## Dr. Bradford Knapp To Take Helm At Texas Tech

### Head Of Alabama Polytechnic Becomes New Tech President; Moves To Lubbock September 1

Dr. Bradford Knapp, head of Alabama Polytechnic Institute, for the past four years, will assume the duties of president of Texas Tech with the beginning of the Fall term.

Dr. Knapp went to Alabama from Oklahoma A. & M. college at Stillwater. He had previously been dean of the college of agriculture at the University of Arkansas and was chief of extension work in the south for the United States Department of Agriculture. He has been actively associated with every south-wide campaign for the benefit of agriculture. In 1928 he was elected vice-president of the Southern Association of Agricultural Workers.

Dr. Knapp is listed in "Who's Who In America" as follows: "Knapp, Bradford—College president. Born, Vinton, Iowa, December 24, 1876. Father: Seaman Asahel Knapp; Mother: Maria E. (Hotchkiss) Knapp. Higher education: Iowa State college (agricultural), Ames, Iowa, 170 years. Bachelor of Science, Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tenn., 1892. Bachelor of Laws, University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, 1896. Doctor of Agriculture, Maryland Agricultural College, Port Deposit, 1918. Married Stella White, of Clarion, Iowa, July 20, 1904. Children: Bradford, Jr., Marion C. (now Mrs. L. E. Hurst), Dewitt L., and Virginia Sells. Associated with his father several years in Southern agricultural work. Practiced law at Clarion, Iowa, from 1899 to 1900, last two years of which he was county attorney, Wright county.

6. To sponsor questionnaire to secure information from Alumni organizations that may be of considerable value to the Alumni Association of Texas Tech.

7. To provide supplies and permanent equipment—Supplies: stationery, pencils, stamps, stencils, paper for news letters, etc. Equipment: filing cabinet, addressograph, etc.

8. To sponsor Alumni exercises during commencement week—Banquet, etc.

A dues drive has just been conducted in Lubbock and vicinity. There are now about one-hundred active members (paid up members) in the Association. There should be one-thousand. Do not wait for some one to solicit you for your dues, but send them in immediately. A dues drive will be conducted outside of Lubbock soon.

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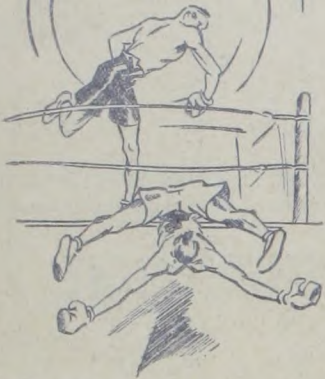

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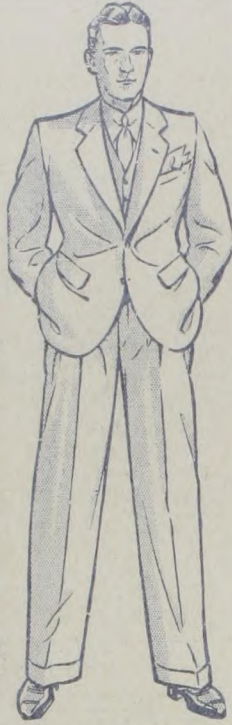

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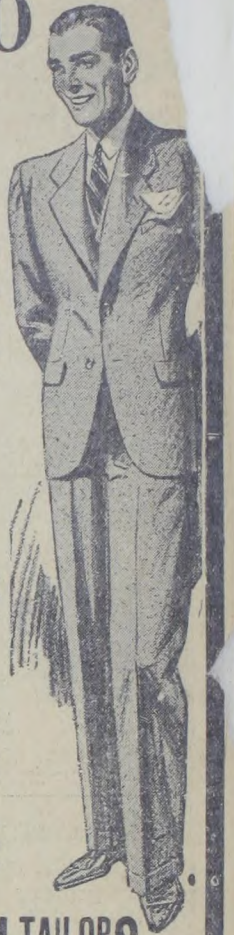
