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Matadors Close Border Conference Cage Race This Week

Raiders Clash With Arizona Tonight In Opening Contest Of Series Here

TONIGHT at 8 o'clock Coach Virgil Ballard's sharpshooters engage the Arizona university Wildcats at the gymnasium in the first contest of the final conference series. A single victory will clinch the third straight Border conference crown for Texas Tech. But if the Raiders expect to bowl over the 'Cats, they must "throw it in high" and play a different brand of court warfare than exhibited against the Canyon Buffaloes.

Judging from newspaper clippings sent us from the home of the Arizonans, Fred Enke is of the same opinion. The Wildcat mentor has high hopes of taking the Matadors tonight and repeating the act tomorrow evening. At least, maestro Enke voices this in a statement given to The Wildcat, student publication at Arizona university, Monday in which he said: "The Border conference basketball title may yet rest on the shoulders of the Arizona varsity."

The basket shooting season is nearing a close. The series with the revamped Arizona university team this week-end drops the curtain on the conference chase. The Hardin-Simmons Cowboys meet the Mats March 8 and 9 to bring another casaba campaign to a finish. The Matadors and Baptists are bitter rivals on the hardwoods as well as on the gridiron. No better position than the Cowboys could have been selected for the final games.

At this stage of the basketball race in the Texas conference—and it's almost over—Hardin-Simmons is leading the pack with seven victories against no setbacks. Although Billy Harris and Carol Benson, Cowboy goal-shooters deluxe, heading the Cowboy drive, are outside the select group of scoring leaders in the circuit, their average of more than 11 points per game is better than that of the ranking scorer. Harris has collected 57 points and Benson 56 in the last five games. The Baptists have been running up scores all year that topped the half century mark. So a natural has been arranged for Tech fandom when they bid goodbye to another period of court warfare with the leaders of two conferences pitted against each other. That is, at the present time the Cowboys and Mats are plying their respective conferences. As far as we are con-

Conference Pacers Need One Victory To Cinch Third Loop Title

WITH their third straight Border conference cage banner virtually clinched, Coach Virgil Ballard sends his Matadors against the Arizona university quintet on the Tech court tonight at eight o'clock. The loop leaders close the circuit campaign tomorrow night in the second game of the series with a single win clinching the title.

Taking a green team at the start of the season, Coach Fred Enke has moulded the visiting team into a tough assignment for any opposition. At the present stage of the race, the 'Cats are occupying third place in the loop ladder with five victories against three setbacks.

Co-Captain Billy Jack, who wrenched his knee in the Whittier series early in the season, may be able to play some during the series.

This week's practice sessions by the invaders found Winters, one of the best centers in the loop, occupying the topoff post with Vickers, Palm, and Duwe alternating at guards. All of these guards have been bruised up of late but will be in tiptop shape for the skirmishes against the Matadors.

Returning from battles with their traditional rivals in cage circles, the West Texas State Buffaloes, late Tuesday, the Raiders set to work Wednesday in preparation for the invasion of the Enke-men. Coach Ballard has sent his charges through workouts during the week to polish his cagers in both departments of play for tonight's engagement.

The Teachers have only won six contests during this period of rivalry.

Classy Floorwork

In the opening game of the series, the West Texans exhibited a classy style of floor work combined with accurate goal shooting to take the lead in the first minutes of play and hold it until the final gun. At the midway point, the Bufs were leading by the score of 17-13.

Co-Captain Will Gilmore of the invading quintet annexed scoring honors for the initial affair with ten markers. Davis, Buff forward, was runnerup with tossing nine points through the circle.

Taking their third game in four meetings this season, the Bison triumphed over the Red Raiders Tuesday night, 28-21. The score was 11-6 at the intermission period.

Crews Is High

Leroy Crews sent two field throws and four gratis shots through the bucket for a total of

eight tallies to pace the scoring of the second game. Davis, runnerup for scoring honors in Monday's engagement, and Curly Wilkinson, tied for second place in the scoring with six markers each. Gilmore of the Raiders and Captain McMinn and Walker of the Teachers followed close behind with five tallies apiece.

The Canyon Yearlings nosed out the Tech first year basketekers by a single point in a five minute overtime combat. The score was 23-22.

While the late Knute Rockne was football coach at Notre Dame university, his gridiron teams won 105 games, lost 12 and tied 5.

Charley Hornbostel won the Boston 1,000 yard run but lack of cooperation kept him from breaking the record.
