U.S., Saudi Arabian forces start exercise in Persian Gulf

ABOARD THE USS O'BRIEN - U.S. and Saudi Arabian forces Thursday began a six-day amphibious exercise in the Persian Gulf codenamed "Imminent Thunder." Iraq called it a "provocative act" because it was close to Kuwait.

The exercise involved 1,000 U.S. Marines, 1,100 aircraft and 16 ships, including the aircraft carrier USS Midway, which arrived in the region earlier this

The exact location of Imminient Thunder was not revealed under military policy and a news blackout was imposed for the initial phases. Press reports have said the exercise would be 10 miles from the Iraqi-Kuwaiti border.

Bush was to leave Washington Friday evening for the trip, which will begin with a one-day state visit to Prague, Czechoslovakia.

On Sunday, on his way to Paris, Bush will pay a five-hour visit to recently reunified Germany. He will meet with Chancellor Helmut Kohl at Kohl's home in a suburb of Ludwigshafen.

After three days in Paris, Bush will begin the Middle East segment of his trip. He will visit U.S. forces in the Persian Gulf on Thanksgiving Day.

The White House will not discuss specific sites for security reasons, but Bush is expected to visit forces both on a naval vessel and in desert encampments in Saudi Arabia.

Bush will wind up the eight-day trip with a stop in Cairo, Egypt, on Friday, where he will meet with Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak.

### Profs discuss German reunification

Changes which caused the reunification of Germany flowed naturally because young people had a desire for freedom, a native German said Thursday.

Ulrich Goebel, chairman of the Germanic and Slavic language department, said during a forum on the implications of a reunified Germany that he thought the reunification was a good idea, and he will still think so 20 years from now.

John Gilliam, Tech economics professor, agreed with Goebel that the world does welcome the reunification of Germany. However, Gilliam said he was concerned about the short term economic implications for West Germany.

"The economy of East Germany is a basketcase," Gilliam said. "West Germany has an enormous financial burden placed on their people because the cost of rebuilding East Germany would shift to them."

In a 10-year period, it will cost more than \$400 billion to clean up the pollution from and modernize East German production facilities, update the transportation and communication systems, support future unemployed East Germans, and update the East German education system, he said.

Implications of the reunification to the United States

is hard to know, Gilliam said. However, the biggest effect of the reunification will be the withdrawal of the large military force. The military personnel will no longer need to be so large.

"United States military represents a source of income for the community. I have been told the Germans do not want us to leave," he said.

Gilliam said implications to the rest of the world are also difficult to perceive.

"West Germany has probably been the biggest supporter of the common market, but with the present financial burden of updating East Germany, it is questionable if West Germany will be able to play this role in the common market," Gilliam said.

Lawrence Mayer, a political science professor, said the success of democracy in Germany is a big question

"Do East Germans really want the abstract values of freedom and tolerance that democracy represents? Or, do they only want the material goods the West has to offer?"

"If Germany is going into an economic crisis for the next 10 years, I am not sure how strong their committment to democracy will be."

### Tell us how you feel: Student Senate to consider updating reapportionment procedures, new methods

The Student Senate is required by the Student Association constitution to determine annually the proportion of representation in the Student Senate. The 1990 Senate Reapportionment Act is voted upon at the first senate meeting following the announcment of the official enrollment figures for the fall semester.

The policy currently being used was adopted by the Student Senate on Nov. 8, 1973. The Student Senate must update our apportionment procedures and establish appropriate methods and formulas as a result of two constitutional amendments which the student body adopted on March 7, 1990.

The first amendment adopted by the student body last spring was to increase the number of senators at large in the Student Senate from three to five

members

The second amendment adopted by the student body last spring was to entitle each academic college/school to at least two members of the Senate.

The 1990 Senate Reapportionment Act, which was introduced by Senator Elena Perales, will apportion the Student Senate according to appropriate methods and formulas.

At our meeting last night, the senate began discussing exactly what the "appropriate methods and formulas" will be. The 1990 Senate Reapportionment Act was referred to the committee on rules and administration for further consideration. The senate will consider the committee's recommendation and the 1990 Senate Reapportionment Act at our next meeting on Nov. 29.

