Tech will join Lubbock townpeople and the several military organizations here tomorrow in observance of the thirteenth anniversary of the signing of the Armistice.

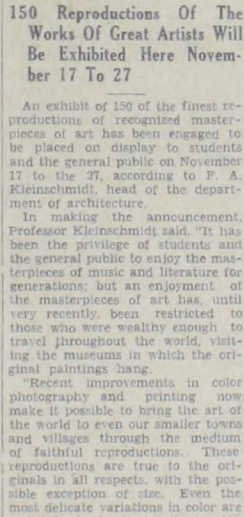

Miners Loom Strong Having Lost Only One Game This Season; Matadors Have Lost Two During 1931 Season

The Matadors of Coach Pete Cawthon are in El Paso today, prepared to take on the Miners of Coach Mack Saxon. It is the chief attraction of the border city's Armistice Day program.

This week is the second trip for the Cawthonmen to make through the Mexican country. They passed into it before, when they invaded Las Cruces to take the Aggies in the tune of 7 to 0. The Matadors enter Miner territory today with a fair shake, to date they have lost only two games, one to the Haskell Indians, and the other to Baylor university. They have beaten, Canyon Teachers, New Mexico Aggies, Colorado Miners, and Abilene Christian college.

The sophomore team of Tech has shown that it has remarkable possibilities, and unusual steadiness for such an inexperienced team. New stars have loomed up in each contest. The Abilene Christian game proved to be Moffet, Price, and Close, Day. Terrible Tribble, Matador center, has caused state-wide comment, on his remarkable playing. Moody, Lubbock, letterman and forward on the Matador team last year is back to give a few exhibitions of his long-shots. Crews, of Wilson, is expected to be as accurate as ever with his long shots and crisp-shots. While with Wilson, Crews received much honorable comment from this section of the state.

Kelsey, Robinson, Jennings, and Wiese have all had experience with the varsity and it is expected that they will make the plenty of trouble for anyone expecting to make the first cage team.

Three Southwest Conference Teams Appear On Tech's '32 Tentative Football Schedule

Tech To Meet Louisiana Tech In Game At Lubbock; Denver University Will Come Here And Tech Goes To Dallas

A tentative schedule has been officially announced that will give Tech students a chance to witness games that heretofore have never been played, or their equal never scheduled by Tech. The local officials are waiting for a reply from Southwest Conference officials, concerning Tech's admittance into the Southwest Conference, before they sign the contracts.

The schedule has three Southwest Conference schools on it. The Matadors will meet Baylor university, Arkansas university, and Texas A. and M. Baylor and A. and M. have already signed contracts with the Matadors.

To Go To Denver
Two Rocky Mountain schools appear on the schedule. The Cawthonmen will make the trip to Denver to play the Colorado Miners, and Denver university will journey to Lubbock for a game here. Louisiana Tech of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic association has been agreed upon. Notre Dame "B" will come to Lubbock and give the Matadors a chance to defeat the flying colors of Notre Dame.

Texas Mines, Simmons and New Mexico university are also in line. Six of the games are to be played in Lubbock, and another in Amarillo.
