

College Employs Engineering Majors To Do Practical Work In Machine Shops; Large Furnace Being Made

A VISIT to the mechanical engineering shops, located at the extreme north end of the campus behind the textile building, will give one a good illustration of how one group of F. E. R. A. workers earn their money. The work in the shops represents one of the largest single projects on the campus.

Sixteen on Payroll
Because the work is of such a specialized nature, an effort was made to put students who were majoring in mechanical engineering on the jobs. In this way, students receive more than just a paycheck. They become familiar with machinery and equipment connected with their profession. At present there are 15 men and one woman on the payroll.

One of the principal projects started last year was the construction of a large furnace, which is to be used to melt scrap iron for foundry work. The furnace is capable of delivering 1,000 pounds of molten iron an hour. The work of fabricating this 24 foot structure is now nearing completion.

Giant Slide Rule
An eight foot slide rule for demonstration purposes in the classroom has been built by one worker. It is as accurate as any one of its type manufactured.

Several workers are turning out cabinets, work benches and storage bins in the wood-work department. Others are painting the finished products.

In the pattern-making shop, workers may be seen finishing wood patterns, which are necessary for the casting in metal of needed pieces of equipment. One pattern is for the shell of an electric motor, which electrical engineering students will cast in aluminum and use to build motors as part of their class work. Another pattern is an important piece to a sand testing machine designed in the shops.

Blacksmithing Necessary
Blacksmithing is also a necessary job done by the workers. Numerous pieces of work have been turned out which were necessary for projects in the shops.

The east wing of the power house has been converted into a workshop for sheet metal work, welding, blacksmithing, metallurgy and sand testing.

Lathe work, electrical work, piping of gas, water and compressed air and safety devices are just a few more of the variety of jobs the F. E. R. A. workers are capable of doing.

The F. E. R. A. has increased the usefulness of the M. E. shops, given the students who work there an opportunity to learn more about their major, and provided a way for them to attend school.

College Student Is Held Captive For Three Days

Crawfordsville, Ind., Jan. 24.—More than a little excitement was felt on the campus of Wabash college here last week when Allen C. Bomberger, a student in the college, turned up in Chicago to report to police that he had been kidnapped from his college town and held captive three days by two men with whom he had accepted a ride.

His abductors forced him to write letters demanding money from his father, a Chicago lawyer, the student said, but finally released him after he had convinced them his father was not a man of wealth.

Eligibility Rules For Candidates To Tech Publications Offices Is Given

ELECTIONS for the offices of editors and business managers of the Toreador and La Ventana will be held the fourth week in February, according to Leon Ince, president of the Tech student council.

The constitution demands that in order to be eligible for candidacy a student must file with the secretary of the Student association at least two weeks and no more than 30 days prior to the date of election: 1. A petition announcing the intention to run for the office desired, stating that the candidate is a bona fide student of the college, the petition being signed by at least 15 percent of the qualified voters of the college.

Must Pass Nine Hours
2. A statement signed by the registrar of the college stating that the candidate, at the time of filing said petition, is registered for at least 12 hours of scholastic work in the college, and that he or she during the last scholastic semester that the candidate was in school preceding the one in which the election is held, passed at least 9 hours of scholastic work.

Candidates for the offices of editor of La Ventana and editor of the Toreador must be of a least junior standing (60 semester hours completed) at the time of assum-

New Philosophy Course Is Added

One new course, Philosophy of Religion, and two other philosophy courses will be offered next semester, according to Dr. A. J. Bahr of the department of philosophy. Freshman Geologists Are Studying Small "Ocean"

First year geologists are now experimenting with a miniature ocean. This "ocean" is a rectangular tank about 4 feet wide and 16 feet long and a foot deep. The purpose of the experiment is to study the effect of the ocean on the shore line. Part of the tank is filled with dirt shaped into islands.

Small waves have the same effect on the dirt as ocean waves have on the shore line. Waves are made by a small water wheel which is turned by a stream from a hose. Geology students observe the experiment every day.

Fair Competition Is Suggested For New College Code

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 24.—Delegates to the annual convention of the Association of American Colleges here were told that the use of "super-salesmanship" in recruiting for admissions was one of the "greatest dangers to the American educational system."

A "code of fair competition," just like that now used in business, was suggested as a need for colleges by Dr. Charles J. Turek, president of Centre College, who added:

Competition Harmful
"Unregulated competition is just as harmful to colleges as it is to business and industry."

He reported that only 30 out of 146 colleges questioned on the subject admitted that they had had no harmful effects from recruiting campaigns carried on by rival institutions of higher education.

Dr. Albert Britt of Knox college, which hasn't won a football game in so long the students can't remember it, said:

"So far as recruiting athletes is concerned, Knox is perhaps the one institution in the United States which is lilly white. Competent athletes seem to avoid Knox like the plague."
All Sinners
He admitted, however, that "all of us are sinners to some extent so far as recruiting is concerned," and said that if colleges are to exist, classrooms and dormitories must be filled. Recruiting, he said, increased in proportion to the decrease in earning powers in the locality from which the college normally draws its students.
