# Lawyer criticizes

# capital punishment

Inconsistencies in our legal system have prevented and will continue to prevent capital punishment from working as an effective deterrent to crime, according to Dan Benson, practicing attorney and Tech Law School faculty member.

Benson addressed the controversial subject of capital punishment Wednesday night in a meeting of the Pre-Law Society. Benson discussed the effectiveness of capital punishment, as well as current Texas statutes dealing with the subject.

"I'M OPPOSED to it because I don't think it works," Benson said of capital punishment. The system of execution does not deter other criminals from committing capital crimes, he said. Execution only deters the murderer, "If you get the right man," he said. Racism and poverty often enter into the question of the death penalty, Benson said. In 1972, while only 13 per cent of the overall population of the United States was non-white, 53 per cent of the people on death row were non-white, he said. The discrepancies

in the percentages are probably due to prejudice, conscious or otherwise, among jury members, he said.

United States Supreme Court justices ruled the death penalty unconstitutional as it stood in 1972, Benson said. Texas, along with many other states has been working around the statute, he said.

"EXECUTION CAN, and probably will occur in the near future in this state," according to Benson. The Supreme Court is currently upholding the Texas statute concerning the death penalty, he said.

Texas' penal code states that the death penalty may be enforced in five cases: murder of a peace officer or fireman in the line of duty; intentional murder in the act of kidnapping, arson, burglary or aggravated rape; murder for a set amount of money, as in the case of a hired killer; murder while escaping from a penal institution or murder of an employe in a penal institution. These stipulations in the Texas penal code were developed to comply with Supreme Court rulings that the death penalty was being enforced arbitrarily. Fermin vs the state of Georgia, the landmark Supreme Court case which resulted in the unconstitutional ruling for the death penalty, did not bring about a unanimous decision, Benson said. **TWO OF** the Supreme Court justices stated the death penalty was a form of cruel and unusual punishment, expressly forbidden in the constitution, he said. Arbitrary enforcement of the death penalty defeated its purpose, according to other justices.

It has been ruled that persons not favoring the death penalty in any case may be excluded from juries trying persons for capital crimes, Benson said. Behavioral psychologists have determined that juries made up entirely of people supporting capital punishment are harsher in judgment of others and more likely to rule for a conviction, he said.

"If that's true, death penalty defendants are not receiving a fair trial," Benson said. "That's kind of a bleak picture," he said.

"Certainty and swiftness of punishment makes it work," Benson said, "but our system is neither swift nor certain." "If the system was perfect or near perfect. I think we'd feel differently about it," he said.

# **RHA** gives okay to **TV** survey

A survey to ask dorm residents to voice their opinions on the possibility of cable television in Tech dorms was approved Wednesday night during the Residence Halls Association (RHA) meeting.

But distribution of the survey, which was planned "as soon as possible" has been postponed until next semester.

ACCORDING TO David Stall, RHA Student Life chairman, the two remaining weeks after Thanksgiving vacation would not be sufficient time to complete the survey. The survey will be completed as soon as the spring semester begins, Stall said.

Ruth Foreman, RHA president, said the extra time alloted to the survey would be beneficial to give an accurate reading of the survey results. "I want each dorm resident to give a lot of thought to the survey because of the large amount of money involved."

THE LOCAL cable dealer is offering the service to Tech students for a \$2 monthly charge to all dorm residents, regardless whether they own a television or not.

Two awards were presented at the RHA meeting Wednesday. One award went to KTXT-FM for their new 5,000 watt tower. A check for \$345.33 almost half of the proceeds of the Oct. 16 Casino Night, co-sponsored by RHA with UC Programs - was presented to Vicki Robbins, station manager and Don Campbell, program director of


# State representatives to seek

# more aid for teaching hospital By NAN BURK **UD Reporter**

Newly elected state legislators from Lubbock are turning campaign promises into action concerning financial aid for the teaching hospital. Joe Robbins, representative from district 75-A, and Froy Salinas, representative from district 75-B, plan to sponsor bills in the next legislature in an attempt to ease financial woes for teaching hospitals throughout the state.

