Nevada blast said to be safe

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — A major underground nuclear blast scheduled for today will make tall buildings sway slightly in cities as far as 250 miles away. Atomic Energy Commission officials said vesterday.

They added, however, there should be little if any damage as close as Las Vegas. 100 miles south of the shot point on the Nevada Test Site.

The predictions were made in a briefing at which the AEC paraded six experts to assure officials of Nevada and surrounding states of the safety of the blast, expected to have a yield equivalent to about 800,000 tons of TNT. This would be 20 times the force of a much-protested underground blast in Colorado last Wednesday.

THERE HAS been no opposition to today's test.

The Colorado detonation, a "peaceful uses" blast designed to break up underground rock so natural gas could be reached, was opposed by several groups who feared underground contamination.

Today's blast at 10:30 a.m., was described as a weapons development test of a hydrogen device. The AEC declined further details. There has been published speculation that the test is aimed at developing warheads for antiballistic

Nixon pulls more men out of Vietnamese war

WASHINGTON (AP)-President Nixon has ordered a second pullout of U.S. troops from Vietnam and the total of men involved will be announced by the White House this morning.

Signs on both sides of the Pacific point to 40,500 men between now and Nov. 30.

That was the figure and the date mentioned vesterday in Saigon by Vietnamese Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky. They went unchallenged by presidential press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler later yesterday when he announced the presidential decision to be detailed today.

Saigon already had been informed of the Nixon decision.

The U.S. commander in Vietnam, Gen. Creighton W. Abrams, flew back across the Pacific following a topdrawer conference of military. diplomatic and intelligence experts at the White House Friday. He immediately advised President Nguyen Van Thieu of Vietnam of the presidential decision.

ZIEGLER SAID Nixon actually had made up his mind late last week, prior to the Friday session.

House okays student loan incentive bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—A bill to sweeten the payment to banks on government guaranteed student loans was passed 322 to 60 vesterday by the House.

The bill, which still must clear the Senate, would permit an incentive payment -Funds for fellowships and scholarships of up to 3 per cent above the 7 per cent interest rate fixed by law for the loan

program. Opponents declared passage of the bill would mean Congress was setting the official rate of interest on government insured loans at 10 per cent.

Most of the debate on the measure dealt with the procedure under which it was considered, which prohibited the offering of any amendments.

Members who have been waiting all session long to enact tough anti-riot legislation aimed at college disorders tried to prevent the two thirds majority required for passing bills under the procedure used.

REP. EDITH GREEN, D-Ore., who led the fight against the procedure, made a last minute switch just before the roll call which probably was decisive in producing the needed majority.

Almost lost sight of in the procedure was the program itself, which provided \$669 million to 737,656 students last year. The government pays the interest for the student while he is in college if the student's family income is under \$15,000 a year.

The legislation was made necessary when the prime interest rate went to 81/2 per cent last spring and banks stopped making student loans at 7 per cent. The bill permits the government to give the banks a bonus payment that reflects the current market interest rate.

The Senate, in passing the bill last month, added several amendments which the House refused to accept. The Senate can now either take the House version or call for a conference to work out a compromise.

But he stood pat on what Nixon said at his latest news conference on June 19 when he voiced a hope for upping the ante of former Secretary of Defense Clark M. Clifford. Clifford had called in a magazine article for getting 100,000 U.S. troops out of Vietnam by the end of this year and all ground forces by the end of next year.

NIXON TOLD reporters at that time: "As far as how many will be withdrawn by the end of this year, by the end of next year. I would hope that we could beat Mr. Clifford's time table..."

When he spoke, Nixon had announced the initial troop pullout of 25,000, which was completed in August. Another 40,500 by the end of November would leave 34,500 to be withdrawn by year's end if Clifford's total were to be bettered."

Ziegler talked around a question whether today's announcement of the second stage of troop withdrawals can be viewed as indicative of progress toward peace.

OVER THE WEEKEND, there were reports the United States might cut naval personnel assigned to Vietnam from around 35,000 to 5,000. Ziegler neither confirmed nor knocked these reports down. But he did say that today's White House pronouncement would not embrace these reports.

Ziegler said, too, the announcement will not cover draft calls or proposals for changing the draft system.

Apathetic people often seem to comprise the only

real majority in the United States today. Contradiction abounds as liberals and conservatives strive to sway the apathetic. Both sides argue on the basis of logic - or, so they say. Generally, the struggle to win the apathetic boils down to the use of slogans and emotional appeals.

Consider the slogans "America — Love It or Leave It" and "America — Change It or Lose It." Valid reasons can be found to support the logic in either of these phrases. The problem is, however, that apathetic individuals do not use reason when confronted with such a slogan - they react to it.

Usually, when the apathetic person reacts to a slogan, he does so zealously, without thought for the implications of his action. The problems then become more complex.

In politics, emotional appeals are a reality in attempts to gain public support. Unfortunately, such tactics are extremely effective.

As the public reacts to slogans, jingles and other sorts of emotional appeals, the effects can be damaging in unpredictable ways.

Consider George Romney's statement that he had been "brainwashed" during his visit to Vietnam. At the time, Romney had been considered a leading candidate for the Republican presidential nomination for the 1968 elections. It is very probable that his use of such a "hot" word cost him his position as a prime candidate.

The problem lies in how to educate the public to the degree that they will become rational rather than emotional.

We believe the key lies ultimately in education. Today's education system places emphasis upon preparing individuals to fit into society. We believe such training is important, but that it shoull not take precedence over teaching individuals how to be thinking members of our rapidly changing world.

Education has become, in too many cases, the process by which we teach students how to get a degree. It is a sad case when education at the university level allows itself to fall into this pattern.

The burden lies heavily upon the shoulders of faculty members. Regardless of the course of study, nothing should be so static that a student finds himself in the position of parroting the information that has been fed him by the instructor.

As faculty members become more conscious of the need to educate students, not just train them, we should not forget that the burden of learning rests in the hands of the student.

If education at the university level cannot develop thinking individuals, our society can expect to remain away. plagued by apathy.