The Student Senate is required constitutionally to determine the apportionment procedures. It is our hope to have input from the student body so we may make the best decision possible for Texas Tech.

We ask that interested students please contact the senate to let us know how they feel about the 1990 Senate Reapportionment Act.

## U.S. faces nightmare of crisis

So often, the worst thing about a nightmare is waking up, remembering that you have had the same dreadful dream before, and knowing that you will have it again.

And of course you do. The confusions and mistakes of life that created the terror of the night have not been worked out, so it returns.

Sadly, the errors of U.S. policy that did so much to create the Saddam Hussein nightmare have not been faced in the daylight by our leaders. So we are in danger of making them again.

Only the president can free the country of the nightmare — by telling the truth about the past and looking into the future with every bit of intellectual and political candor in him.

Until Bush does it, at least we can tell ourselves some truths, as close to the bone as we can get.

One truth: Saddam Hussein is a neighborhood killer who rose to regional power with the help of Arab governments that did not care what he did as long as he left their own necks unslit.

Second truth: Then the major nations built him into a first class military power. The Soviet Union stuffed him with tanks and planes, France shipped missiles, Germans sold him equipment and basic chemical ingredients for poison gas weapons.

Third truth: Appeasement was the key to U.S. policy on Iraq. U.S. policy was based on the theory held by officials in the State and Commerce Departments, White House and National Security Council that we should help the vicious, aggressive Iraqi tyranny as counter to the vicious, aggressive Iranian tyranny.

Sick — but even so, why appeasement continued after the Iran-Iraq war ended should provide work for journalists and Congress.

Fourth: An influential number of U.S. officials and some members of Congress were willing to strengthen a fascist power, the

only appropriate description of Saddam Hussein's Iraq.

Democracy, human rights, the First Amendment concepts of the U.S. Constitution — all nonsense, sentimental garbage to the Washington officials, U.S. ambassadors and congressmen who licked Saddam Hussein's boots.

This is the fifth bone truth: Still in office are officials who were part of the policy, from Secretary of State James Baker down.

Some of them will spend their days trying to justify and repeat appearement of Middle East fascism — as will the like-minded journalists and academics.

They believe that since Saddam is "not as bad" as Hitler or Stalin, the principle of non-appeasement is repealed. So they talk of "containing" him with terrified Arab regimes.

But the brutality, weakness and

social corruption of our Arab allies create the problems of the Middle East. Left to themselves they will contain Iraq as a chicken contains

But even our commander in Saudi Arabia, Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, took it on himself to talk about how destroying Saddam Hussein's government might hurt the Middle East balance of power, whatever that is.

The White House was not amused, but who wants to smack down a general on election eve?

It's no wonder that throughout the United States, Americans are confused as to why we are guarding archaic despots from an upto-date despot.

Bush tries so hard to psych out Saddam Hussein that he bewilders his own countrymen. Many believe that the benefits of the only way to end the nightmare — wiping out Iraq's missile, nuclear and chemical weapon installations —

are not worth casualties.

If Bush believes that, he should get the troops home by Thanksgiving instead of visiting them.

But he does have to say clearly whether destruction of Iraqi missiles, chemical weapons and nuclear power is in U.S. interests and worth fighting for now, if need be.


Or does he want to wait until Saddam Hussein actually develops nuclear bombs and then ask the Israelis to go get him again — if they can.

U.S. soldiers are entitled to know they are sharing Thanksgiving with the president in the desert for a purpose they can support, or whether it is all part of an unresolved American nightmare.

### Proper dental hygene can save teeth

Most people are attached to their teeth and would probably do anything to keep them. Nevertheless, the two most common causes of tooth loss — tooth decay and gum disease - are largely due to inadequate or improper dental

Carol Plugge, student health educator at Student Health Services, said gum disease, gingivitis and periodontitis, is the leading cause of tooth loss among American adults. Yet, gum disease can be prevented by proper dental selfcare, regular professional checkups and good oral hygiene habits.