**ROBBINS HAS** proposed a bill to expand the tax base for the Lubbock County Hospital District(LCHD) to include as many as 23 surrounding counties. LCHD officials currently are conducting a study of the feasibility of the proposal.

The purpose of expanding the tax base, Robbins said, is to "make a unified effort of Lubbock and surrounding counties to provide a teaching hospital with a sounder



The counties in the expanded hospital district would absorb the debt of existing hospital districts and the financially troubled Health Sciences Center Hospital. By the same rule, LCHD would absorb debts of the existing districts in the unified hospital district.

THE LCHD staff currently is preparing figures on potential benefits of expanding the district.

"The counties still would have a chance to vote on whether to join the expanded district," Robbins said. If the feasibility study indicates the proposal would be advantageous, Robbins said he would introduce the bill in the legislature.

"It's going to take a PR (public relations) job on the part of the hospital district and the Tech Med School to convince the surrounding counties of the advantages of this proposal," Robbins said. "These counties would benefit tremendously because they will be receiving a better level of health care."

SALINAS SAID he plans to cosponsor a bill with a state legislator from Houston authorizing state aid for teaching hospitals.

"Right now, the state cannot legally bail out the couty or the county hospital district," Salinas said. "We need a bill

passed that will allow the state to bear some of the costs of operating a teaching hospital."

Salinas' bill will be similar to the bill State Sen. Chet Brooks plans to sponsor during the next session of the legislature.

"THE FINANCIAL PROBLEMS of teaching hospitals are not unique to Lubbock," Salinas said. "Teaching hospitals in Houston and Bexar County are experiencing similar problems." Salinas said teaching costs of the teaching hospitals should be borne by the state.

"You can't really put an exact dollar and cents figure on how much the state should pay," he said. "But the state probably should absorb from 25 to 40 per cent of the costs."

BOTH LEGISLATORS expressed concern that some financial aid for the Health Sciences Center Hospital be found to offset the huge deficits projected for the hospital.

"We have to find some way to get the hospital opened and keep it open," Robbins said. "But I don't think the picture is as bleak as it has been painted."

LCHD officials and officials from other teaching hospitals in the state will meet Monday in Dallas with state legislators to discuss possible funding from the state.


"Tech has a much tougher schedule and that was a factor. Being undefeated doesn't have much to do with it," he said.



As part of a series of changes recommended to improve police department efficiency, the Lubbock Police Department Wednesday received eight of 97 additional police cars.

The enlarged fleet of police vehicles will permit increased police coverage throughout the city by on and off-duty police officers, according to Vaughn Hendrie, city public information officer.

COSTING THE city \$480,686 the 1977model Plymouths were purchased as part of a recommendation made earlier this year by Cresap, McCormick and Paget, Inc., management consultants. Other recommendations made by the consultant firm were the city create a planning, research and evaluation staff, with a computerized record keeping system. The new staff would enable the police department to analyze manpower needs, shift assignments as necessary, and mobilize manpower to combat changes in crime patterns. The consultants felt there was an

patrol and traffic divisions in the police department.

**INSTEAD OF** dividing the effort between patrol and traffic divisions, the report calls for a universal police officer, primarily concentrating on answering calls. When not on call, the patrolmen would be enforcing traffic laws.

The consultants recommended the patrol force be deployed more effectively on the basis of work load and peak periods.

To have more patrolmen on call at any given time with faster response rates, the consultants recommended each patrolman be equipped with portable radios or walkie talkies while on duty.

BY HAVING the radios, the patrolmen needed to answer calls of higher priority could be called away from routine reports or coffee breaks, Hendrie said.

The police department has hired nine of 15 additional civilians to handle dispatching in accord with the recommendations of the consultants.

work, relieving uniformed officers for duty in the field.

A redistribution of officers to the detective and juvenile divisions was also recommended by the consultant firm to handle the growing case load.

**DETECTIVES WOULD** handle assignments, by case, following the case through until complete, rather than different detectives on different shifts handling the same cases.

