THE 1933 FOOTBALL SCHEDULE

The officials in the athletic department have figured out a tentative schedule for next year's football season. It includes nine game with some of the stronger teams in the Southwest conference as well as Centenary and some

the Southwest conference as well as Centenary and some Border conference teams.

With the start Tech has this year, along with the reserve strength which is coming up from the freshman squad, the Matadors have a fair chance to end the 1933 season undefeated. The Toreador commends the athletic department for scheduling games with leading teams. We feel that a nine-game schedule with strong teams is better than a twelve-game schedule with weaker teams. It will not be so wearing on the players and will afford the 'fans' more real thrills and enjoyment.

The Toreador regrets that the department did not see fit to schedule more Border conference games, as that is the conference we are now in.

PRESS COOPERATION

Various campus organizations complain that they are not getting enough publicity, that their doings are not chronicled in the Toreador. It seems that these organizations are un-acquainted with the custom of giving complimentary passes to the press. Hence the lack of news concerning any particular event, if their is any lack. The fact that the Toreador does not receive tickets to meetings has no effect on the news carried about the happenings of the group. The old idea of "you give me so many tickets and I'll give you the most publicity," is out.

There have been times when a Toreador reporter has been refused entrance to a meeting and later, has had to interview some one present concerning what happened. Reporters are sent out to get news. They are not particularly interested in any special group and the idea that perhaps they are trying to crash any club or society is ridiculous.

There has been more cooperation by the athletic department officials with the Toreador this year than in previous years. In other years, Toreader sports writers have been forced to pay their way in to cover Tech athletic events. To Double T association meetings, the Toreador has never yet received an invitation. This will be remedied, perhaps, in future years.

The Toreador is always glad to get advance stories concerning events which are of news value. Any cooperation from clubs, societies, and other interested groups will be appreciated. The position of stories in the paper is determined by the news value of the story to the entire college and not to any one organization.

A function which may be pleasure to the ordinary attendant is often just so much work for the reporter. The main thing is to get the news but if pleasure may be mixed with business, well and good.

Cooperation of all persons concerned will be appreciated by the Toreador.
