Reactions To Election Are Varied

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Beatnik Student Center Plans Are Announced

Announcement has been made that plans to construct a Beatnik student union annex have been finished.

The \$500,000 annex will be a split level type construction corresponding to the neolithic-modern type of architecture already found on the campus.

The lower level will in itself be

divided into two levels. The upper level containing a snack bar featuring various types of outlawed beverages. Around the walls will be assorted sizes of cushions designed to take the place of tables and chairs. Mood music will be played through a stereo hook-up incorporated into the walls.

THE SECOND LEVEL will feature a salon type exhibition alley (complete with garbage cans) to exhibit the work of the members of the Beatnik group on campus. This level will be necessarily small as the Beatnik is famous for his lack of work.

The upper floor of the Beatnik Student Union (BSU) will feature a large brawroom for social functions of the group while a smaller portion of the level will be devoted to smaller rooms for committee meetings and discussions.

ENTIRE CONSTRUCTION of the building will be in flaming purple brick interspersed with delicate shades of hospital green for those members who are, in their own words, "Really beat." The main entrance will be of glass extending to the roof of the building with a mural depicting Beatnik philosophy. Directly below the mural will be engraved in six inch letters, "The world is no ... good."

Student leaders of the Beatnik organizations were contacted and asked their opinions on the recent announcement to construct the annex. Almost without exception their answer was the same. "Who cares!"

Need For Big Tower Is Stressed

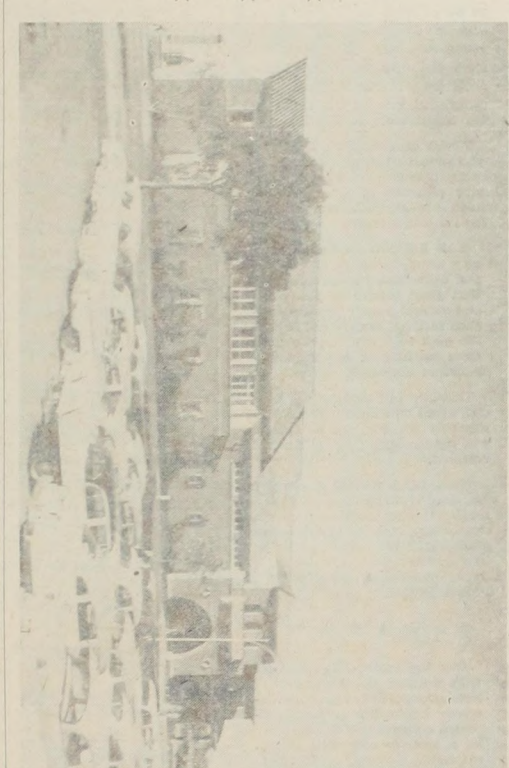

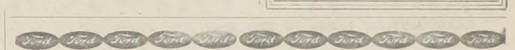

'GO TO HELL' - SMITH

"Go to Hell!" Pres. N. E. Smith urged FAC (Faculty Antics Committee) members yesterday.

Heated Discussion will center around how to keep athletes eligible after they flunk all or most of their courses at the Annual National Convention of the DAR (Defend Athletic Records), being held in Hell, Michigan, for the first time in the town's history.

"WE WILL TRY to prove at the convention that just keeping mum about an athlete's scholastic standing won't work," Dr. Blind Kall, FAC silent front, said recently. There are athlete-hating members our our own FAC who would keep Ech athletes from playing just because they don't make their grades. No school spirit at all."

Kall went on to point out that football players, particularly quarterbacks, are injured the most by these unfaithful few.

KALL ASSERTED that injured football players, approaching the ends of their Ech careers, didn't warrant any protection, and should be used as examples.

But keeping silent won't work," Kall continued. "Those smart-alec reporters from local papers will misquote you whether you say anything or not—and I never say anything; ask my fellow FAC members if you don't believe me. All those reporters ought to be sued."

Under further questioning and after further refusals to say anything, Kall said that he and the faithful members of the FAC had devised a plan that could cure the problem of keeping athletes eligible not here at Ech, but also all over the country.

"OUR PLAN would be to separate the athletic department from the college, and not even require athletes to go to class," he said. "That way they could spend ALL of their time in their respective sports."

Kall said that this measure would keep athletes clear of that disloyal segment of the FAC, and would keep the Undisciplined Bored away from the athletes also.