Gingivitis is the early stage of the more serious condition periodontitis. Gingivitis is caused primarily by deposits of plaque that adhere to the base of the tooth.

Plugge said symptoms include red, swollen, glossy-looking gums that bleed easily upon brushing. Left untreated, gingivitis can lead to periodontitis, a disease in which hardened plaque or tartar pries the gum away from the teeth and erodes the bony structures that support the teeth. Periodontitis eventually causes tooth loss.

Symptoms of periodontitis include chronic bad breath, a foul taste, loosened teeth and/or widening of the spaces between teeth as well as a sensitivity to cold, hot or sweet foods.

"Brushing is one of the most important things we can do to keep our teeth healthy and cavity free," she said. "Brushing the right way takes no more time than brushing the wrong way."

Basic techniques include using a

soft-bristled brush and brushing each area 15 to 20 times before moving to adjacent teeth.

For outside surfaces, place the brush horizontally at a slight upward angle against the gum line. Brush lightly back and forth without scrubbing too hard.

For inside surfaces of the upper front teeth, place the brush vertically against the teeth, using short downward strokes over gums as well as teeth. For the lower front teeth, use short upward strokes. For the inside back teeth, use short angled strokes.

For the chewing surfaces of the teeth, back and forth motions should be used for both upper and lower teeth.

Flossing your teeth daily also helps remove food particles and plaque that can lead to tooth decay and gum disease, Plugge said.


"Flossing only takes a few minutes, but it can make the difference between keeping your teeth or losing them," she said.

Ideally, one should floss whenever brushing, Plugge said. A person should try to floss before going to bed at night.

To floss, wrap most of one to two feet of dental floss around the middle or forefinger of one hand, and the rest of the string around the same finger on the other hand. Hold a one-inch section of floss between your thumbs and forefinger and use a gentle sawing motion to slide the floss between two teeth.

Plugge said that at the gum line, gently slide the floss around the bottom of the tooth until resistance is felt. Use an up-and-down motion to wipe plaque from the side of each

The following tips can help a per-



son care for his or her teeth to keep them for life:

 Avoid sticky sweets such as honey, candy and pastries that adhere to the teeth and "feed" decay-causing bacteria.

 When eating sweets, eat them as part of a meal and be sure to brush afterwards.

 Brush thoroughly a minimum of twice a day — ideally, after each

Replace worn tooth brushes —

they will not clean teeth properly.

• Use a flouride toothpaste. Floss between teeth a minimum of once a day before going to bed.

 Have teeth cleaned professionally by a dentist or hygienist at least once a year to remove tartar that brushing and flossing can not dislodge.

 Have annual dental check-ups and keep on smiling.

Pupa's cards are aimed at giving both Operation Desert Shield soldiers and their loved ones a chuckle. "I hope the cards can help boost morale by taking a lighthearted look at a serious situation," she said.

Pupa has designed 10 different cards for soldiers stationed in Operation Desert Shield to send home to families and friends.

Marketed through Pupa's fledgling company, Operation Mail Call, the cards are due to be available for sale in Army and Air Force Exchange Service branches in the Persian Gulf before Christmas, said Guy G. Ormiston, senior buyer for stationery with the Dallas-based AAFES.

"They came in directed for girlfriends, mothers, sisters and relatives on this side of the pond to ship over there," he said. "I suggested to her that she kind of





## Cougar roadblock impedes Raiders' tourney wishes

Coach Mike Jones and the Texas Tech volleyball team take another step toward earning an invitation to the NCAA Tournament as they play their last Southwest Conference match of the year at 7 p.m. Friday in the Student Recreation Center

when they host Houston. Should the Red Raiders (27-2) fall to Houston, they would be tied for second in the conference with the Cougars, which could possibly dampen their hopes for an NCAA Tournament bid.

Tech is coming off a win over nonconference foe Southwest Texas earlier in the week in a three-game match 15-12, 15-12 and 15-1.

