## Anybody Got An Aspirin?

It started Friday.
Any traffic ticket received on campus after Friday, Jan. 28, becomes cumulative, according to an ultimatum passed down by the Tech Traffic Committee and approved y President E. N. Jones

This boils down to the hard, cold fact that a driver who receives two tickets this semester and a third at a later date will have his campus driving privileges restricted. Gone are the good old days when the slate was wiped clean at the end of each four-month period.

The committee doesn't stop there, either. It further directs that parking stickers are to be fixed exactly as directed. If a sticker is in the wrong position or is not permanently attached, a ticket will be issued the offending driver, the group warns.

They close their notice with this final reminder:
"All drivers on the campus are hereby warned that vigorous enforcement of traffic and parking regulations will begin immediately after the regular registration period."

These are drastic, but necessary steps. According to Assistant Registrar Evelyn Clewell, the current period's enrollment at Tech smashed all previous records for a spring semester. With people come cars, and with each additional auto registration the traffic committee's headache becomes greater.