"We would have the athletes sweep out the basement of the gym once per week apiece, to keep the NCAA from kicking up sand," Kall continued. "By the way, please don't misquote me."

HE SAID that the plan had one weakness—it hurts those athletes who want to learn something. However, this problem could be eased by placing diploma-vending machines in the athletic dorm.

"This problem facing Ech athletics could become big enough to keep Ech from competing on the level of other schools," Kall said, "but with the help of the Misad-ministration, Bored of Bad Direction and Alumni, I'm sure the problem can be solved. Now don't misquote me, because I didn't say anything."

Keck Delivers Ech Report

At a super-secret meeting of top administration personnel in an unidentified restroom in the Administration Bldg. today, campus Gestapo head Harvey Keck gave his annual report.

KECK REPORTED that the investigation of faculty members for atheistic tendencies and moral degeneration was going well. According to Keck the entire staffs of the psychology, english, and mathematics departments need revision. "From monkeys on down there is a definite radical trend," he stated. "In the psychology department principles learned from animals are actually being applied to human beings," said Keck. "This type of cancerous thinking must be removed before it spreads to the biology department." He went on to say, "It's a wonder to me why lighting bolts haven't struck some of those people."

"Radicals, liberals, atheists, communists, perverts, oddballs, nuts, and beatniks, they're all the same," he said, "and with concerted effort we can eliminate them." Keck estimates that at least half of the student body should be either sent to Huntsville or immediately hanged.

KECK REPORTED that expenditures for putting bars on the unused dormitory wings were being kept to a minimum. He went on to commend the administration for their new method of handling unruly students. "The new plan should work remarkably well," he said. "Our only problem will be one of sufficient space."

Keck said that the Gestapo had succeeded in the complete elimina-

tion of radical writings from the campus library. "It made a glorious bonfire," he remarked, "Over forty feet high and fifty feet wide." He went on to say that plans for the removal of all non-Christian and objectionable literature from English courses were also going well. "We have eliminated the works of Franklin, Thoreau, Shakespeare, Chaucer and damn near everybody else they had," he stated.

KECK STATED that plans for the use of campus radio station KTTTC for propaganda purposes had been given up. "We find that the radio signals ordinarily go no farther than their front door," he remarked.

"Our agents on the Student Council are having a hard time meeting the standards of incompetence that we have set for them," he stated. "But by herculean effort they are getting the job done." "You will note the results of the fine job in the lowered morale, decrease in student government participation, and greater overall docility of the student body," he said.

KECK REPORTED that by time-study analysis a new arrangement of the water sprinkling system has been devised and will go into effect this spring. "I believe that we can safely estimate increased wettings and trippings of at least 100% this semester over last," he said. "Also, by putting tranquilizers in the feed tea we have lessened riots and panty raids in one fell swoop," he stated. Keck feels that a commendation is due.

Keck also made a plea for increased Gestapo Personnel. He

feels that his division is woefully understaffed. "I feel, however, that we are drastically understaffed," he said. "My entire force has a sum total of only 245 and this figure is inclusive of the 50 Security Police Officers. There is a need for at least 500. Out of the 195 secret agents at present 34 are being used to guard the president's home and 25 are protecting the athletic director. This is not enough," he said. "Several breakthroughs have occurred."

"WE FEEL THAT the taxpayers are paying for security and peacefulness on the college campus," he stated, "and we, in an all-out effort, intend to see that their wishes are carried out. It pains me, he said, "That the students don't realize that it is for their own good," Keck said. "With concerted effort a blanket of silence can be made to fall over the entire campus. Remember our motto—Anything that Russia can do We can do better!"

"So like the crazy daddys we are, and I don't mean fried shoes either Paps, we got together and revised the whole damn bit," asserted the broad-headed Campy.

