many work in private homes for their room and board.

The Toreador has mentioned at a previou ime in its editorial columns the long hours stu dents worked for their room and board, with special emphasis on the masculine side. Accord ing to information recently disclosed, some ginh not getting a square deal-in a few instances in treatment and others in number of working how daily.
The average cost of room and board ech students is $\$ 22.18$ per monhh. The min $\$ 30.00$ at a few places. According to NRA regulations, thiry cents an hour is considerably
under the wage paid for an hour of work. Taking that as a basis and considering that the girls work in the best homes in Lubbock, a girl should not work over three hours, and at an extrens
four hours daily for her room and board.

According to information The Toreador ha eceived, many of these girls have to work from five to seven hours daily including Sunday and are not even permited aferions or eenings off study. They seem to work under NRA regula led, and pay which is equivelant to $\$ 60.00$ nonth for room and board. This is depriving the working girl of too many of her rights, using her 5 a human puppet instead of a human being.
