





# Football Scrimmage Sessions Are Set For Saturday

## Last Mixup Causes Several Injuries

Hoskins, Cudd and Pirtle Praised For Defensive Work In First Game

Students particularly interested in football are expected to move to Tech stadium for the next couple of Saturday afternoons, at least, as the result of an announcement by Coach Dell Morgan. The coach has started a bruising, full-length scrimmage session between teams of the football squad scheduled for 2:30 p.m. tomorrow, the following Saturday, and possibly the next, provided spring practice is extended that long.

Last Saturday the first of these regular scrimmages was held between the Reds and Whites, a session which brought several injuries to players and considerable cheering from the stands. All players seemed to be giving their all in the workout and tackles could be heard clearly in the stands.

Defensive work of Dwight Hoskins, freshman fullback from Amarillo, Warren Cudd, guard from Perryton who lettered for Tech in 1941 and recently returned from service; and Tom Pirtle, Lubbock letterman guard of 1941, particularly drew praise of the coaches.

Roger Smith, fleet back who lettered here in 1941 and 1943 and was named All-American back while at LAAP in 1943, got away for one 20-yard run and several other shorter canters. Leste Jackson, Lubbock bruiser who won his freshman letter in 1942, and Little Primo McCurry, Lubbock freshman,

hammered the line for substantial gains at fullback.

The Reds won the encounter 24-6, but both sides contributed some good football. Persons in the stands indicated they expect a far better Red Raider team next fall.

The coaches found out several weaknesses during the workout last weekend and spent most of this week trying to correct them. The freshmen, particularly, have found some difficulty catching on at the T-system of play as used at Tech. Mentors are not disturbed by the short-comings so far, pointing out that most of the candidates are ready to rough-it, a situation much sought after by all grid coaches.

A majority of the spring squad consists of returned servicemen, most of them lettered here in previous years. Getting in shape has been slow for some of them but all agree that by fall they will be ready for the tough schedule ahead.

## Hardin-Simmons Added To Fall Football Card

Texas Tech has added an eleven-game to its fall football schedule with the addition of Hardin-Simmons, an old rival, Morley Jennings, athletic director, announces. Contracts are being signed for a clash between Tech's Red Raiders and the HSU Cowboys Nov. 30 and for a return game in Lubbock in 1947. Hardin-Simmons has not fielded a grid team for the past three years.

Tech will have five home games and six on the road next fall, meeting four teams which played in New Year's Day bowls and four Southwest conference eleven. Bowl teams are Oklahoma Aggies, winners in the Sugar Bowl; New Mexico, winner in the Sun Bowl; Denver, Sun Bowl loser; and Tulsa, Oil Bowl loser. Southwest conference teams are: SMU, Baylor, Rice and Texas A & M.

## Raider Tracksters Eliminate Errors

Elimination of errors in field events and more speed on the track was sought this week by Red Raider track men as they drilled for the quadrangular meeting next Thursday in Abilene with Hardin-Simmons, McMurry and Abilene Christian college.

Coach Walker Nichols expects to take about 20 men to the meet and expressed hope this week of winning. Last weekend the Red Raiders picked up two points at the Fort Worth Livestock show meet as relay teams came in in the money. The mile relay team of Bill Kelley, Hewitt Allison, Charles Reynolds, and Charles Roe, finished fourth in university division and Allison came in fourth in the quarter mile to mark up the points. The football relay team of Kelley, Reynolds, Bennie Tidwell and George Brewer finished third but no points went to the team total. The University of Texas walked away with the university division title.

Coach Nichols had hoped to pick up some points with Willie Florence, 275-pound Lubbock discus thrower, a returned veteran. Florence hurled the disk about 10 feet further than the meet winner, but stepped out of the circle with his heave and was disqualified. All week Florence has been working on his form in the ring and is attempting to overcome difficulty in staying the circle. He has been making some progress.

The track team picked up some talent this week when James Cook, fleet Rising Star athlete, shifted to the cindermen as a dash man and hurdler after breaking his left hand in last Saturday's scrimmage. Cook probably will be lost to football for the remainder of the spring.

Frank H. Chappell, jr., of Michigan university, visited the campus last week to investigate courses which might aid him in conducting his ranching interests at the Spade Ranch near Colorado City, Texas.

Kenny, Sommersville, Conn., in memory of their father, consists of the income from ten thousand dollars and is awarded to a graduate student majoring in animal husbandry.