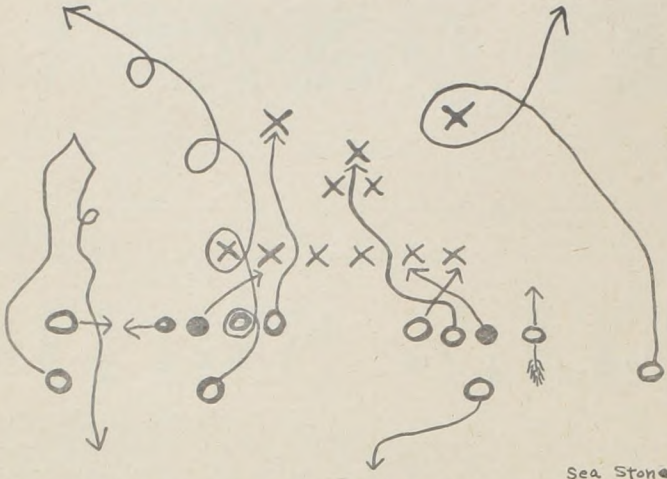

Stadium Plan Jells

Concrete plans for the enlarging of Jones Stadium for the 1960 football season were announced by the Stadium Foulup Committee today after a special meeting.

SPEAKING THROUGH his mouthpiece — Coach Deaver —, Jiminey Linseed, vice chairman of the Bored of Directors, said that

the original plans to enlarge the stadium to 55,000 had been altered somewhat.

Coach Folk Robertson announced today the completion of a 24-game roundball slate (that's basketball schedule to you non-sports-jargonists) for his 1959-60 team, which seems to be a dandy for the Red Ridder basketballers.

TWENTY-THREE OF the 24 games will be played in Municipal Coliseum, Robertson announces, with the lone hold-out being SMU, who insists to have one of its

games with Tech played at Dallas, due to the loving-cup presentations, started this year.

"I am very pleased with next year's schedule," Robertson says, adding "There's no use kidding yourself, we had a bunch of lousy games on the road this year, so we figured that the best way to combat that would be to just not schedule any away from home next year."

"OF COURSE, WE ran into some difficulty with the South-wasteless Conference," Robertson informed. "They didn't take to our idea too hot at first, but when we agreed to play all our games away from home year after next, they finally agreed."

"Darn that Gidbaugher," Robertson added aside, apparently unaware that the reporter was listening. "What does he mean horning in on my extra-curricular antics, anyway—I'm the one famous for 'em."

Robertson, or "Coacher Folk," has been known to be at odds with Athletic Misdirector Deaver lately. Coach Robertson is getting too popular, it seems, mainly because of his refusal to go along with Deaver's precedent set in the won-scrap, at Dallas last year, was

Three members of the Ech Swimming team drowned yesterday when they tripped and fell into the kiddie wading pool at a local park.

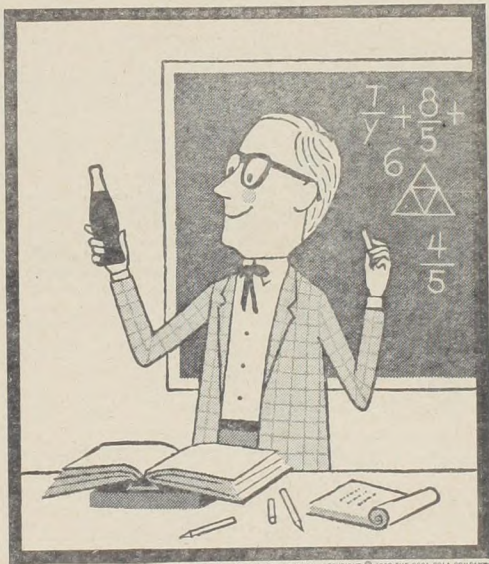

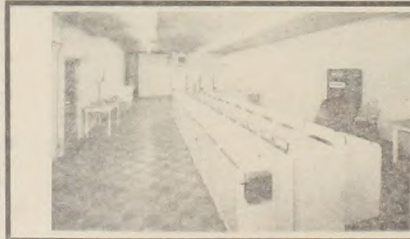

Intramural Riot Hits Ech; Brick Blamed

Tech Campus police had their hands full yesterday at the All-Campus Championship Intramural Basketball game when a bloody riot broke out between members of the Chinese Hicks basketball team and the Tappa Kegga Brew fraternity team.

The trouble started when the Chinese Hicks lost a 55-point lead to the Brewers. Ahead 56 to one, the Chinese Hicks missed 18 straight lay-up shots and in turn

had the ball stolen and were scored upon. The rest of the difference was made up in free throws all made from the dead eye arm of the Brewer goalie, 7' 10" Oscar Martin.

