## Iranian oil workers return to jobs


#### Abstract

37,000 oil workers llocked back to their jobs Tuesday, ending their $y$, ending their strike against Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi. But troops opened fire on two anti-shah demonstrations west of here, killing at least three persons and wounding at least three persons and wounding 19, the official Pars news agency reported. The agency said the casualties occurred in Sonqor, west of Tehran, where protesters set fire to the offices and home of the provincial governor. The deaths raised the governor. petition will be better in the next election than in the one just past, which yielded a three-
seat gain. The terms of 24 Senate Democrats expire in 1980, while Republicans will
have to defend only 11 seats. have to defend only 11 seats. Among the Democrats facing re-election contests next time are three senators who saw their seat mates ousted by
Republicans Nov. 7. Sen. Gary Hart will be up for a new term in Colorado, which ousted favor of Senator-elect William L. Armstrong. Sen. John C. Culver's term expires in Iowa, where Republican Roger Jepsen ousted Sen. Dick Clark. Sen. John A. Durkin, who won
his first term only after a rerun his first term only after a rerun
election, will be up for reelection in New Hampshire, which has just replaced Sen. Thomas J. McIntyre with Republican Gordon Humphrey. There are other swing-state liberals facing 1980 contests, too; like Birch Bayh of Indiana, Mike Gravel of Alaska, Patrick J. Leahy of Vermont, Alan Cranston of California
Frank Church of Idaho.

For Carter strategists, the
changes decreed by the voters in 1978 raise some potential problems, too. Pennsylvania, Texas and Wisconsin, for example.
