Hanoi doesn't want hawk
Wednesday's announcement from Hanol puts the war closer to its end than at any time since the beginning of escalation more than three years ago. Even though that's not too close, it's a beginning and negotiations at least have a foot in the door. to talk the announcement was only an offer contain about peace talks and at this time stil contains the phrase, "unconditional cessation of cratic Republic of Vietnam." But North Vietnam previously had been unwilling to talk at all without a complete halt of bombing, which the United States has not yet done. For this reason, it is a break. through.
President Johnson, who initiated the action and then underscored it by announcing he will not run for re-election, has accepted the invitation to talk about talks. For the first time in many months, the nation is unified over something in Vietnamthat the talks will lead to peace.
Hanoi undoubtedly realizes this, and is somewhat put on the spot by it. If it doesn't react favorably at the conference table, it is virtually putting a hawk in the White House next January. This Hanoi most certainly