WHEN the Brewers went ahead 58-56 with only two minutes, remaining a Hick from the bleachers threw a brick at a fast charging Brewer, killing him instantly. This incident seems to have touched off the ensuing melee, accord-

ing to intramural director Buck Edsel.

"The brick throwing incident started a friendly little rhu barb which really got out of hand when one of the Brewers mounted a BAR in the grand stand and started spraying the court with a deadly fire," said student referee, Benny Mouszilini.

Campus police finally subdued the grand stand fire with tear gas and then turned their attention upon the free-for-all still underway on the courts. The rioters were finally quieted after use of tear gas, police dogs and a Sherman tank was thrown into action.

FINAL casualty count as determined by Campus detective Duck Tracy was six dead (including five campus policemen), 106 injured and 13 still missing. Also two police dogs were strangled and the Sherman tank was partially destroyed by Molotov cocktails thrown by fan-loving spectators.

Edsel, surveying the dead and damaged had this to say, "I don't think this was a very good example of sportsmanship. Very bad show, very bad."

College president N. E. Smith said he would have no comment to make on the incident until he had first conferred with the Bored of Misdirection to receive instructions.

Tracy also added that there was still isolated fighting going on in other parts of the campus, but he thought things would be back to normal in a few weeks.

Two Grid Hopefuls Squashed By Doors

Two promising candidates for next year's football squad were killed today when they were crushed by the door of the Administration Buildings' west wing.

The deaths of Rock Block and LM. Strong brought the death toll to five in accidents involving the heavy doors this year.

Mary Rare, a Tech co-ed, said the two men were attempting to open the door for her when a strong gust of wind caught the 1,500 pound door and crushed them.

"They were making some progress and I was just starting to try to squeeze through the small opening they had provided when the wind caught the door and overpowered them," Miss Rare said.

A SIMILAR accident took the life of Igemar Stop, a non-athlete Thursday. The week before two students were killed and six critically injured by the doors.

Rock and Strong had figured prominently in Ech's plans for the next grid campaign. Coach Deaver said he had planned to have his team work out on the doors but since only 107 candidates are expected next year, he expressed doubt the doors will be used. "We had planned to divide our men into groups of four and let them attempt to open the doors as a substitute for the regular weight lifting exercises. But Strong and Block were two of our strongest men and their deaths prove such a program would be an unwise gamble," said Deaver.

Ech Netters Could Be Right Good

Texas Ech's tennis outfit will be in the running for the South-wasteless Conference flag this season, tennis coach Phil Brickhouse announced this week. Brickhouse made the statement after it was disclosed that in workouts this season his boys have spent the afternoons playing "capture the flag."

"THIS SHOULD assure the Ridders of a good chance to capture the SWC pennant this season," Brickhouse said, "although it is a bit larger than the white hankie we've been practicing with."

Brickhouse, who is real "George", is leading the Red Ridders netters in their second year of S-wasteless conf. competition. He has two returning lettermen in Rob Basey and Jawn Spiffen. Other players are Phillip Mirringsinger and Daniel Sealey.

MAKING A BID for the team this spring is former Rikker basketballer, Waid Fox. Fox, who has fouled out of his last game as a Tech roundballer, has turned to the net game in earnest and may be able to get the ball over the net before the season is over, according to Brickhouse.

BILL PHILGGER: — The purpose of this platform is to inform fellow students of my purpose in seeking this office and to set down the basic issues which I feel are important to the students of Texas Tech. As President of Student Association I would:

6. In the election of executive officers, I'll work for strategic location of booths giving the qualifications, platform, and reasons for seeking the office.

If I am elected to this office I will put forth every effort to represent the wishes of the Student Body and fulfill the obligations placed upon this office.

VICE PRESIDENT:
DICK HEFFRON: — I feel that I am qualified for the office of vice president of the Student body because of my knowledge of the job and my ability as shown through the jobs I've already done.

My experience with Tech as I served on the bicycle race committee as chairman of the track committee. This year, I am in charge of Tech's first production of "Skit Row" which will launch Spring Festival on April 8, and I am also responsible for the "coronation ball" which will climax Spring Festival on April 11. In addition, I am again serving on the bicycle race committee as well as on the over-all planning committee of Spring Festival.

I feel that, through serving Texas Tech in these capacities, I have gained an insight into the problems facing the Spring Festival Committee at all levels. It is through this insight that I feel that I can do the best job for Tech as vice president of its Student body.

