

# Freeway construction begins in 1994

Gov. Ann Richards and state Sen. John T. Montford, D-Lubbock, attended the groundbreaking for the \$250 million east-west freeway Sunday.

The groundbreaking ceremony at Fourth Street and Boston Avenue represented the start of the relocation of the Seagraves Whiteface Lubbock Railroad Co., which will move for construction of the freeway. Freeway contruction will begin in 1994.

"At the present time we have 43 percent of the money for the next 10 years. The next question will be if we should increase gas prices, but that cannot be answered now," Montford said. The freeway will divide the Texas
