OPEC's official benchmark price is \$34 a barrel, but actual spot market prices are much lower, and oil industry sources say cartel members must

> Demand for oil has dropped sharply in recent years, causing a worldwide glut. Athough OPEC has been seeking ways to deal with declining prices, the cartel repeatedly has failed to adopt an agreement that would limit the total amount produced.

Nigeria, facing economic crisis because of reduced oil demand, wants to increase its revenue by boosting output estimated at 600,000-700,000 barrels a day to 1 million, market sources said.

The Texas Tech University Board of Regents' finance committee Friday was presented with two alternative plans for future campus water management.

Agriculture worked together to develop the two alternatives which provide for watering Tech agricultural lands adjacent to the Lubbock campus, watering lawns on the main campus and selling surplus drinkable water.

Tech Vice President for Finance and crops Administration Gene Payne said \$1.4 million to finance the project currently is included in an appropriations bill before the Texas Legislature. The feasibility of either alternative depends largely on whether the money actually is allocated Ex-Students Association office and for the project, he said.

Glenn: 'solid supporter of Israel'

WASHINGTON - In a year-end "office pool" published in this space, I offered as a choice for neatest political trick of the coming year "John Glenn's attmept to keep Demoratic power brokers awake as he explains why he is not anti-Israel."

William Bundy, editor of Foreign Affairs magazine, took umbrage at "an indirect smear of Senator Glenn" and demanded to know what positions were taken to rate such obloquy.

It should come as no surprise to Glenn, as he prepares his announcement of candidacy for president, that many American supporters of a strong Israel ranks. Here's why:

On the sale of our most sophisticated fighter-bombers to Saudi Arabia, Glenn has come down squarely on both sides. In 1978, he voted for the Carter administration's sale of F-15s that caused the Israelis to doubt America's commitment to its safety; two years later, he voted against the Reagan administration's enhancement of these F-15s and the sale of AWACS.



In such a situation, a political leader does not pick a fight with a questioner or indulge his irritation by exaggeration of a supposed weakness in the question; on the contrary, the leader should impute good motives and then relieve the tension with a reassuring exposition of his own views.

"I don't recall that the exchange was all that forceful," Glenn tells me. "I do know there was a misunderstanding, and that it was blown out of all proportion.'

He believes Israel should declare a moratorium on new settlements in the West Bank — "moratorium is a better word than freeze" - and that Israel should have tried to negotiate Iraq out of its reactor without an attack, though he does not know if it could have been done. "I share Israel's concern that there not be nuclear power arrayed against

Times have changed his view on the PLO: "I would not advocate dealing with the PLO; now we have different ways to get in touch with the Palestinians - King Hussein, the West Bank mayors."

Says Glenn, who plans to announce later this month that his candidacy will be announced in late April,: "I consider myself to be a very solid supporter of Israel, the only democracy in the Middle East. We have a moral commitment, stemming from the horrors of the Holocaust, and I think my actions on the Foreign Relations Committee have backed up that commitment. 

Nine released after Klan rally

AUSTIN (AP) - Nine people were released from jail early Sunday on a variety of charges stemming from Saturday's Ku Klux Klan rally, which grew into a rock-throwing riot that left 12 injured.

Eight people were arrested on charges ranging from assault to inciting to riot, and one Klansman was taken into custody for carrying a weapon, police said.

Four officers, six demonstrators, a bystander and a reporter were injured in the melee, but none was hospitalized. Brackenridge Hospital officials said most of the injured suffered lacerations and bruises.

Austin Police Chief Frank Dyson said the rally, which cost police about \$15,000 in overtime for 150 officers, went about as he had expected.

The chief said it would be up to city council members to decide if parade permits should be granted in the future for potentially dangerous rallies. The council had granted parade permits for both the Klan rally and a peaceful march by anti-Klan organizations earlier Saturday.

Boy convicted of manslaughter

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) - A 16-year-old boy who said he had suffered years of physical and mental abuse and "didn't have anyplace to go" has been convicted of voluntary manslaughter in the ambush slaying of his father.

Jurors, who had been asked to find the boy guilty of firstdegree murder or conspiracy to commit murder, apparently felt Richard J. Jahnke "was driven to a certain state of mind that caused him to act the way he did," defense attorney James Barrett said.

The Laramie County District Court jury returned its verdict late Saturday night after deliberating for 61/2 hours. Jahnke faces up to 20 years in prison when he is sentenced next month by Judge Paul Liamos.

The charges stemmed from the shotgun slaying of the boy's father, Richard J. Jahnke, 38, an Internal Revenue Service agent who had a long history of abusing his son and 17-year-old daughter, Deborah, according to testimony in the week-long trial.

Storms hit parts of Southwest

A blizzard building snowdrifts taller than a trucker's rig Sunday shut down a corner of New Mexico and part of Colorado, stranding hundreds of travelers in schools, churches, and wayside homes.

Snow also slickened highways across parts of the Texas and Oklahoma highways into western Kansas, where up to 8 inches was expected.

In northeastern New Mexico, 14 inches of snow was whipped into 12-foot drifts in towns such as Des Moines, closing many highways, including Interstate 25, a major link between Albuquerque and Denver.

Historians evaluate U.S. presidents

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. -Historians rate Richard Nixon and four other presidents as failures, but America's strong leaders far outnumber the weak ones, said a historian who conducted a survey on the presidency.

"In general, we have been blessed with above-average leadership," said Robert K. Murray, who is tabulating the responses of 970 historians questioned in the survey.

lucky, considering the relatively haphazard way we select a president. Historians have determined that almost one out of every four has been great or near great, and over half are above average," the professor of history at Pennsylvania State University said.

All respondents - a racial mix of men and women from all areas of the country have doctorates in U.S. history and work as assistant professors or better at U.S. colleges or universities. Murray sent questionnaires to all 1,997 historians he could locate who fit the criteria and 970 responded in detail, he said.

Murray and his assistants will not have a complete computer readout of the survey until May, but he discussed the top and bottom rungs of the presidency and the modern leaders.

The country also has produced four "near greats" -Theodore Roosevelt, Woodrow Wilson, Andrew Jackson and Harry Truman.

"Nixon gives every evidence of climbing slowly, but it's hard to tell if he will ever climb out of the failure category. His status is still very much up for grabs," "We've been remarkably Murrary said. He said Nixon, the only president to resign, is the country's most controversial leader.

Among recent presidents, Lyndon Johnson ranks 10th, Dwight Eisenhower 11th and John F. Kennedy 13th, all in the above-average category, according to the survey. Gerald Ford and Jimmy Carter are rated as average.

Ronald Reagan was not included in the questions because he has not served long enough. Also omitted were William Henry Harrison and James Garfield because they served terms too short to evaluate.





Kenny Allbritton, Gene Segrest, Bob Gross, Wes McKenzie and Pat Moore had the plate, getting on base take the lead.