CLAUDE ROGERS: — The areas of responsibility and representation that I would carry out as vice president encompass the Student body and administration, and those of campus. On campus I would endeavor to set up a used book exchange. The use of better Student Council for student communication is one relationship I would work toward. I would inform the students where and why their money is being spent by the administration. I am in favor of a re-evaluation of the organizational setup of the Student Council, through this I intend to achieve a more efficient operation and to fulfill the primary objective of the council, true student representation.

Co-operation among students, faculty, and administration has no doubt proven instrumental in our growth. However, we still have great room for improvement. Aside from the overall long range goals in the academic, social and extra-curricular fields toward which the Student Council strives, I believe that I can personally achieve these two short-range goals by serving as secretary of the student body next year.

Without an adequate filing system, the valuable experience gained in previous years is lost. Therefore, I will not only revamp the present filing system, but also will see that thorough, informative committee reports are left to aid the Council in years to come.

Feeling that often you, as a member of the Student Association, are often uninformed as to the Council's actions and decisions, I propose to establish a regular published section in the TORREADOR telling you the problems arising in each area of Council work and the way the problems are solved by the committees in charge.

MARY ANN LINDLEY: — There is much more to being secretary of the Student Council than typing reports and letters and taking notes at Council meetings. True, these are necessary but there is a far more important qualification to consider — that of serving as an effective link between the student body and the Student Council.

Feeling this might be done by having the secretary in charge of twice-monthly columns taken from council minutes to be published in the TORREADOR. This is one way of encouraging students to attend Council meetings and to present their ideas at the meeting. The entire student body may then work more effectively to solve problems concerning Tech. Not only the students but the faculty need to be encouraged to take a more active part in Tech government. I feel it more publicity were given to inviting students and faculty to Council meetings, more interest could be shown.

One of the main functions of the student body secretary is to serve as chairman of the Elections Committee. As elections are an important part of campus life there is a definite need to encourage more students to vote in all elections. As secretary I would see that there is more supervision at the ballot boxes, and that the ballot boxes are more accessible to all students.

JOHANNA ZOURNAS: — When one contemplates for an office, he must consider well its demands. The Student Council secretary is chairman of the Elections Committee and thus all elections procedures. Even though a limit has been placed on campaign material, I feel that it should be carried further. Reasons for its unsatisfactory foundation:

1. Valuing the time taken from schoolwork.
2. Cluttering of campus with campaign literature.
3. Money should not limit capable people.

I propose that posters be put to one per candidate for the Bookstore bulletin board; that the \$50 filing fee be used to publish information in the TORREADOR about candidates and platforms. The election would be by qualifications more than by campaign tactics. Speeches in government classes would be continued and

possibly extended to other classes. A special effort would be made to place as much Student Council information as possible in the hands of each student, through published Student Council minutes in the TORREADOR, with encouragement of responses from students as "Letters to Student Council."

There would be adequate time for my working with the Student Council and each of you that it represents. I consider Student Council worthwhile and am willing to work for it and you.

The Student Council is for all, not just those running for office; therefore be alert, question your candidates and election procedures. Know the candidates so that you will welcome the opportunity to come to Student Council and question, suggest, or complain of some policy or activity. It's your Student Council and your responsibility to vote and help mold it.

Giant Problem Solved

CONTROLLING HIS diabolical humor, he answered an obvious

question by saying that he wasn't talking about a tuition hike.

"I'm not talking about a tuition hike," he said, with a suppressed chuckle. "Rather, we will plant a growth at the entrances of buildings where boys will register."

THIS GROWTH, according to Slobbanovsky, blooms four times

New Club Defends Rights

Texas Tech's newest campus organization, the Buddhist Club, came under a fierce new attack from the Hardshell Student Center yesterday which may result in the Buddhist Club being run off campus.

THE HSU FILED a formal complaint with the Student Council Tuesday, asking for permission to run the Buddhist Club off campus because of its "radical, unorthodox and dangerous beliefs, which are detrimental to the HSU and to Texas Tech."

"We simply won't allow them on campus any longer," said Bob Bibberdine, president of HSU.

"**THOSE BUDDHISTS** have been raising hell ever since they became an official campus organization," added Bibberdine, "and now they've gone too far."