One of the biggest changes, however was the recommendation to purchase the additional patrol cars. Currently, the patrol cars are driven 24 hours a day.

With the additional patrol cars, each car would be assigned to an officer to use on patrol only eight hours a day. The plan is expected to triple the life of a patrol car, plus lower maintenance costs.

According to Hendrie, the additional patrol cars would be issued to each patrolman. The patrolmen would be encouraged to use the cars for personal, in-town use.

"This was strictly a players' decision," Billick said. "The players feel that Georgia will be the highest ranked team when we play them."

WHEN THE possibility of playing Tech in the Cotton Bowl was brought up, Billick said, "But Tech has three tough games left, while Georgia (which has one game remaining against heavy underdog Georgia Tech) certainly has the less difficult schedule."

There were two main determining factors in choosing the Sugar Bowl, Billick said.

"Number one, was the area (New Orleans) which the players wished to go to. And number two, and more importantly, they felt this was the best way to reach their goal — the national championship.

"THE PLAYERS and coaches felt like this was the best place to go," he continued. "New Orleans is a wild city, but I think the players will not be taking this as a vacation bowl."

Billick went on to say that Pittsburgh could have made the wrong choice,

they're just playing the percentages." SLOAN CITED Tech's "unique" position of having three games remaining (while most other major schools are completing their schedules this week), as the probable factor in choosing Georgia as their opponent.

"It was good reasoning on their part," Sloan said. "It doesn't take a genius to figure that out does it?" As far as a preferred opponent in the Cotton Bowl Sloan said, "We don't care who we play (in the Cotton Bowl). Right now we just want to get there."

# Nan Burk Playing dodge ball with the hospital

Lubbock County Hospital District (LCHD) officials and the Tech regents are playing dodge ball again with the Health Sciences Center Hospital.

At this week's hospital board meeting, LCHD officials brought up the shared services concept again as a possible solution to the financial troubles of the teaching hospital.

When the hospital district and Tech first began to work out solutions to the hospital problem, shared services was the primary solution being considered. And the concept was a thorn in the side of both groups.

of the regents and the hospital district simply add to the confused state of affairs surrounding the opening of the teaching hospital. The date of the opening, by the way, also is a point of confusion.

The projected opening date of the hospital originally was June 1977 for staffing purposes and September 1977 for admission of patients. That date now seems to be pretty optimistic. LCHD officials will consider resetting the target opening date for the hospital at their next board meeting.

IT WOULDN'T be so hard to swallow this bitter pill if at least some progress could be detected. But in the many months that the two boards have been discussing the situation, plans and promises are the only results of the talks. At a special session of the regents Oct. 25, a committee was formed to plan a public meeting at which Lubbock County residents would be informed of the status of the hospital situation and community support for the hospital district would be encouraged. And now, almost a month later, no action has been taken toward even selecting a date for the public meeting. CHAIRMAN OF the committee, which includes representatives of the regents, LCHD and Chamber of Commerce, is Regent Bill Collins. Collins said he was "waiting for plans to materialize" and he hoped a meeting of the committee could be set up sometime this week. The committee will have a meeting to plan another meeting to determine if and when they, should set up a public meeting ... The cycle seems to be endless. It seems logical that if the regents and the LCHD board would ever stop planning meetings and commissioning studies and would get together and work the problem out, perhaps the hospital could be opened by June 1977. But as long as the board members are content to appoint more committees and crawl back into their respective offices to "study" the situation, the Health Sciences Center Hospital might just be a three-story ghost town for years to come.

On November 15, a small group of Iranian students gathered in front of the University Center to protest the "fascist" actions of the Houston Police. It is quite obvious that these students do not know what they are talking about.

These Iranian students claim that the action taken by the Houston Police was a "show of support" for the Shah's "regime" in Iran. If some of them had only watched the NBC Nightly News at that time, they would have seen that the Houston Police gave plenty of notice to the demonstrators to disperse. They did so because the demonstrators did not have a permit to demonstrate and wanted to give them a chance However, the to leave peacefully. demonstrators refused to leave and the police moved in. Some demonstrators put up resistance and the Houston Police took the appropriate action.

