Parking expansion plans await approval

Parking plans for the Wall/Gates-Hulen/Clements residence halls parking lots call for an increase in the number of parking spaces for students living in these complexes.

Texas Tech Traffic and Parking Coordinator Gail Wolfe said this complex is the most congested one on campus, with about 300 students on a waiting list for residence hall parking permits.

Art Glick, Tech's landscape architect, along with his assistants, constructed a schematic design and a general description of the parking lot expansion. The tentative plan will extend the south lots toward 19th Street and move the lots closer to the residence halls, providing more parking in the center of the lots.

The increase will provide more residence hall parking spaces, eliminating the need to park in the overflow lot located across from the Student Recreation Center.

Glick said he wants the expansion not only to be beneficial for parking but also aesthetically pleasing to the

"We want Tech to look like a college campus, not like downtown Lubbock," he said.

Lt. Eddie Huckabee of the Tech Police Department said that last semester Tech sold parking permits on a first-come, first-served basis to students with proper identification living in the residence halls. Bush promises not to stop until Iraqi troops surrender Kuwait

WASHINGTON — President Bush resolutely warned Saddam Hussein on Thursday that allied forces will keep pounding Iraq until he surrenders Kuwait. The administration slammed the door on diplomacy and warned Baghdad that attacks will intensify if it uses chemical or biological weapons.

"The pause for peace is over," the State Department said. "The talk is over."

United Blood Services officials announced Thursday that its facility will collect 27 pints of blood and other blood products each week for Operation Desert Storm.

needs of area patients.

"People should not panic right now," Pearson said. "If people begin to flood the center with donations at this point, we will not be able to make use of all the blood because of its short shelf-life."

Pearson said the Armed Services Blood Program currently is meeting the military blood needs effectively. By blood donation centers committing to donate specific amounts each In response to a number of calls the week, the program will continue to keep an ample blood supply.

The nationwide network of United Blood Services officials has pledged to send 530 pints of blood per week to McGuire Air Force Base in New

The center currently is not meeting the local blood needs but Pearson said she expects the Gulf war will boost donations. Pearson asked residents to make appointments for donations rather than just showing up at the center. Donations will be sent to the a.m. to 5 p.m.

Donors cannot send their blood to one specific soldier in the Middle East but will be given a chance to express their support for soldiers by placing their name on a sign in front of the center, she said.

A person can donate blood every two months. The most convenient way for Texas Tech students to make blood donations is to sign up for Techsponsored on-campus blood drives. Pearson said there are a number of blood drives at Tech in Febuary. For more information about when and where these drives will be, call 797-6804.


Tony Fikes, Sophomore Mechanical Engineering Lubbock







John Krahmer traced many factors involved in the savings and loan crisis (in Texas to the fluctuating prices of Texas oil.




Financial institutions loaned Texans money on the basis the money would continue to flow with no end in sight.

The oil prices dropped dramatically in the early 1980s. Texans could no longer pay back their loans and, subsequently, defaulted and lost their property.

The cleanup of the S&L crisis is so great, the FDIC and the RTC soon will ask Congress for more funds to finance the cleanup.

Tech law student Micheal Cuda said that if Congress does not give the money needed for the FDIC and the RTC programs, the nation could be faced with economic and political

Mature learners can attend courses

Texas Tech now offers college-

level educational opportunities for mature learners through "Lifespan of Learning." The program, which offers diverse college courses, is aimed at persons 50 years old and older.

Tech's Division of Continuing Education sponsors the program.

The membership fee is \$100 per person or \$150 per married couple. Once the fee is paid, members may attend any or all classes at no additional cost.

The program is composed of ten short-course seminars, which will be taught by Tech professors throughout the spring semester. No credit for the seminars will be given, and no examinations will be

David Cummins, chair of the executive committee for "Lifespan of Learning," said that similar programs have succeeded on other college campuses. Officials at Tech's Division of Continuing Education asked him to help coordinate the program.

"They told us the program has worked well on other campuses where the people who operate it belong to it," he said. "That's what we mean by member-driven."

Scheduled seminars include: comparative mythology, the Lubbock Lake Landmark, global economy, art appreciation, disaster research, electrical engineering, contemporary women authors, film adaptation of literature, symphony seminars and western film.

Prospective seminars will change with the desires of members, Cummins said.

"We're going to try to find out from the people who attend if they want more of the seminar or if they like the seminar but would like to approach the subject from a different aspect," he said.

The Elderhostel Institute Network receives \$5 of the \$100 membership fee. EIN is an organization which operates seminars around the United States at various campuses and other locations for people 50 years old and

Members will receive brochures and information about specific seminars offered by EIN, he said.

TP&WD played a major role in the cleanup of Galveston Bay after more than 700,000 gallons of oil invaded the Gulf on July 28.

Although only time will tell if the efforts were a major success, reports indicate the wildlife and wetlands did not sustain extensive damage. TP&WD continues to study the ramifications of the spill on the vital plant growth that plays an integral part in the food chain of wildlife in the Galveston Bay and the surrounding

During the clean up, TP&WD personnel closed the bay to the taking of aquatic life and also checked for any signs of damage to the wildlife.

In other areas, TP&WD's Operation Game Thief (OGT) program cracked down on illegal activities. In July of 1990, 64 people were fined a total of \$48,900 after they were caught harvesting undersized striped bass from waters out of Lake Texoma.






