LAAF Vets Call Meet, Protest

Veterans housed at Lakewood Village at LAAF held a town meeting last night to protest the actions of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce in giving priorities on apartments under construction to employees of the Veterans Administration, according to Murphy Root, mayor of Lakewood Village.

A veteran living at LAAF said yesterday that the Chamber of Commerce had promised Tech veterans again units which are being completed. The number has been cut to 50 now and the remainder will be occupied by V4 employees according to veterans who were on waiting lists for the units.

The recommendation, if adopted, will provide for issuance at the time work is completed of a certificate to each student earning a degree. This certificate would serve the student in all phases of his activity, pending formal awarding of the diploma.

Sept. Draws Near

Two plans for providing housing on the campus for married veterans who are students at Tech were being considered this week by members of the college board of directors.

The Veterans Housing Cooperative, formed by students, has proposed that about 100 pre-fabricated homes be erected on land between the aggie building and 19th street, the veterans to pay for the structures and the college to provide land and connect utilities.

Certain directors have proposed bonds be issued and Tech finance the entire project by this means.

A committee representing Tech, the veterans and Lubbock business men last week flew to Austin to confer with Attorney General Grover Sellers on legality of constructing the homes, without Tech owning the properties. No definite answer is understood to have been received.

Various technicalities are involved in erection of the homes under either plan. Study of every phase was being made by officials this week and a final decision is expected within a short time.

Whether the homes might be erected before the opening of the fall term was a moot question this week but officials promised all possible speed. Tentative negotiations have been opened with firms manufacturing the pre-fabricated structures and early delivery has been promised, in case either program should be adopted. Greater delay is anticipated in connecting utilities.

Federal Aid Sought For More Facilities

Veterans To Pay Activities Fees

Veterans enrolled at Texas Tech, and all other state-supported schools of the state, will have to pay their own activities fees this fall, it was indicated this week.

The Veterans Administration has indicated that since the fee is optional there is no means under the law by which it may be included in the money paid by the government for education under the GI Bill of Rights. During the last school year and this summer veterans enrolled at Tech were given their activities books under the assumption the VA would repay the college.

Officials of Tech and other Texas schools have been negotiating with the Veterans Administration for an adjustment and change in ruling but latest information is that they will be unsuccessful.

gations in educating veterans, Tex-as Tech this week requested the government to include the college in its program of setting up addi-tional non-housing facilities on the

in its program of setting up additional non-housing facilities on the campus.

President W. M. Whyburn, acting for the college, made application for allotment of a share of the \$100,000,000 recently made available through the Bureau of Community Facilities of the Federal Works agency to provide temporary classrooms, laboratories, dining halls, infirmaries, administrative offices and other facilities.

Tech's application pointed out the college, with an expected enrollment of more than 50 percent higher than last spring, needs additional ROTC space, classrooms, ROTC space, a dispensary-clinic, repair shops, offices, a lecture auditorium, physical education building, and veterans guidance center, if it is to adequately meet its obligation of caring for veterans.

Under the program the Works agency would erect the buildings for educational institutions and would remove them when the emergency is over. The college would provide ground, sidewalks, streets, utilities and other things.

Tech, Dr. Whyburn said, has received formal notice of meetings at which the program will be discussed and at which progress toward alloting of buildings will be made. Tech is asking a sizeable amount of aid.

Dr. Whyburn said the government move will permit thousands of additional veterans to gain an ed u c a tion more quickly, since many schools, including Tech, have been unable to secure adequate facilities, partly because of building restrictions.

Dorms May Raise Room, Board Fees

Some increase in room and board in dormitories on the Tech campus this fall is expected, a check with college officials this week disclosed. The higher fees will be necessary, it was said, because of the gain in cost of foods. Some sources indicated the total cost of room and board may be \$45, while others said \$50 may be necessary. The new catalog, in setting up \$350 as the cost of room and board for the long term, provides that the college may after the charge "should there be a material change in the cost of food or other services, making such a change necessary." It is the aim of the college to conduct the dormitories as economically as possible and to furnish room and board at the lowest possible figure consistent with the services rendered and proper use of the adormitories."

Virtually all colleges and universities of the nation this fall will go up on their feeding costs. The University of Texas has announced board in dormitories will be \$45 a month, or that expected for room and board at Tex-Rooms at Texas generally are set at \$15 a month, in addition to the \$45 board.