The Houston Police does not oppose freedom of speech when it is done according to the law. The demonstrators chose to operate outside the law and met with a predictable result.

During the demonstration in front of the University Center, an Iranian student attempted to hand me a propaganda leaflet. Instead of accepting the propaganda, I punched the demonstrator in the mouth and had the pleasure of watching him land on his more intelligent side. When the Iranian got up he said to me, "Let's go to the police!" I couldn't help but to grin, because here they were, protesting police action in Houston and now they wanted protection from the police in Lubbock!

I am not against the right of freedom of speech that these Iranians have, but I am against their anti-American demonstrations. I was born and raised in the Netherlands and came to the United States in 1968. In November 1975, I acquired U.S. citizenship and it was the best thing that ever happened to me. As far as I am concerned, this is still the greatest country in the world and it still is my country, right or wrong. You Iranians love to shoot off your mouths with unsubstantiated "facts." Until you can prove your "facts" with reliable data, why don't you shut your mouths. That way we will probably never hear from you again. If you ungrateful people won't appreciate all that the United States has done for you by letting you obtain an education here, get the hell out of the United States.

If the Shah of Iran is such a "dictator" and "murderer," it seems highly unlikely to me that he would have permitted you to study in this



# Bomb threat halts show

MOSCOW (AP) - An American Bicentennial exhibit drawing big Russian crowds was evacuated Wednesday after a telephoned bomb threat that left U.S. officials angered and suspicious of a trick to dampen the show's popularity.

The Soviet codirector, Grigory Kuzmenko, said he received a phone call at 12:24 p.m. from the Interior Ministry reporting that an unidentified man had telephoned a warning that a plastic explosive would go off at 12:30.

Some 1,000 Russian visitors inside the building were calmly evacuated from the pavilion. The exhibition, the second U.S. national show to come to the Soviet Union in 17 years, features film showings, photos, historical displays and a souvenir kit containing the U.S. Constitution and Declaration of Independence in Russian.

# **Player profile** Berlingeri cult arrives at Tech

"I looked up and all I saw was green, way off in the distance was that little red flag," said Angel Berlingeri referring to his 59-yard scamper against Arizona.

"I thought, I might not make it to the goal line but I'm sure not going to drop the ball," he said.

Berlingeri didn't score but the 200-pound fullback did lumber all the way down to the Arizona 24 yard line from Tech's own 17. He leaped up into the air, both arms upraised triumphantly, he was ecstatic. The team gathered around him joyfully pounding him on the back, the bench went wild. It was an emotional moment. At that moment the Angel Berlingeri Cult came into existence.

It was Homecoming, still in the first half against SMU when a Tech back took a handoff from Rodney Allison and smashed 9 yards up the middle. The conditions at the time made it impossible to distinguish the runner. But over the stadium PA came "...on the carry-Angel Berlingeri."

"THE ANGEL"-a small group in the stadium went wild. The cult was making itself known

"Following Berlingeri is something easy to do," said one of these self-proclaimed cultists. "He is the kind of player you can get excited about, he's a senior playing mostly in a back-up role but he's good-solid. Something always happens when he comes in."


But things haven't always been happening so well for the senior from Houston.

"Last year I was real unhappy, I didn't see how I fit in since the offense under Coach Sloan relied more on a speed back," said Berlingeri.

After racking up 385 yards and scoring two touchdowns for the 1972 Picador squad, Berlingeri made the varsity team as a sophomore. But his action that year was limited to the specialty teams. Following that were two rough years as a redshirt in '74 and '75.

"The Angel" refused to quit.

"I figured if I quit then that it would just make it that much easier to guit later on in life," he said. "This year in spring training I realized this was it for me and I just made up my mind to really work. Things have turned out really well for me." "The feeling on this year's team is really great, all the guys pulling for each other-pushing each other all the time. The reason we're winning is because of the team concept that Coach Sloan stresses so much," said Berlingeri.