With the offensive help of outside hitter Sabrina Zenon and defensive play by setter Sheila Solomon, the Raiders beat the Cougars in a threegame match on Oct. 20 when they traveled to Houston and won 15-5,

16-14 and 15-6.

Zenon racked up 10 kills in the two teams' last meeting while Solomon led the defense with nine digs during the match-up.

Tech, who has won nine straight, is currently holding on to the number two spot in league play behind Texas.

The Cougars are in third place in the conference after defeating Rice on Wednesday to improve their record to 17-12 overall and 6-3 in SWC play.

Houston's win on Wednesday gave fifth-year coach Bill Walton his 100th win with the Cougars and maintained its upward surge of winning six of their last eight matches.

Tech stayed at No. 16 in the AV-CA/Tachikara Top 20 Coaches Poll and No. 13 in the NCAA National Poll this week.

The Raiders are ranked second in the NCAA South Region Poll behind Texas. Houston is at the No. 11 spot.

The Cougars are ahead of the Raider squad in team hitting percentage. Houston is third in conference competition with a mark of .170. Tech is not far behind with a .160 mark in league matches.

Houston is also ahead in the kill averages catagory with an average of 13.87 as opposed to the Raider's 12.58 average.

Houston middle blocker Latisha Charles was named SWC player of the week as she averages 3.63 kills per game.


Charles has accumulated 94 kills on the year and tallied 15 in this week's match against Rice.





### Raider comeback falls short Tech's three-point shooting can't stop loss

Texas Tech coach Gerald Myers called upon junior-transfer Stacey Bailey for the second game in a row to work his three-point magic, but this time the Red Raiders were not so fortunate.

Bailey's three-point attempt with :05 left to play fell short, giving Australia's Newcastle Falcons a 77-75 win over Tech Thursday night in Lubbock's Municipal Coliseum.

"I thought we had real good effort," Myers said after only his third exhibition loss as the Raiders' head coach. "I'm not disappointed in our effort or the way our guys competed."

"They were five (points) down near the end and could have given in, but they played hard."

Senior guard Bernard Saulsberry, who scored only two points in the first half, led an inspired Raider team on a secondhalf comeback charge that saw the lead change hands 10 times.

"I was a little nervous, but I felt points in the second half. like I was into the game," said Saulsberry, who finished with 10 points and five assists. "I was so hyped up for the game."

Falcon guard Al Green, who high 15 points. finished with 16 points, shot a perfect six of six from the freethrow line, sinking two shots with :15 to play to give Newcastle the Johnson.

Tech faced a five-point deficit with 1:01 left in the second-half, but the Raiders would not give in.

The Raiders took a 16-7 lead early in the first-half as Bailey drilled a three-pointer with 7:29 gone.

Freshman point-guard Barron Brown had the hot-hand for Tech early as he sank consecutive threepointers to give the Raiders an 8-2 lead with 4:38 gone in the first-half.

#### Great Midwest becomes newest league

CHICAGO (AP) - The structure of Division I college basketball continued to change Thursday with the official creation of the Great Midwest.

The formation of the NCAA's 34th conference ends DePaul's independent status. The Blue Demons join Alabama-Birmingham, Cincinnati, Marquette, Memphis State and St. Louis University in the non-football conference which will begin play in the 1991-92 season.

It may also mean the end of the Metro Conference which now has four members with the defection of Cincinnati and Memphis State on top of prior departures by Florida State and South Carolina.

DePaul, passed over for an NCAA tournament bid last season with an 18-14 record, has been looking for years for a league that could help its postseason chances and simplify scheduling opponents.

The offices of the Great Midwest will be located in Chicago as is DePaul, but little else is definite.

Marquette and St. Louis came in from the Midwestern Collegiate Conference, while Alabama-Birmingham was in the Sun Belt Conference. Louisville, Dayton and Detroit have been mentioned as early candidates for expansion.

Metro commissioner Ralph McFillen said Thursday his conference will step up its meetings with prospective members after the Great Midwest's official announcement.

Under NCAA rules, the new league will have to wait five years before it can be considered for an automatic NCAA tournament bid.


