before we leave in early No vember. The Ways and Means Committee plans to bring it to the floor any day now and we expect it to be passed overwhelmingly," said Combest in a telephone interview Friday. One of the first major changes that Combest pointed out is a shift of the burden of proof from the taxpayer to the IRS. No longer will taxpayers be "guilty until proven innobe "gl."

Combest said that the main problem has been "how the IRS has been treated people."
Combest himself has been asked to intervene on behalf of citizens before, when the IRS has bullied and threatened people with unreasonable demands, demands that are sometimes the result of IRS mistakes.
In fact, Combest reported that in 1993 the IRS ov
charged $\$ 5$ billion in penalties.
"The move is on to change the way the IRS does business and the next step will be a change in the tax code itself," said Combest. "I have spoken in complete agreement with taxpayers who simply wish to pay the taxes they owe and not have their money wasted."

## USDA

reports high quality
LUBBOCK - Early samples moving through the USDA Lubbock Classing Office are reflecting high quality and good color grades according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.
However, Wendell Wilbanks, Lubbock Area Director,USDA Cotton Division, has concern over the lower-than-normal leaf grades he is seeking, "In the first 100,000 or so bales classed this season,
we are getting a lot 5 and 6 leaf grades that otherwise is high quality and good color," says Wilbanks.

A leaf grade of 6 can decrease the value or sale price of that cotton by as much as 900 points, or 9 cents a pound, in the pricing system.
Wilbanks commented he exposed to a freeze. He considers some of the problem to be associated with plant regrowth that will discontinue after a frost or freeze finally terminates the crop

Wilbanks expressed greater concern than 30 percent of the crop classed so far can be described as "Light Spot." "This is considerably higher than in past years," commented Wilbanks.

Patrolling takes up most of officer's time

When children pretend to be police officers, they excitedly scamper around chasing criminals and convicts, always ending with a dramatic shoot out.

But in "real" life there aren't constant chases or shoot-outs. In fact, most police officers spend about 90 percent of their time patrolling, something that may not seem exciting to a seven-year -old, but something very essential to "real" police action.
"Quite a few people think we are just out to write tickets and generate revenue. We have no quotas and writing tickets has no effect on our pay. But,
working the streets is part of our job. We have to keep the them safe," said Sergeant Randy Smith of the Muleshoe Police Department
An average day for "Muleshoe's finest" includes a 15 -minute briefing at the beginning of each shift to catch up on the day's events, tieing up loose ends from the prior shift, running calls, and yes, the inevitable patrolling
But patrolling never be But patrolling never be-
comes routine, Smith said. In fact, the officers make a point out of changing their patrol patterns in order to ensure maximum safety by being unpredictable to prospective criminals.
"Even though we spend a
lot of time in our vehicles, the job is still fun and exciting. Everyday is something new, Everyday is something new,

Although the force is working hard to make a positive impact on the everyday lives of Muleshoe's citizens, the public hasn't forgotten about problems in the past, Smith proble