The attack came as a result of the recent proposal of the Buddhist Club that the Student Religious Council, either bring in lecturers of other faiths than Christianity at least some of the time or change to title of "Religious Emphasis to "Christian Emphasis Week."

COMMENTING ON the Buddhist proposal, Bibberdine said, "I see no reason why the title should be changed. It's perfectly ade-

quate as it is."

"Furthermore," he added, "the Buddhists are atheists, immoral and undesirable. I have a suspicion that many of them are Communists."

"**IN CONCLUSION**," said Bibberdine, "if the Buddhist Club is so stupid that it can't see the fallacies in the Buddhist doctrines, then it has no right to exist on campus with decent, God-fearing organizations."

Siddhartha Bangwi, president of the Buddhist Club, angrily protested the actions of the HSU.

"**WE HAVE AS** when right on

campus as the HSU," he said, "and we have not been raising hell on campus ever since we became an official campus organization."

"As for their other accusations, I would like to remind them of the old story of the pot that called the kettle black."

"**I FAIL TO SEE** why we are being immoral, undesirable or communistic because we want a little equality in the selection of lecturers for "Religious Emphasis Week," he added.

A spokesman for the Student Council said the petition was under consideration and would be acted upon later in the week.

ACCORDING TO Slobbanovsky this thinning of the ranks of Ec male students should solve the problem of rising college enrollments. The patriotic head Sparkin' Management said that the plant is successful, he would send young plants to other colleges.

"Of course, this plant would be successful at TWU, which composed entirely of coeds, at Texas A&M, because of the type of boys attending that school," Slobbanovsky pointed out.

BESIDES LIMITING enrollment, the plant has certain other good points, he continues. Since student losses are almost entirely male, it helps to achieve a balance in the boy-girl ratio.

"And who can think of a better decoration for the campus than a plant with blossoms that are shaped like Brigitte Bardot in the nu -- I mean her natural state," Slobbanovsky said.

THE PLANT HAS ONE weakness, according to Slobbanovsky. It doesn't help the present over-expansion in dormitory building.

Turning to less pleasant subject, Slobbanovsky said that he is trying to get the Bored of Misdirection to pass a law stating that any student found walking, sitting, standing or driving on the beautiful and precious Ech grass will be shot on the spot by the Ech Insecurity Patrol and his body used to fertilize Ech trees.

"**IT'S A DISGRACE** how students walk, sit, stand and drive on Ech grass. We have paved our concrete streets, sidewalks and benches for those purposes," he said. "By the way, this measure will also help control the rising college enrollment."

Slobbanovsky said that street leading on to the campus will be blocked off in the near future — at the students requests.

Ech President N. E. Smith failed to re-sign Smith's work permit as he felt that Smith was gaining too much power in his department and "needed to be shown a lesson in back-stabbing and double-crossing."

Mrs. Lou Smith was unavailable for comment. **AS DEAN SMITH** was being dragged off to the room reservation office, he was muttering something about trying for a health permit.

Mystery Surrounds Disappearance of Three Ech Students

A feeling of near panic pervades the atmosphere in the Museum today as the search continues for the three Ech students who disappeared without a trace last week in the basement after screaming for help.

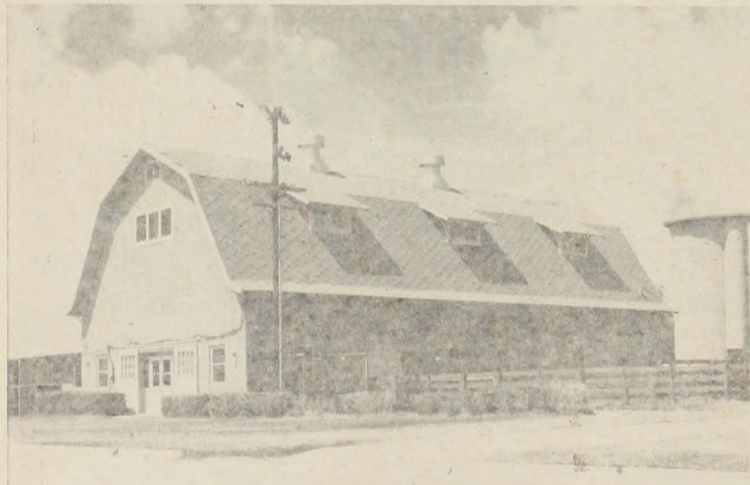
