 classrooms, with completion expected sometime next fall.

Butler and Kimmel are architects for the building and contractor are S. R. Duncan and Sons.

Amendment Vote Set On Tuesday

Several amendments to the Freshman Class Constitution have been proposed to be voted on by the freshman class in the next general election Tuesday.

Article 5 has been proposed to amend Section 202 defining the duties of the freshman secretary, stating that the secretary is to act as treasurer of the Freshman Class.

A NEW SECTION 204 has been added on Succession with one new Clause D stating, "A President Pro-Tempore shall be elected by the members of the council to preside over the meeting in the event that the President and the Vice President are not present at the meeting or fail to comply with the requirements of their offices as set up by the Constitution."

Alterations in Section 300 on Membership and Election have been recommended to be changed from 25 to 30 representatives and a minimum of four representatives at large. Presently, the constitution reads that 25 members will be elected to the Freshman Council and the four-at-large minimum clause is omitted.

CLAUSE C on Change of Residence presently reads "If a member of the Council changes his place of residence and still remains in college, he shall continue to be a member of the Council, subject

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RESEMBLES TECH

'59 Show Is Satire On College Life

The curtain opened last night on a humorous satire of college life — strongly resembling Tech — in the 1959 Varsity Show "Something For Nothing" in the Municipal Auditorium.

The story takes place at Kingston College, a supposedly typical eastern school. A visitor comes to the college and solves all their personal problems.

Performances will be given at 2:15 and 8 p.m. today. About 2,000 persons attended last night.

THE PLAY was under the direction of John Gilbert, Tech senior who wrote the script and music.

Specific examples of reference to Tech was the boy-girl ratio, the football team who had never won a game in the history of the college and the board of directors.

THE FIRST resemblance to Tech came when Christopher Fairchild, portrayed by Ray Moore, unpacked his suitcase at the college where he was to give a lecture. While unpacking he mentioned the difficulty incurred when visiting a dry county.

"It's very hard to pack a suitcase," he said, as he removed four bottles of non-soft beverages.

The next incident occurred when Hazel Ledbetter, played by Marilyn Campbell, was trying to hook a boyfriend. She mentions the four boys to one girl ratio, but laments the fact that one is an engineer, the second hates girls, and the third, "Well, have you ever seen the third one?"

Kingston college football team had never won a game in its college history because of the lack of school spirit, which was prevented by the chairman of the school board's wife, Elvira Skinner, played by Janis Jones.

A slight resemblance to Tech can be found in the tradition-bound board of directors of Kingston college. Concerning tradition the members of the board felt the school should remain as it was in their day.

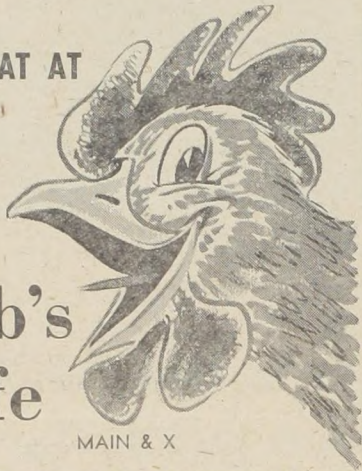

The proposed amendment shall read, "If a member of the Council changes his place of residence and still remains in the college, he shall be disqualified from the Council."

CLAUSES C and D have been added to Section 303 and read as follows: Clause C — Attendance Committee shall be composed of all the Executive Officers. Clause D— quorum shall consist of at least two-thirds (2/3) of the Freshman Council's present membership.

Leading 2-0, Tech committed five errors in the seventh frame and Curry gave up four clean singles as Midwestern plated all four runs.

Robinson Told To Defend Title

NEW YORK (AP) - Middleweight champion Sugar Ray Robinson Friday was ordered to sign for a title fight with Carmen Basilio by noon April 15, or lose his crown.

The latest ultimatum to the 38-year old champion was issued by the State Athletic Commission. At the same time the commission rejected German's Gustav Scholz, the European champion, as a suitable contender for Robinson at this time.

SCHOLZ AND Robinson's attorney, Martin Machat, had advised the commission by letter that negotiations had been completed for a Robinson-Scholz title fight before September 1959.

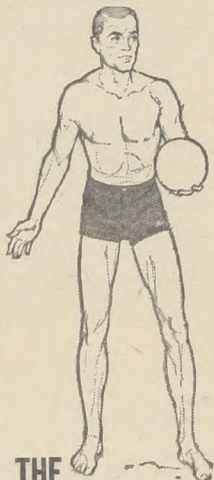
Gen. Melvin Krulwitsch, commission chairman, pointed out that commission rules require champions to defend their titles every six months. Robinson hasn't defended since he regained his jewels from Basilio in Chicago, March 25, 1958.

TECH PICKED UP single runs in the sixth, seventh and ninth innings to keep the game close. In the sixth, Ken Warren walked and scored when Joe Reaves doubled sharply to right-center. Reaves took third on a bad throw but died there when David Bourland flew out.

Allen skied out but Tom Pritchard got on base on an error, Howard going to third. Butch Adams, pinch-hitting for Miller, forced Pritchard at second on an infield ball. Howard raced to third and, hesitating only slightly, turned the corner and streaked home to score what proved to be the final run.
